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(54) **NON-INVASIVE METHOD AND SYSTEM FOR ESTIMATING BLOOD PRESSURE FROM PHOTOPLETHYSMOGRAM USING STATISTICAL POST-PROCESSING**

(57) A system and method for estimating blood pressure (BP) using photoplethysmogram (PPG) has been explained. The PPG is captured from a PPG sensor (102). For preparing training model, a pulse oximeter is used for capturing PPG. For testing, a smartphone camera is used for capturing the PPG signal. A plurality of features are extracted from the preprocessed PPG signal. A BP distribution is then generated using the plurality

of features and the training model. The BP distribution is part of a set of BP distributions generated from different subjects. Finally, a post-processing methodology have been used to reject inconsistent data out of the set of BP distributions and BP value is estimated only for the remaining BP distributions and a statistical average is provided as the blood pressure estimate.

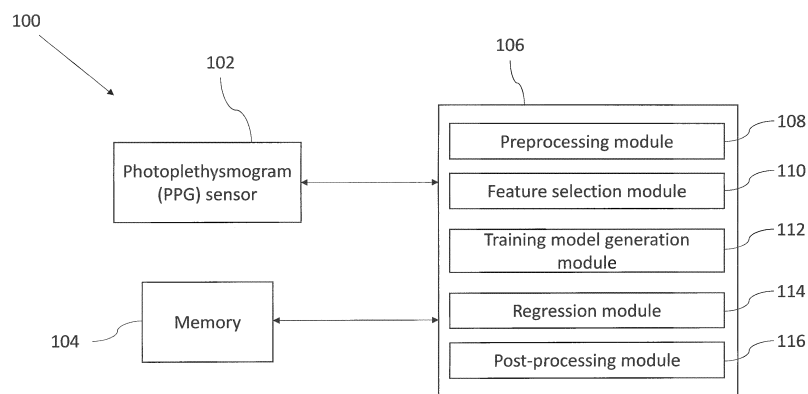

TECHNICAL FIELD

[0002] The embodiments herein generally relates to the field of blood pressure estimation, and, more particularly, to a method and system for estimating the blood pressure using the photoplethysmogram (PPG) by applying statistical post processing techniques.

BACKGROUND

[0003] Blood pressure (BP) is considered to be an important biomarker for cardiac risk estimation. Irregular heartbeats, fluctuation of blood pressure (BP) or cholesterol levels are typically considered as biomarkers as well as risk indicators for stroke and cardiovascular diseases. Over the last few years, ubiquitous and continuous monitoring of the digital biomarkers have gained immense importance all over the world. They use wearable devices or smartphones to capture physiological information to estimate the markers through signal processing and data driven predictive analytics. 24x7 wearable monitors in the form of smart eyewear or wristbands can provide important health information without disrupting normal activities. On the other hand, smartphone based e-health monitors are not only unobtrusive and easy to use, they also come at no additional cost, thereby making them popular candidates for affordable healthcare.

[0004] The smartphone based e-health monitor uses smartphone camera to capture the variation in blood flow through Photoplethysmogram (PPG) that can be used to measure heart rate (HR) or BP. Besides being cost effective, smartphone PPG based BP estimation avoids the professional expertise in tracking the Korotkoff sounds required for cuff-based BP measuring devices and the attachment of any wearable sensor. However, though HR estimation from smartphone PPG has achieved success through efficient noise cleaning and signal processing, Systolic BP (SBP) and Diastolic BP (DBP) estimation have proved to be relatively difficult due to complex physiological processes involved.

[0005] In few prior art techniques, data driven models were proposed to predict BP from both smartphone and oximeter PPG signals. However, certain issues like 1) the experimental dataset to be of a wide range of BP (only subjects with normal BP were considered) and 2) unique subjects between the training and testing samples (this can create over-fitting by introducing person specific bias) were not addressed. In another technique, Windkessel Model based prediction of BP from PPG features via latent parameters were proposed and analyzed for different types of datasets. However, issues of the effects of noise on the performance for data collected in field and failure of predicting high BP were reported. The ultimate goal being smartphone deployment, issues like sensor agnostic PPG feature selection become significant. Additionally, smartphone PPG is challenging to work on because of its noisy nature. Even for a stable subject with no cardiac conditions, there can be a wide variation in features estimated per cardiac cycle leading to variation in BP estimated in a single session. Hence it is important to choose an appropriate statistical average to represent the BP estimated per session. It is well known that a simple arithmetic mean cannot be used as a suitable representative for any data distribution that has outliers. Median and mode are better representatives, and mode is favored more as it is less affected by outliers.

[0007] In view of the foregoing, an embodiment herein provides a system for estimating blood pressure (BP) using photoplethysmogram (PPG). The system comprises a photoplethysmogram (PPG) sensor, a memory and a processor. The PPG sensor configured to capture photoplethysmogram (PPG) signal. The processor further comprises a pre-processing module, a feature selection module, a training model generation module, a regression module and a post-processing module. The preprocessing module preprocesses the captured PPG signal. The feature selection module extracts a plurality of features from the preprocessed PPG signal. The training model generation module creates a training model for estimating the blood pressure (BP) using the plurality of features and a ground truth value of the BP. The regression module generates a BP distribution using the training model, wherein the BP distribution is part of a set of BP distributions generated from different subjects. The post-processing module rejects unacceptable BP distributions

out of the set of BP distributions based on a predefined criteria. The post processing module further provides a statistical average for the accepted BP distributions to estimate the blood pressure.

[0008] In another aspect, a method for estimating blood pressure (BP) using photoplethysmogram (PPG). Initially, photoplethysmogram (PPG) signal is captured using the PPG sensor. The PPG signal is then preprocessed using a preprocessing module. In the next step, a plurality of features are extracted from the preprocessed PPG signal. In the next step a training model is created for estimating the BP using the plurality of features of the PPG signal and a ground truth value of the BP. Further a BP distribution is generated using the training model, wherein the BP distribution is part of a set of BP distributions generated from different subjects. In the next step, unacceptable BP distributions out of the set of BP distributions are rejected based on a predefined criteria. And finally, a statistical average is provided for the accepted BP distributions to estimate the blood pressure.

[0009] In yet another aspect, a non-transitory computer-readable medium having embodied thereon a computer program for executing a method for estimating blood pressure (BP) using photoplethysmogram (PPG). The method includes steps of: (a) capturing photoplethysmogram (PPG) signal using a PPG sensor (102); (b) preprocessing the PPG signal using a preprocessing module (108); (c) extracting a plurality of features from the preprocessed PPG signal; (d) creating a training model for estimating the BP using the plurality of features of the PPG signal and a ground truth value of the BP; (e) generating a BP distribution using the training model, wherein the BP distribution is part of a set of BP distributions generated from different subjects; (f) rejecting unacceptable BP distributions out of the set of BP distributions based on a predefined criteria; and (g) providing a statistical average for the accepted BP distributions to estimate the blood pressure.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE DRAWINGS

[0011] The embodiments herein will be better understood from the following detailed description with reference to the drawings, in which:

Fig. 1 illustrates a block diagram for estimating blood pressure (BP) using photoplethysmogram (PPG) according to an embodiment of the present disclosure;

Fig. 2 shows a flowchart depicting the steps involved in the post processing of the plurality of BP distributions according to an embodiment of the present disclosure;

Fig. 3 shows the multiple dominant cluster check for the plurality of BP distributions according to an embodiment of the present disclosure;

Fig. 4 shows the distribution width check for the plurality of BP distributions according to an embodiment of the present disclosure;

Fig. 5a-5b is a flowchart illustrating the steps involved for estimating blood pressure (BP) using photoplethysmogram (PPG) according to an embodiment of the present disclosure;

DETAILED DESCRIPTION OF EMBODIMENTS

[0012] The embodiments herein and the various features and advantageous details thereof are explained more fully with reference to the non-limiting embodiments that are illustrated in the accompanying drawings and detailed in the following description. The examples used herein are intended merely to facilitate an understanding of ways in which the embodiments herein may be practiced and to further enable those of skill in the art to practice the embodiments herein. Accordingly, the examples should not be construed as limiting the scope of the embodiments herein.

GLOSSARY-TERMS USED IN THE EMBODIMENTS

[0013] The expression "photoplethysmogram" or "PPG" sensor in the context of the present disclosure refers to a sensor used to capture the photoplethysmogram signal of the subjects. For the purpose of generating the training model, pulse oximeter has been used as the PPG sensor. For testing purpose, the smartphone camera has been used to capture the PPG signal.

[0014] Referring now to the drawings, and more particularly to Fig. 1 through Fig. 7, where similar reference characters denote corresponding features consistently throughout the figures, there are shown preferred embodiments and these embodiments are described in the context of the following exemplary system and/or method.

[0015] According to an embodiment of the disclosure, a system 100 for estimating blood pressure (BP) using the photoplethysmogram (PPG) is shown in Fig. 1. The system 100 uses a smartphone photoplethysmogram (PPG) to predict blood pressure (BP) non-invasively. A post-processing methodology have been used to reject inconsistent data and predict BP values only for the remaining data. A statistical average across all BP values in a single session is provided as the blood pressure estimate.

[0016] According to an embodiment of the disclosure, the system 100 consists of a photoplethysmogram (PPG) sensor 102, a memory 104 and a processor 106 as shown in the block diagram Fig. 1. The processor 106 is in communication with the memory 104. The processor 106 is configured to execute algorithms stored in the memory 104. According to an embodiment of the disclosure, the processor 106 further includes a plurality of modules for performing various functions. The processor 106 may include a preprocessing module 108, a feature selection module 110, a training model generation module 112, a regression module 114 and a post processing module 116.

[0017] According to an embodiment of the disclosure, the PPG sensor 102 is a pulse oximeter or a smartphone camera. For generating the training model, the pulse oximeter was used for capturing the PPG signal. While for testing, the PPG was measured using the camera of the smartphone. As the smartphone PPG has very low signal-to-noise ratio, hence it poses few additional challenges to extract information of complex physiological signals.

[0018] According to an embodiment of the disclosure, the system 100 includes the preprocessing module 108 to clean the PPG signal. The preprocessing module 108 is configured to remove noise from the PPG signal by performing band pass filtering and baseline correction. The band pass filtering is performed in the range of 0.75 - 8 Hz prior to a plurality of features extraction. Changes in PPG amplitude due to variable finger pressure and discontinuities due to motion artifacts are taken care of by implementing cycle selection on the basis of similar pulse height and periodicity.

[0019] According to an embodiment of the disclosure, the preprocessed PPG signal is then provided to the feature selection module 110. A plurality of features of the PPG signal are chosen from a time domain signal in such a way that the chosen features are independent of the PPG sensor 102. The plurality of features are selected after analyzing their linear correlation with respect to ground truth BP in the training dataset. Systolic upstroke time (T_s), diastolic time (T_d), systolic area (A_s) and diastolic area (A_d) are typical characteristics of the PPG waveform. In the present embodiment, the ultimate goal is to find features that have relation with BP in both oximeter and smartphone data. Ratios of PPG features like T_s/T_d and A_s/A_d were chosen as they were stable even in smartphone PPG. A similar linear correlation evaluation was also carried between PPG features and ground truth BP, thereby selecting T_s , T_s/T_d , A_s/A_d , $1/T_s^2$, Age and Body Mass Index (BMI).

[0020] According to an embodiment of the disclosure, the training model generation module 112 generates a training model for estimating the BP. The training model is generated using the plurality of features of the PPG signal and the ground truth value of the BP. Further, the regression module 114 is configured to generate a BP distribution per session using the training model. The BP distribution is part of a set of BP distributions generated from different subjects. A gradient descent learning based linear regression is used to create a training model from the selected features and the corresponding ground truth. A direct linear regression model is created on the PPG features for BP estimation, avoiding the latent parameters, to make a simpler system, easier to run as a mobile application.

[0021] According to an embodiment of the disclosure, the post processing is performed on the set of BP distributions by the post processing module 116. The post processing results in the rejection of unacceptable BP distributions out of the set of BP distributions based on a predefined criteria. The predefined criteria includes clustering the estimated BP distributions and rejecting those BP distributions where there are i) multiple equally dominant clusters ii) two clusters that are too far apart or ii) unacceptable cluster formation. The post processing module 116 further configured to provide the statistical average for the accepted BP distributions to estimate the blood pressure.

[0022] A flowchart 200 illustrating the steps involved in the post processing of the plurality of BP distributions is shown in Fig. 2. The first step is clustering the cycle-wise BP distributions into clusters of similar BP based on probability density. For this purpose, the 'mclust' package of R is used. It provides parameter estimation via the Expectation Maximization algorithm for normal mixture models and chooses clusters on the basis of the best Bayesian Information Criterion (BIC).

[0023] Further, multiple dominant clusters are checked, This module is traversed when the number of clusters in systolic blood pressure, SBP (C_{sbp}) or diastolic blood pressure, DBP (C_{dbp}) are greater than or equal to 3. It may happen that too many small clusters exist uniformly all over the distribution as shown in Fig. 3. This indicates that estimated BP

is varying highly over the session and hence is unacceptable. As demonstrated in Algorithm 1 below, if the range of cluster populousness of multiple clusters is below a threshold, the session is considered to have multiple equally dominant clusters and hence it is to be rejected. Here populousness of the i^{th} cluster is given by n_i/N , where n_i and N are the number of elements in i^{th} cluster and the total number of elements respectively.

[0024] In the next step, the distribution width is checked. The inputs to this block are the distributions having one or two clusters. If there is a single cluster, it is accepted. In resting condition, BP cannot usually vary too much. Hence, as shown in Algorithm 2 below, the sessions were rejected where the difference of the two cluster means (in case of 2 clusters) is equal to or more than 15mmHg as shown in Fig. 4. In case the distribution is found suitable to work on, as decided by both the above cluster check modules, Half Range Mode (HRM), that iteratively uses densest half ranges for mode computation is used as the statistical average. HRMs M_{sbp} and M_{dbp} are computed for the distributions of SBP and DBP respectively as the required statistical averages.

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[0025] Finally the cluster formation validity is checked. Upon investigation of the output of the clustering module, it was found that for some data, the cluster log likelihood value was too negative, indicating a possibility of invalid cluster formation. Hence this data was rejected.

[0026] In operation, a flowchart 300 illustrating the steps involved for estimating blood pressure (BP) using photoplethysmogram (PPG) according to an embodiment of the disclosure is shown in Fig. 5a-5b. Initially at step 302, the PPG signal is captured using the PPG sensor 102. The PPG sensor 102 may be a pulse oximeter or the smartphone camera. At step 304, the captured signal is then preprocessed using the preprocessing module 108. The preprocessing include noise removal, band pass filtering and baseline correction from the captured PPG signal. In the next step 306, the plurality of features are extracted from the preprocessed PPG signal. The plurality of features are selected after analyzing their linear correlation with respect to ground truth BP in the training dataset. The plurality of features are chosen such that they have relation with BP in both oximeter and smartphone data.

[0027] At the next step 308, the training model is created for the estimation of the BP. The training model is created using the generated plurality of features and the ground truth value of the BP. At step 310, the BP distribution is generated using the training model. The BP distribution is part of a set of BP distributions generated from different subjects. Therefore at step 312, unacceptable BP distributions out of the set of BP distributions are rejected based on the predefined criteria. The predefined criteria includes clustering the estimated BP distributions and rejecting those BP distributions where there are i) multiple equally dominant clusters ii) two clusters that are too far apart or ii) unacceptable cluster formation. And finally at step 314, the statistical average is provided for the accepted BP distributions to estimate the blood pressure.

[0028] According to an embodiment of the disclosure, the estimation of the BP using the PPG signal can also be validated with the help of experimental findings as below: A dataset from the pulse oximeter and the smartphone PPG was created from non-critical patient population of a primary rural healthcare unit, an urban hospital and healthy individuals working in the lab (with the subjects' consents and ethics clearance from the Institutional Review Board). The dataset (pulse oximeter + smartphone) includes a wide range of demographic parameters such as age (45 ± 17 years), weight (66 ± 14 Kg) and height (162 ± 9 cm) along with SBP (129 ± 20 mmHg) and DBP (83 ± 11 mmHg). Multiple data was not collected from any subject.

[0029] The pulse oximeter PPG was collected from 68 subjects for building the training model while for testing, smart-

phone PPG was collected from a separate set of 50 subjects. The pulse oximeter data was collected from the right hand index finger using a USB enabled fingertip pulse oximeter (Contec CMS 50D+) at 60 Hz for around a minute. Smartphone PPG was extracted from videos recorded using Nexus 5 (from the same finger with flash on) at 24 Hz for about a minute through an in-house android application. From each video frame (QCIF: 176x144 pixels), a 32x32 region from the middle was cropped and the averaged red pixel intensity was used as the PPG value. A cuff based BP measuring device exerts pressure and brings about temporary changes to blood circulation. In order to avoid this, PPG data was collected first. Ground truth BP was measured using a digital BP monitoring device from Omron immediately after the PPG data collection. All measurements were done while the user was in rest position to ensure stability in BP throughout the session.

Experimental Results

[0030] Mean Absolute Percentage Difference (MAPD), Bland Altman (BA) plots for analyzing the trend and the percentage of test data points with ≤ 15 , ≤ 10 and ≤ 5 mmHg errors are used as performance metrics. 14 test cases were rejected by the two cluster check modules and 5 by the Cluster Formation Validity Check Module. Final results are shown in Fig. 6, through scatter plots of predicted BP with ground truth BP and BA plots. It shows that there is a good linear correlation (CC) between the predicted BPs and the ground truths. Also, the linear fit on the BA plot have small slopes for both SBP and DBP indicating that there is no particular bias in predicting high or low BP.

[0031] Further, the proposed method was compared with standard statistical averages like mean, median, trimmed mean, histogram based mode estimator that estimated BP from smartphone PPG. The histogram based mode estimator computes the median of the most frequently occurring bin, and in case of multiple bins with identical maximum frequency, an average of their medians is used. Both MAPD and the slope of the linear fit on the BA plot are low for the proposed method compared to the others that indicates good trend following along with small error. Particularly, MAPD and the slope of the BA plots are quite below 10% and 0.5 respectively, for the proposed method for both SBP and DBP unlike the others. Also the percentage of test data below 15%, 10% and 5% errors are overall high (97% and 77% data have ≤ 15 mmHg error for SBP and DBP respectively) for the proposed method for both SBP and DBP.

[0032] Fig. 7 illustrates error boxplots for all methods, it clearly shows that the proposed method has the minimum median absolute error and a very small standard deviation compared to all the other methods. Also, no significant outliers are observed unlike the other methods.

[0034] The embodiments of present disclosure herein addresses unresolved problem of noisy PPG signal and high variation in the PPG signal for predicting the blood pressure. The embodiment, thus provides a method and system for estimating blood pressure using photoplethysmogram (PPG) by applying statistical post processing techniques.

Claims

1. A method for estimating blood pressure (BP) using photoplethysmogram (PPG), the method comprising a processor (106) implemented steps of:

capturing photoplethysmogram (PPG) signal using a PPG sensor (102);
preprocessing the PPG signal using a preprocessing module (108);
extracting a plurality of features from the preprocessed PPG signal;
creating a training model for estimating the BP using the plurality of features of the PPG signal and a ground truth value of the BP;
generating a BP distribution using the training model, wherein the BP distribution is part of a set of BP distributions generated from different subjects;
rejecting unacceptable BP distributions out of the set of BP distributions based on a predefined criteria; and
providing a statistical average for the accepted BP distributions to estimate the blood pressure.

2. The method according to claim 1, wherein the predefined criteria includes clustering the estimated BP distributions and rejecting those BP distributions where there are i) multiple equally dominant clusters ii) two clusters that are too far apart or ii) unacceptable cluster formation.

3. The method according to claim 1, wherein the training model is created using linear regression.

4. The method according to claim 1 wherein a half range-mode is used for calculating the statistical average.

5. The method according to claim 1, wherein the step of preprocessing include noise removal, band pass filtering and baseline correction.

6. The method according to claim 1, wherein the PPG sensor is a pulse oximeter or a smartphone camera.

7. The method according to claim 1, wherein the plurality of features of the PPG signal are chosen from a time domain signal in such a way that the chosen features are the PPG sensor independent.

8. A system for estimating blood pressure (BP) using photoplethysmogram (PPG), the system comprising:

a photoplethysmogram (PPG) sensor (102) configured to capture photoplethysmogram (PPG) signal;
a memory (104); and

a processor (106) in communication with the memory (104), the processor (106) further comprising:

a preprocessing module (108) configured to preprocess the captured PPG signal;

a feature selection module (110) configured to extract a plurality of features from the preprocessed PPG signal;

a training model generation module (112) configured to create a training model for estimating the blood pressure (BP) using the plurality of features and a ground truth value of the BP;

a regression module (114) configured to generate a BP distribution using the training model, wherein the BP distribution is part of a set of BP distributions generated from different subjects; and

a post-processing module (116) configured to reject unacceptable BP distributions out of the set of BP distributions based on a predefined criteria, the post processing module further configured to provide a statistical average for the accepted BP distributions to estimate the blood pressure.

9. The system according to claim8, wherein the PPG sensor (102) is a pulse oximeter or a smartphone camera.

One or more non-transitory computer readable information medium having embodied thereon a computer program for executing a method for estimating blood pressure (BP) using photoplethysmogram (PPG), wherein the method comprises: capturing photoplethysmogram (PPG) signal using a PPG sensor (102);

preprocessing the PPG signal using a preprocessing module (108);

extracting a plurality of features from the preprocessed PPG signal;

creating a training model for estimating the BP using the plurality of features of the PPG signal and a ground truth value of the BP;

generating a BP distribution using the training model, wherein the BP distribution is part of a set of BP distributions generated from different subjects;

rejecting unacceptable BP distributions out of the set of BP distributions based on a predefined criteria; and

providing a statistical average for the accepted BP distributions to estimate the blood pressure.

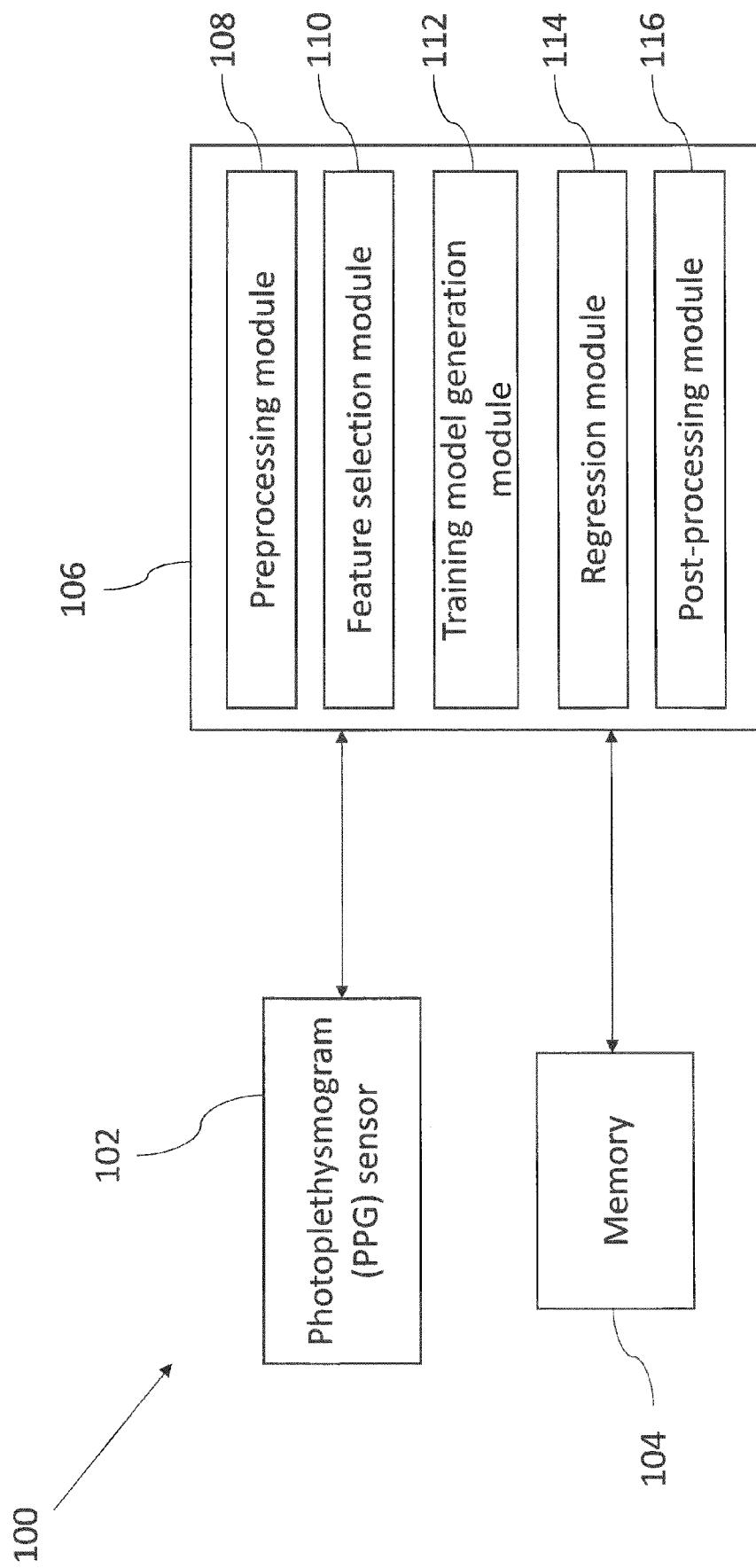

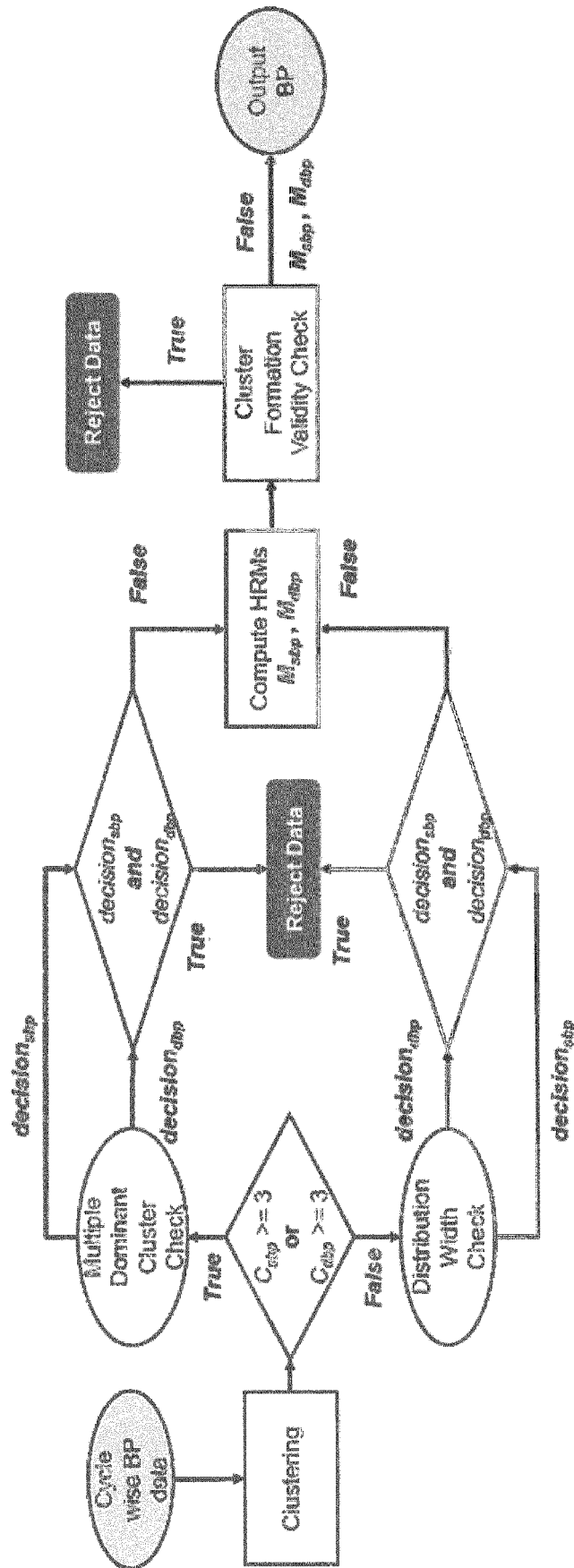

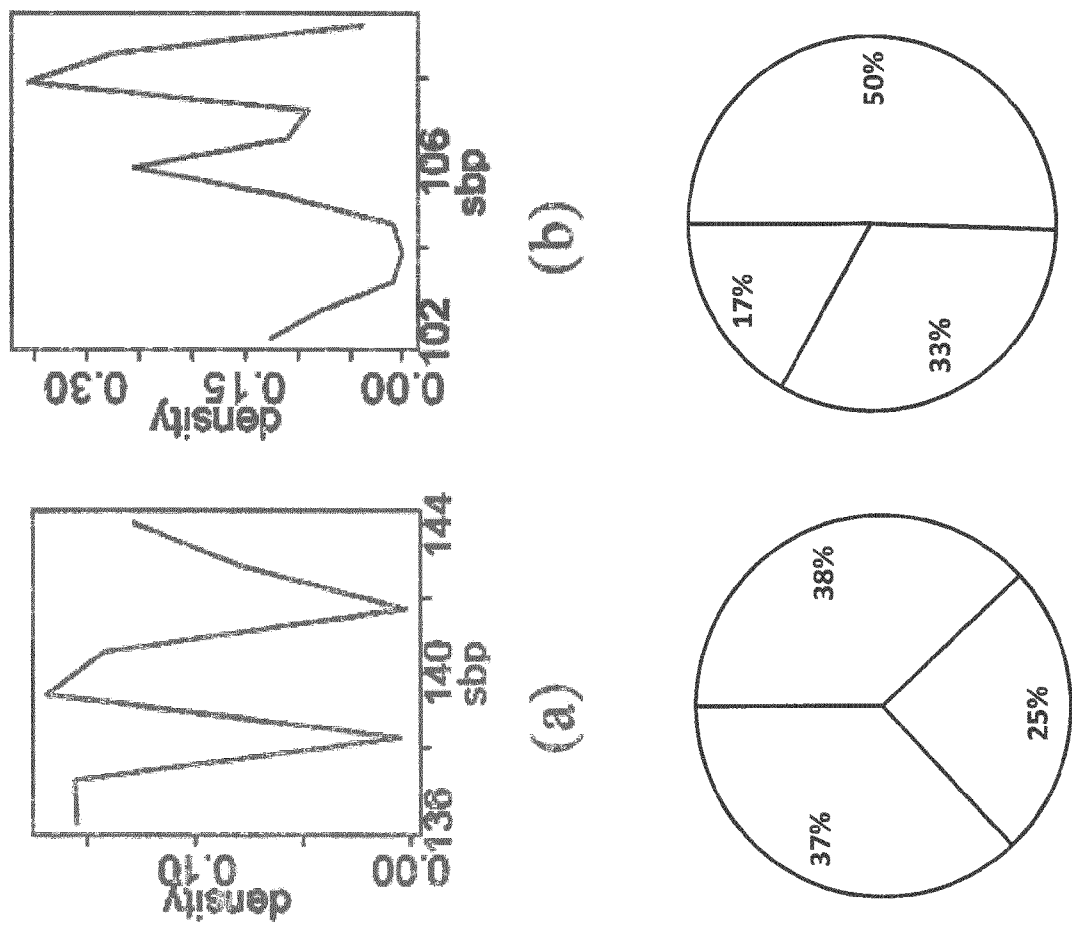

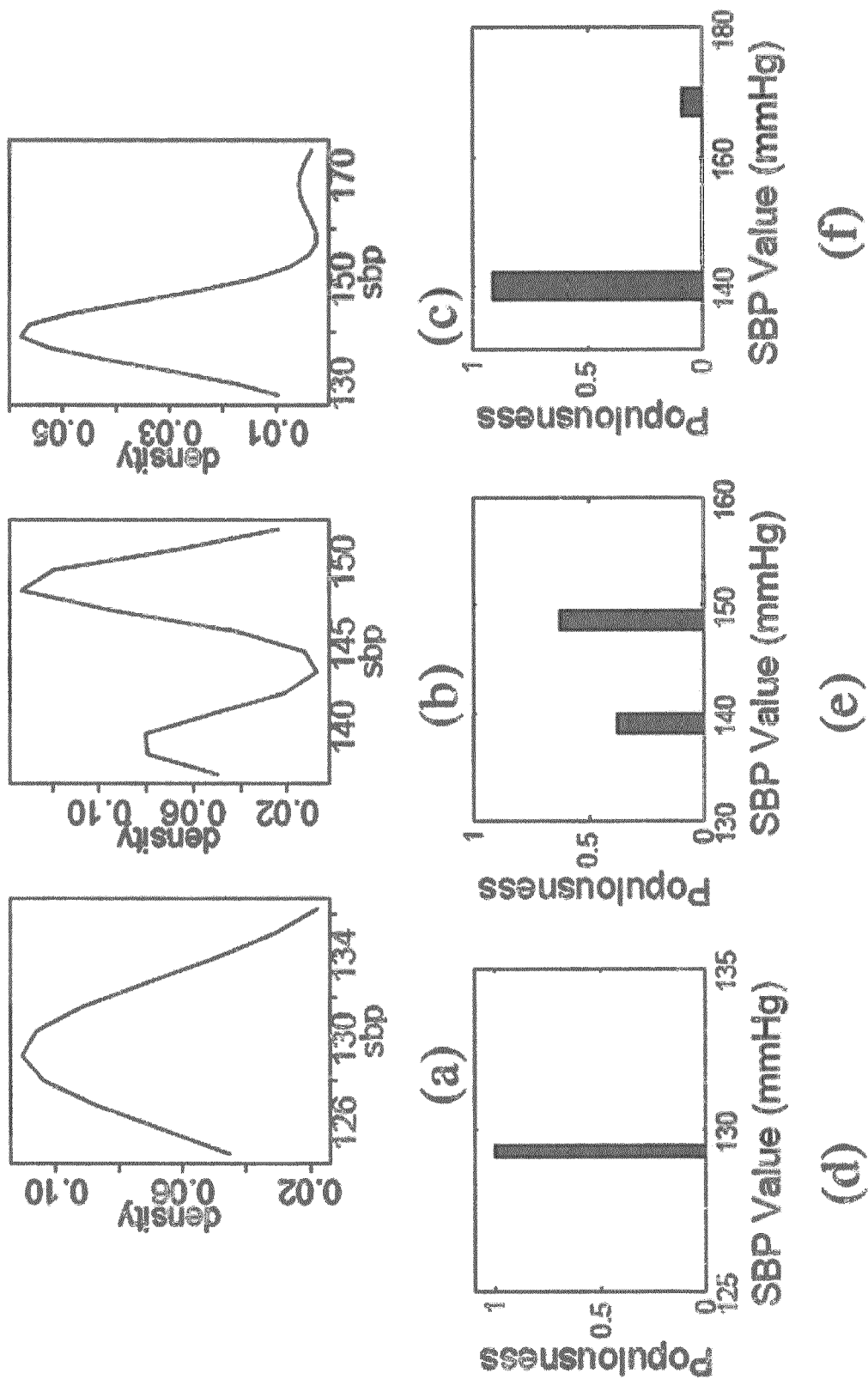

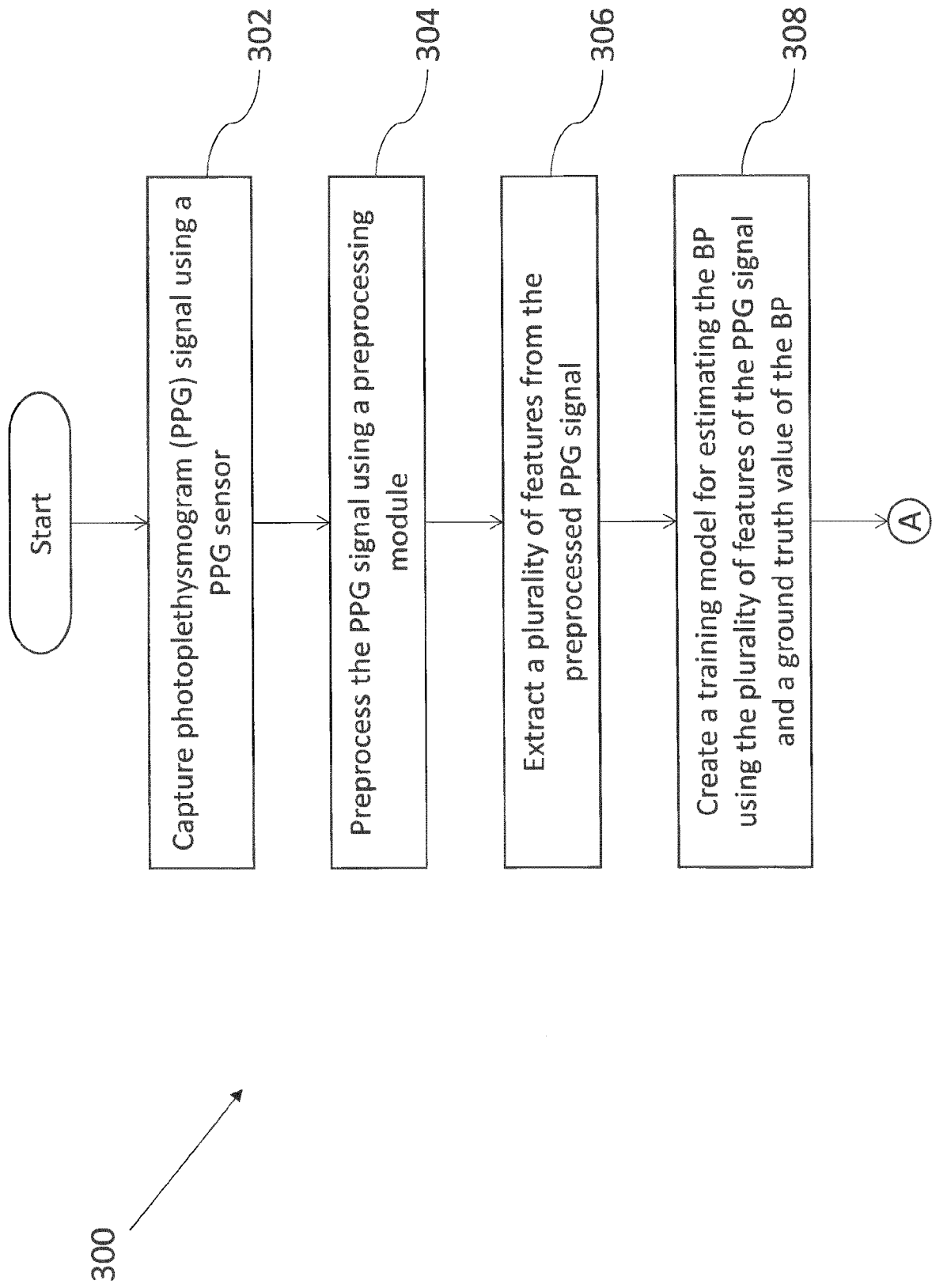

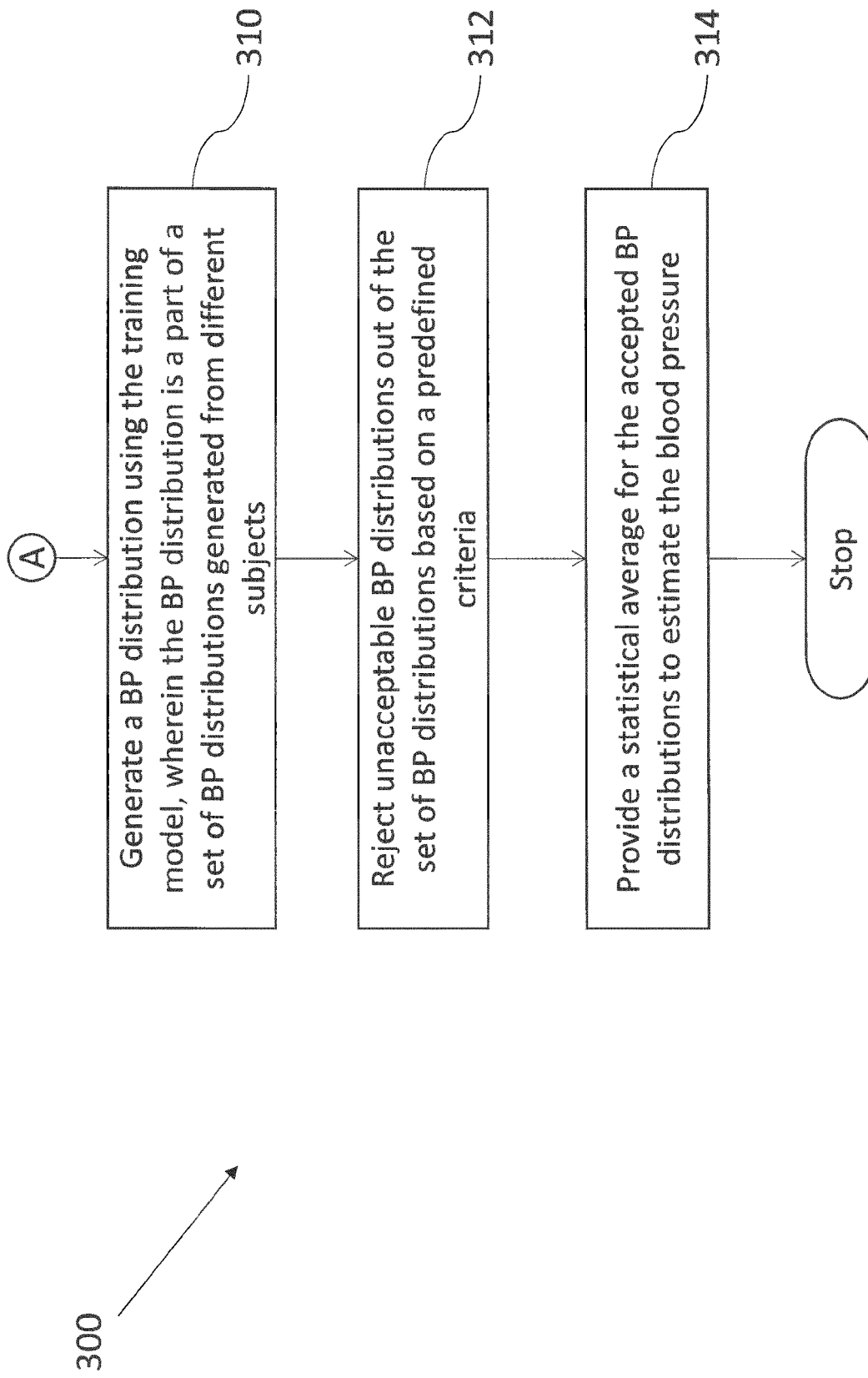

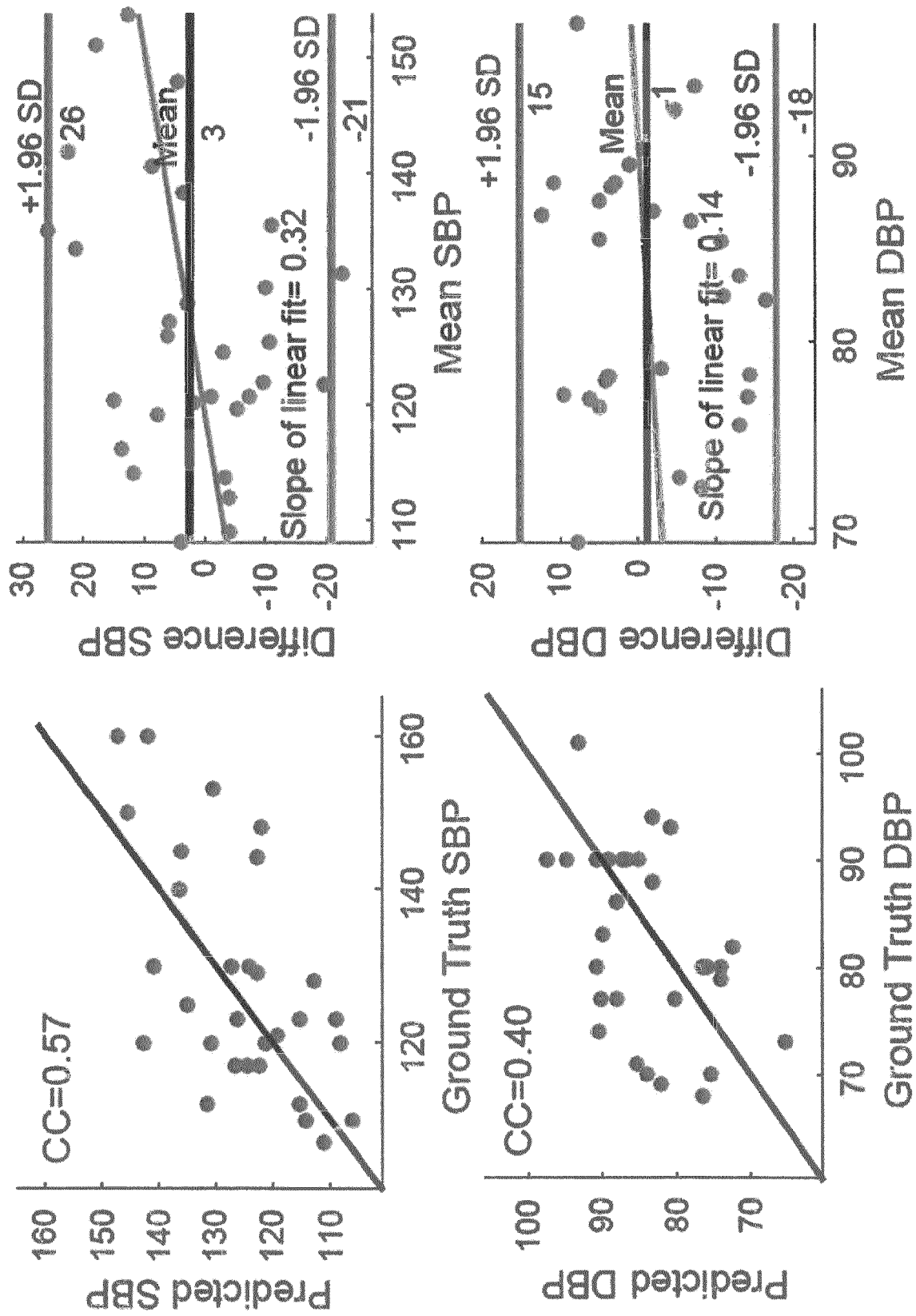

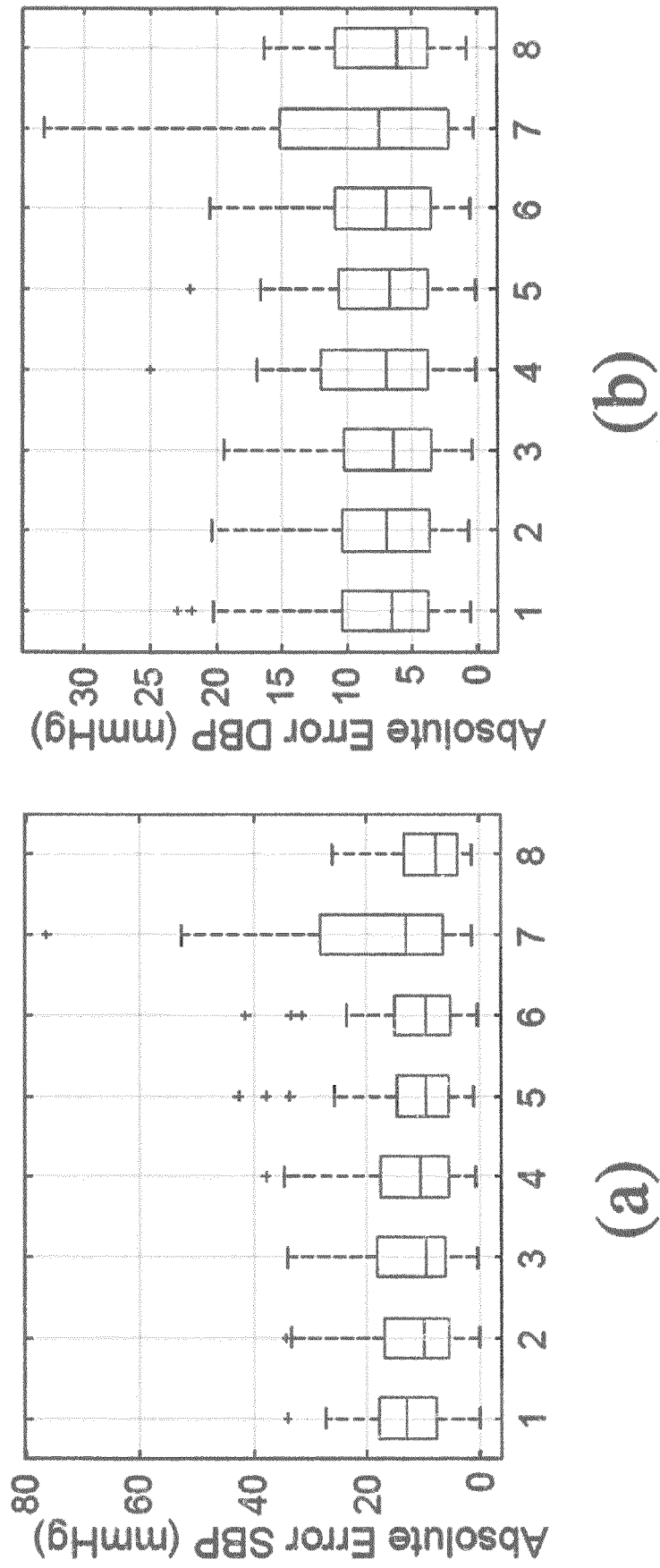

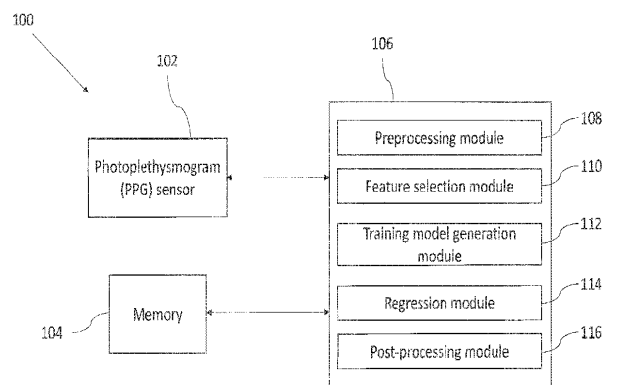
