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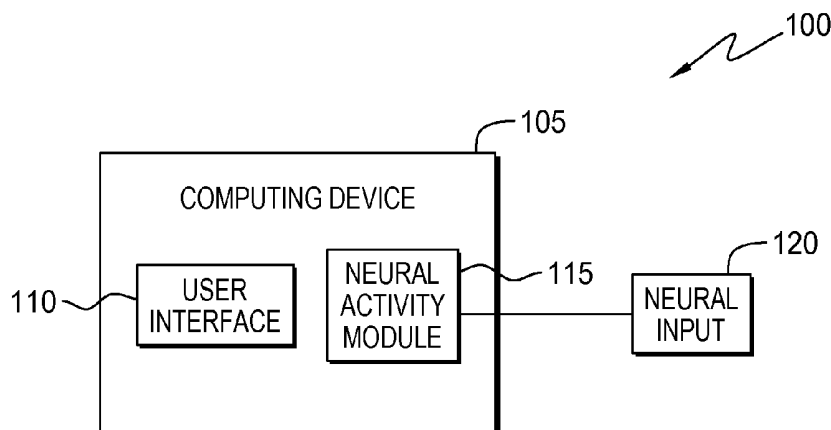
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(57) **ABSTRACT**

Embodiments of the present invention provide systems and
methods for performing analysis validity ranking of infor-
mation. The method utilizes technology such as MRI, CT,
PET, SPECT, EEG, and MEG to collect a user's cognitive
event, to analyze the user's cognitive event via analytics,
and to correlate the user's cognitive event with a ranking.
This correlated data is sent to a database amenable to future
inquiries on cognitive events of the user. The search results
are based on the level of validity for retrieving accurate
search results from the database at a future point in time. A
validity and the rank of the data deriving from the user's
cognitive event are evaluated based on the brainwaves and
the location of the data deriving from the user's cognitive
event. The data with a higher validity is ranked higher and
tagged accordingly.

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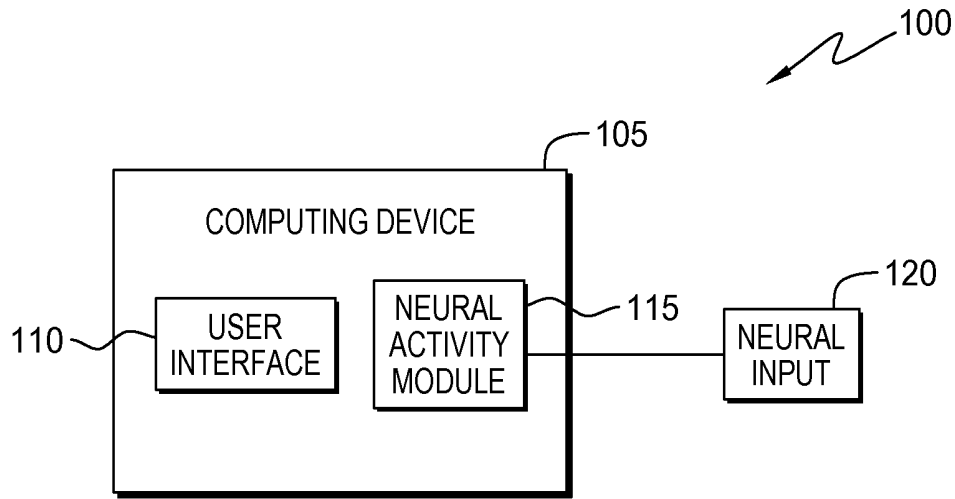

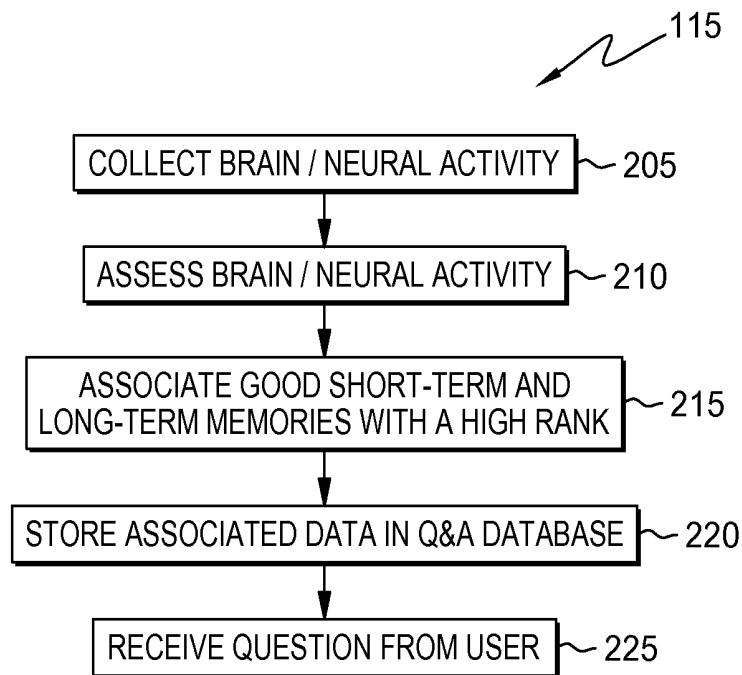

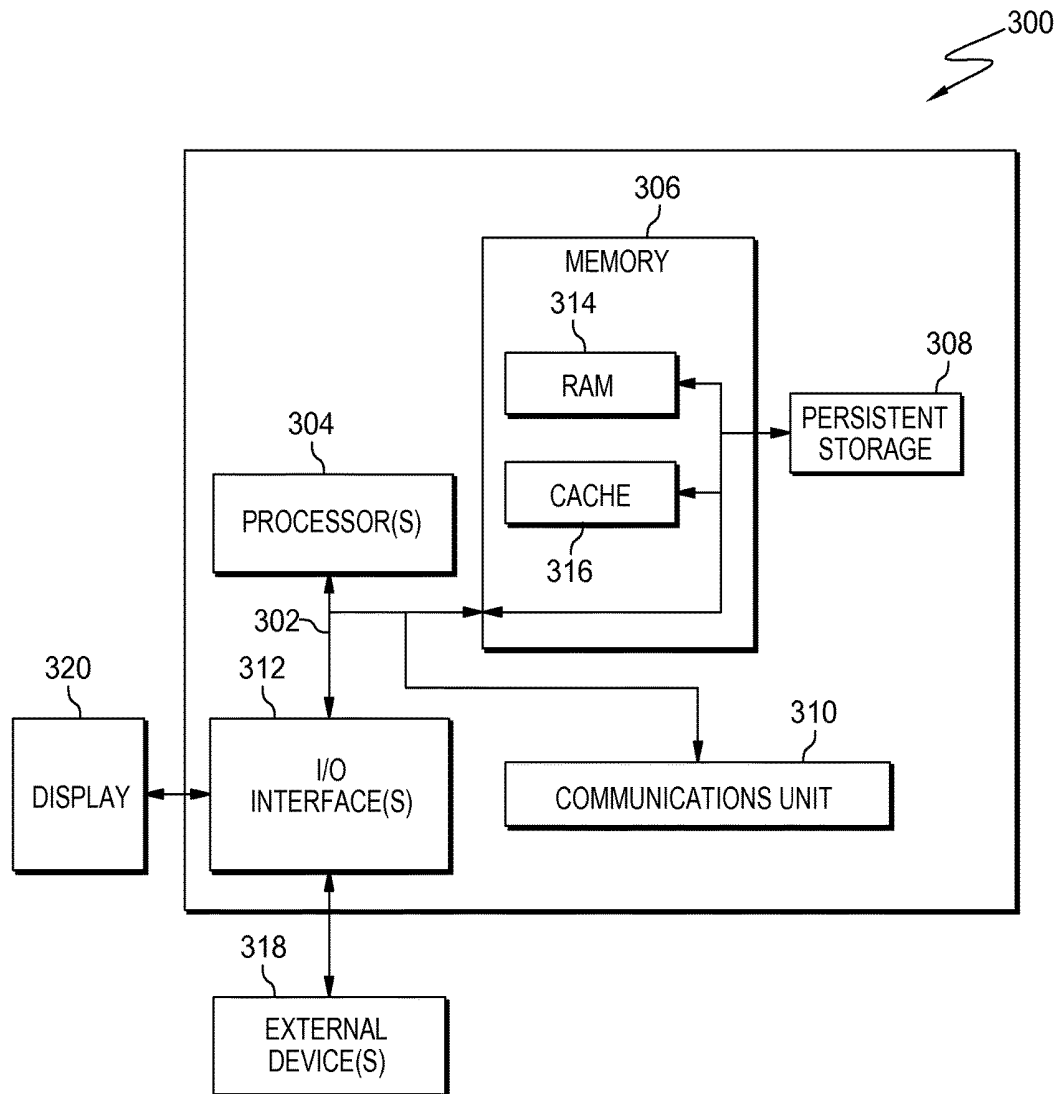

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REVERSE CORRELATION OF PHYSIOLOGICAL OUTCOMES

BACKGROUND OF THE INVENTION

The present invention relates generally to the field of psychology and more specifically to performing analysis validity ranking of information.

It is typical to forget things from time to time. People become more forgetful with increasing age. Healthy people can experience memory loss or memory distortion at any age. Stress, fatigue, insomnia, and sleep deprivation may lead to memory issues. When people are not in their best mental or physical states, the information that gets stored or retrieved in the brain may not be the most accurate information.

SUMMARY

According to one embodiment of the present invention, a method for performing analysis validity ranking of information is provided, the method comprising the steps of: receiving, by one or more processors, information deriving from neural inputs; analyzing, by one or more processors, the information deriving from the neural inputs, wherein the information deriving from the neural inputs is ranked; storing, by one or more processors, the ranked information deriving from the neural inputs in a database; and retrieving, by one or more processors, the ranked information deriving from the neural inputs in the database, upon receiving one or more inquiries from a user.

Another embodiment of the present invention provides a computer program product for performing analysis validity ranking of information, based on the method described above.

Another embodiment of the present invention provides a computer system for performing analysis validity ranking of information, based on the method described above.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE DRAWINGS

FIG. 1 is a functional block diagram illustrating a data processing environment, in accordance with an embodiment of the present invention;

FIG. 2 is a flowchart depicting the processing steps carried out by neural activity module 115, in accordance with an embodiment of the present invention; and

FIG. 3 depicts a block diagram of components of a computing device, in accordance with an illustrative embodiment of the present invention.

DETAILED DESCRIPTION

As neurons emit an action potential, brain waves are produced which oscillate at different frequencies. Two brain regions key to learning in humans—the hippocampus and the prefrontal cortex—use two different brain wave frequencies to communicate as the brain learns to associate unrelated objects. When the brain correctly links the objects, the brain waves oscillate at a higher wave frequency, called “beta” waves. When the brain incorrectly links the objects, the waves oscillate at a lower frequency, called “theta” waves. Within the hippocampus and prefrontal cortex, a correct guess (i.e., a response a user has perceived confidence in, where affiliated neural linkages and pathways are quickly identified and related neuronal firing occurs) generates waves oscillating in the beta frequency (of 9 to 16

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hertz or cycles per second). Within the hippocampus and prefrontal context, an incorrect guess generates waves oscillating in the theta frequency (of 2 to 6 hertz). Additional determinants in memory formation and cognitive functioning include the role of different directions of the flow of brain waves; the source of the sending information; the destination of the sent information; the frequency of waves during particular cognitive and memory functioning events. Embodiments of the present invention provide methods and systems to utilize techniques such as Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI), computerized axial tomography (CT), positron emission tomography (PET), single-photo emission computed tomography (SPECT), electroencephalogram (EEG), and magnetoencephalogram (MEG) to collect, analyze and label a user's memory data based on the validity into a question and answer (Q&A) system for retrieving accurate search results at a future point. The validity and rank of the data is evaluated based on the brain waves and location of the data in the user's memory. The data with higher validity is ranked higher and tagged accordingly in the Q&A system.

The present invention will now be described in detail with reference to the Figures. FIG. 1 is a functional block diagram illustrating a data processing environment, generally designated 100, in accordance with one embodiment of the present invention. FIG. 1 provides only an illustration of implementation and does not imply any limitations with regard to the environments in which different embodiments may be implemented. Modifications to data processing environment 100 may be made by those skilled in the art without departing from the scope of the invention as recited by the claims. In this exemplary embodiment, data processing environment 100 includes neural input 120 and computing device 105.

Neural input 120 refer to sources of data deriving from the brain/neural activity of a user. Neural input 120 sends the brain/neural activity of the user and is connected directly to a sensor which resides and/or works in conjunction with neural activity module 115. In one embodiment, a brain wave detecting system is located within a flexible hat which is placed on the head of the user. The flexible hat contains a plurality of electrodes conforming to the hat. A circuit board having a low-noise integrated circuit amplifier may be mounted thereon. Each electrode uses a plurality of metal conductive fingers which protrude through the hair to the scalp of the user and provide multi-contact sites on the scalp for each electrode. The tips of each electrode contact the user's scalp to provide a redundancy of contacts for each electrode.

Computing device 105 comprises of neural activity module 115 and user interface 110. Computing device 105 may be a laptop computer, a tablet computer, a netbook computer, a personal computer (PC), a desktop computer, a personal digital assistant (PDA), a smart phone, a thin client, or any programmable electronic device capable of communicating with neural input 120. Computing device 105 may include internal and external hardware components, as depicted and described in further detail with respect to FIG. 3.

User interface 110 may be a graphical user interface (GUI) or a web user interface (WUI) and can display text, documents, web browser windows, user options, application interfaces, and instructions for operation, and includes the information (such as graphics, text, and sound) a program presents to a user and the control sequences the user employs to control the program. User interface 110 is capable of receiving data, user commands, and data input modifications

from a user. User interface 110 is also capable of communicating with neural activity module 115.

In this exemplary embodiment, neural activity module 115 is an application capable of reading, consuming, and manipulating data deriving from neural inputs 120. Neural activity module 115 comprises of at least: (i) a set of processors; (ii) a memory coupled to at least one of the processors; (iii) a set of sensors for capturing indications of neural activity of a user; (iv) a set of receivers for receiving the indications of neural activity of the user; (v) a set of instructions stored in the memory and executed by at least one of the set of processors, wherein the set of instructions perform the actions of: (a) receiving indications of the neural activity of the user associated with an interactive flow of information communicated between the user and the system, (b) identifying a user cognitive state from the neural activity to form a ranked accuracy assessment of a data derived from a statement input by the user; and (c) storing and associating the data (e.g., by tagging) and the ranked accuracy assessment of the data in a memory repository for subsequent usage based on the ranked accuracy assessment. Furthermore, sensors and/or receivers perform the following functionalities: (i) application of an EEG scan to identify a brain wavelength associated with the cognitive event; and (ii) application of a MRI scan to identify neural patterns. Neural activity module 115 applies a neural state assessment algorithm which associate a cognitive assessment based on the brain wavelength; and applies a neural pattern to associate a memory retrieval accuracy to a cognitive event. Neural activity module 115 provides a validity ranking of information from a user based on detected neural activity of the user and is capable of answering questions asked by a user via data based on the ranking to answer questions.

Alpha, beta, theta, delta, and gamma waves can correspond to neural activity.

Alpha waves (e.g., the deep relaxation waves) oscillate between 7.5 Hz and 14 Hz. Alpha brain waves are present in deep relaxation, typically when the eyes are closed, and times of slipping into a daydream or during light meditation. Alpha waves are associated with an optimal time to program the mind for success and it also heightens an individual's level of imagination, visualization, memory, learning and concentration. Alpha waves are the gateway to a subconscious mind; lies at the base of conscious awareness; and is present in an individual's intuition (which becomes clearer and more profound as a brain wave approaches 7.5 Hz).

Beta waves (e.g., the waking consciousness and reasoning waves) oscillate between 14 Hz and 40 Hz. Beta brain waves are associated with normal waking consciousness; a heightened state of alertness; moments requiring logic and critical reasoning; and moments characterized with stress, anxiety, and restlessness. Beta brain waves dominate an individual's normal waking state of consciousness when attention is directed towards cognitive tasks and involves activity present when individuals are alert, attentive, engaged in problem solving, judgment, decision making, and engaged in focused mental activity.

Theta waves (e.g., the light meditation and sleeping wave) oscillate between 4 Hz and 7.5 Hz. Theta brain waves are present during deep meditation, light sleep, and a REM dream state. Theta waves are the realm of sub-consciousness and are only experienced momentarily from drifting off to sleep (from alpha waves) and waking from deep sleep (from delta waves). A sense of deep spiritual connection and unity with the universe can be experienced at theta waves wherein a mind's most deep-seated programs are at theta wave frequencies. Thus, individuals experience vivid visualiza-

tions, great inspirations, profound creativity and exceptional insights. Unlike other brain waves, the elusive voice of theta waves is a silent voice. At the alpha wave-theta wave border (from 7 Hz to 8 Hz) is where the optimal range for visualization, mind programming, and using the creative power of the brain begins. The alpha wave-theta wave is the mental state which an individual can consciously create a reality. At the frequency from 7 Hz to 8 Hz, individuals are conscious of their surroundings, however the individual's body is in deep relaxation.

Delta waves (e.g., the deep sleep wave) oscillate between 0.5 Hz and 4.0 Hz. The delta wave frequency is the slowest of the frequencies and is experienced in deep, dreamless sleep and in very deep, transcendental meditation where awareness is fully detached. Delta waves are in the realm of an unconscious mind, and is a gateway to the universal mind and the collective unconscious (where information received is otherwise unavailable at the conscious level). Among many things, deep sleep is important for the healing process linked with deep healing and regeneration. Thus, not having enough deep sleep is detrimental to an individual's health in multiple ways.

Gamma waves (e.g., the insight wave) oscillates above 40 Hz (which is the fastest known frequency). Gamma waves are associated with bursts of insight and high-level information processing cycles.

Long-term memories are based on the patterns of connections between neurons. Cells utilize electrical signals to keep track of short-term memories. As long as cells retain a memory, the cells fire in cycles, or oscillations which last between 20 and 40 milliseconds. At this point, time-sharing is invoked. Human brains also produce longer electrical signals—alpha and theta waves—which last about 200 milliseconds. Seven of the 20-to-40-millisecond cycles can be fitted into slots by dividing long waves (i.e., higher wavelengths) into slots. Each memory takes its place in a designated slot of the longer brain waves. Computer simulations confirm that a neural network operating under these conditions can (with appropriate input and feedback) store about seven memories. Subjects took about four-tenths of a second to answer plus a delay of 38 milliseconds for each item on the list. The delay indicates how long it takes to scan through each short-term memory (which corresponds to the 20 to 40 millisecond storage cycles).

Mental fatigue and motivation influences neural network dynamics activated during task switching. EEG coherence is used as a measure of synchronization of brain activity. Electrodes of interest are identified using a data-driven pre-processing method with data-driven visualization and group analysis of multichannel EEG coherence with functional units. Performance on repetition trials are faster and more accurate than on switch trials. EEG data revealed more pronounced and frequency specific frontal-parietal network activation in switch trials, while power density was higher in repetition trials. The effects of mental fatigue on power and coherence are widespread, and are not limited to specific frequency bands. Moreover, these effects are independent of specific task manipulations. This increase in neuronal activity and stronger synchronization between neural networks did not result in more efficient performance. Response speed decreased and the number of errors increases in fatigued subjects. The dopamine system is a proposed as the operable mechanism for the observed the fatigue effects. Brain activity (investigated by EEG scans) can be associated with reasoning required to identify necessities for achieving and maintaining desired goals and with motivation to act with such an intention. Three different components brain activity

provide distinct neural signatures for each scene analysis and comprehension which demonstrates that motivation is a very complex psychological concept supported by a widely distributed neural processing.

FIG. 2 is a flowchart depicting the processing steps carried out by neural activity module 115, in accordance with an embodiment of the present invention.

In step 205, neural activity module 115 collects brain/neural activity. The brain/neural activity is typically in the form of brain waves and memories. A working memory is the equivalent of short term memory while a reference memory is the equivalent of long term memory. Different states of consciousness have various referral output memories such as chemical and physiological expressions. Techniques such as MRI, CT, PET, SPECT, EEG, MEG are used to collect brain/neural activity. In other embodiments, devices which are used to investigate neural particles and affiliated pathways; energy transference; and gravimetric techniques can be used to collect brain/neural activity. The brain/neural activity is treated as the user's memory data which is to be processed at later steps. Neural activity module 115 can collect statistical data for further analysis.

In step 210, neural activity module 115 assesses brain/neural activity. Through existing data stored in a memory repository, neural activity module 115 determines the reverse correlation of good working and reference memories and the relayed outcomes inclusive of physiological effects and neural patterns. Neural activity module 115 triggers the expressions of these cellular networks and assigns the good working memory and reference memory based on the frequency of waves. Techniques such as EEG and MRI are implemented to collect the data (i.e. extract information) from the output memory. EEG scans determine the wavelength and MRI scans determine the magnetic activities and localization of the neuronal patterns. By utilizing existing neuroimaging and cognitive applications, the reverse correlation between specific wavelength patterns (alpha, delta and gamma, especially beta and theta waves) cross-referenced with the MRI locational data determine which wavelength patterns leads to a good working and reference memory. By applying a neural state assessment algorithm, a cognitive assessment is associated with a neural frequency. For example, if an individual has the same frequency of beta waves when recalling a clear, accurate memory, neural activity module 115 can try to replicate the external environment inclusive of similar stimuli, methodology and processes. In another embodiment, neural activity module 115 focuses on assessing the psychological or physiological state by analyzing language cues captured from a patient. Neural activity module can determine general patterns and trends in the data deriving from the brain/neural activity and eliminate events deemed to be outliers.

In step 215, neural activity module 115 associates good short-term memories (i.e., working memories) and good long-term memories (i.e., reference memories) with a high rank. A ranking algorithm constructs a rank based on the validity of working memories and reference memories. Once correlational patterns are identified, additional variables such as personality, learning styles, and memory challenges are identified (if configured to do so). From there, improved methodologies for learning can be applied that fits the needs of the individual. For example, if an individual's personality falls within a category of the Myers Briggs Test and there is a level of bias in the self-questionnaire, then the physiological output comparison can be cross-referenced to support the test or the degree of variance. Neural activity module 115 tags the data which is associated with the good

working and reference memory with a higher rank. Conversely, the data which is not associated with a good working or good reference memory is tagged with a lower rank. A ranked accuracy is assessed on data derived from statements received by neural activity module 115. If an individual's homeostatic baseline can be found, neural activity module 115 assesses memory stability and retention potential.

In step 220, neural activity module 115 stores the associated data in a Q&A database. By storing and associating the data (e.g., tagging), the ranked accuracy assessment of the data in the system is available for future usage. The Q&A database is configured to receive requests from users to find the associated data comprising of good working and reference memories with ranks.

In step 225, neural activity module 115 receives a question from the user. Neural activity module 115 retrieves the data from the Q&A database based on the validity rank. Search results are displayed, with the data with the most valid search data on the top of the rank (i.e., the data from the Q&A database which is most relevant to the inquiry in the question from the user). An example of neural activity module 115 receiving a question and retrieving data from the Q&A database includes: (i) receiving a sample question of "What are the best information the new hires got from 5 weeks long bootcamp training and how well they have retained the information?"; (ii) retrieving a resting neuro-wave frequency (e.g., state of mind); (iii) identifying the difference from that homeostatic state to one of a positive correlation with beta waves which suggests the potential for a good point of working and reference memory; (iv) identifying retained memory data based on spatial data and the user's output of recollection; (v) retrieving related information entered in by the new hire associated with a positive attribute; (vi) identifying the positive attribute which is associated with a higher validity rank; (vii) retrieving related information entered in by the new hire associated with a negative attribute; (viii) identifying the negative attribute which is associated with a lower validity rank; and (ix) outputting the search results to the user. An algorithm within neural activity module evaluates the data based on brain-waves and the location of the data in the user memory in order to derive the rank of the data based on the validity of a stored cognitive event with the search inquiry. The level of validity is assessed by a user confidence level (e.g., perceived cognitive accuracy, biometric correlations, especially focusing on neural frequencies, and other state determinants).

Neural activity module 115 can be applied in different scenarios. Additional applications include: employee engagement, assessment of periods of times of peak efficiency (i.e., when memory and alertness of an individual is at its highest level). Thus, a workforce approach can be applied to identify working environments which are a best fit for an individual. Further enhanced applications may include increased diagnostic and treatment speed and accuracy of neurodegenerative diseases related to memory such as dementia, Alzheimer's disease, aphasia and trauma. A similar analogy can be applied to children learning styles. If the children are stressed and tired, then the data is deemed as less valid in comparison to the data entered when the children are in good mood and alert. Neural activity module 115 detects that evidence/data and tags the data accordingly.

FIG. 3 depicts a block diagram of components of a computing device, generally designated 300, in accordance with an illustrative embodiment of the present invention. It should be appreciated that FIG. 3 provides only an illustrative

tion of one implementation and does not imply any limitations with regard to the environments in which different embodiments may be implemented. Many modifications to the depicted environment may be made.

Computing device 300 includes communications fabric 302, which provides communications between computer processor(s) 304, memory 306, persistent storage 308, communications unit 310, and input/output (I/O) interface(s) 312. Communications fabric 302 can be implemented with any architecture designed for passing data and/or control information between processors (such as microprocessors, communications and network processors, etc.), system memory, peripheral devices, and any other hardware components within a system. For example, communications fabric 302 can be implemented with one or more buses.

Memory 306 and persistent storage 308 are computer readable storage media. In this embodiment, memory 306 includes random access memory (RAM) 314 and cache memory 316. In general, memory 306 can include any suitable volatile or non-volatile computer readable storage media.

What is claimed is:

1. A computer-implemented method comprising the steps of:

monitoring neural activity of a user while the user performs a memory functioning event via a user interface on a device;

recording the memory functioning event as a set of individual memories;

capturing the neural activity from neural inputs, the neural activity including brain wave information;

associating an individual memory of the memory functioning event with a corresponding neural activity at the time of the individual memory;

assigning to the individual memory a wave type based on the brain wave information of the corresponding neural activity, the wave type being assigned from among a set of wave types including beta waves and theta waves; ranking, with a first rank, the individual memory according to the assigned wave type, the beta waves being ranked higher than the theta waves;

tagging the individual memory with the first rank;

storing the ranked and tagged individual memory in a database; and

retrieving the ranked and tagged individual memory, based on the tag and upon receiving one or more inquiries from the user.

2. The method of claim 1, wherein capturing the neural activity from neural inputs, comprises:

collecting brain wave activity by, at least, a magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) scan and an electroencephalogram (EEG) scan, wherein the EEG scan identifies a brain wave frequency associated with the memory functioning event and the MRI scan identifies a localization of neural patterns during the memory functioning event; and

receiving, by one or more processors, the collected brain wave activity for further processing.

3. The method of claim 2, wherein assigning the wave type, comprises:

measuring a frequency of the brain wave while monitoring the neural activity, the brain wave information including a frequency measurement;

determining brain wave location information from the localization of neural patterns, the brain wave information including the brain wave location information; correlating the frequency measurement and the brain wave location information, with the memory functioning event; and

associating the brain wave information with the memory functioning event.

4. The method of claim 3, further comprising:

constructing the database, wherein the database stores the brain wave information inputs and the brain wave location information deriving from the neural inputs, with the memory functioning event;

corresponding a validity value to the memory functioning event wherein the validity value is a first validity level for a first attribute and a second validity level for a second attribute; and

utilizing the database for a search inquiry for a valid memory, wherein the valid memory has a high rank relative to other related memories in the database.

5. The method of claim 4, wherein the validity value comprises at least two memory functioning events, and wherein the at least two memory functioning events are ranked based on their associated attributes.

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6. The method of claim 4, further comprising:
 responsive to the search inquiry, outputting search results
 as a list with the brain wave information and corre-
 sponding memory functioning event based on the validity.

7. A computer program product comprising:
 a computer readable storage medium and program
 instructions stored on the computer readable storage
 medium, the program instructions comprising:
 program instructions to monitor neural activity of a user
 while the user performs a memory functioning event
 via a user interface on a device;
 program instructions to record the memory functioning
 event as a set of individual memories;
 program instructions to capture the neural activity from
 neural inputs, the neural activity including brain wave
 information;
 program instructions to associate an individual memory of
 the memory functioning event with a corresponding
 neural activity at the time of the individual memory;
 program instructions to assign to the individual memory
 a wave type based on the brain wave information of the
 corresponding neural activity, the wave type being
 assigned from among a set of wave types including beta
 waves and theta waves;
 program instructions to rank, with a first rank, the indi-
 vidual memory according to the assigned wave type,
 the beta waves being ranked higher than the theta
 waves;
 program instructions to tag the individual memory with
 the first rank;
 program instructions to store the ranked and tagged
 individual memory in a database; and
 program instructions to retrieve the ranked and tagged
 individual memory, based on the tag associated with the
 information and upon receiving one or more inquiries
 from the user.

8. The computer program product of claim 7, wherein
 program instructions to capture the neural activity from
 neural inputs comprise:
 program instructions to collect brain wave activity by, at
 least, a magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) scan and an
 electroencephalogram (EEG) scan, wherein the EEG
 scan identifies a wave frequency associated with the
 memory functioning event and the MRI scan identifies
 a localization of neural patterns during the memory
 functioning event; and
 program instructions to receive the collected brain wave
 activity for further processing.

9. The computer program product of claim 8, wherein
 program instructions to assign the wave type comprise:
 program instructions to measure a frequency of the brain
 wave while monitoring the neural activity, the brain
 wave information including a frequency measurement;
 program instructions to determine brain wave location
 information from the localization of neural patterns, the
 brain wave information including the brain wave loca-
 tion information;
 program instructions to correlate the frequency measure-
 ment and the brain wave location information, with the
 memory functioning event; and
 program instructions to associate the brain wave infor-
 mation with the memory functioning event.

10. The computer program product of claim 9, further
 comprising:
 program instructions to construct the database, wherein
 the database stores the brain wave information inputs

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and the brain wave location information deriving from
 the neural inputs, with the memory functioning event;
 program instructions to correspond a validity value to the
 memory functioning event wherein the validity value is
 a first validity level for a first attribute and a second
 validity level for a second attribute; and
 program instructions to utilize the database for a search
 inquiry for a valid memory, wherein the valid memory
 has a high rank relative to other related memories in the
 database.

11. The computer program product of claim 10, wherein
 the validity value comprises at least two memory function-
 ing events, and wherein the at least two memory functioning
 events are ranked based on their associated attributes.

12. The computer program product of claim 10, further
 comprises:
 program instructions to, responsive to the search inquiry,
 output search results as a list with the brain wave
 information and corresponding memory functioning
 event based on the validity.

13. A computer system comprising:
 one or more computer processors;
 one or more computer readable storage media; and
 program instructions stored on the one or more computer
 readable storage media for execution by at least one of
 the one or more processors, the program instructions
 comprising:
 program instructions to monitor neural activity of a
 user while the user performs a memory functioning
 event via a user interface on a device;
 program instructions to record the memory functioning
 event as a set of individual memories;
 program instructions to capture the neural activity from
 neural inputs, the neural activity including brain
 wave information;
 program instructions to associate an individual memory
 of the memory functioning event with a correspond-
 ing neural activity at the time of the individual
 memory;
 program instructions to assign to the individual
 memory a wave type based on the brain wave
 information of the corresponding neural activity, the
 wave type being assigned from among a set of wave
 types including beta waves and theta waves;
 program instructions to rank, with a first rank, the
 individual memory according to the assigned wave
 type, the beta waves being ranked higher than the
 theta waves;
 program instructions to tag the individual memory with
 the first rank;
 program instructions to store the ranked and tagged
 individual memory in a database; and
 program instructions to retrieve the ranked and tagged
 individual memory, based on the tag and upon
 receiving one or more inquiries from the user.

14. The computer system of claim 13, wherein program
 instructions to capture the neural activity from neural inputs
 comprise:
 program instructions to collect brain wave activity by, at
 least, a magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) scan and an
 electroencephalogram (EEG) scan, wherein the EEG
 scan identifies a wave frequency associated with the
 memory functioning event and the MRI scan identifies
 a localization of neural patterns during the memory
 functioning event; and
 program instructions to receive the collected brain wave
 activity for further processing.

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15. The computer system of claim 14, wherein program instructions to assign the wave type comprise:

program instructions to measure a frequency of the brain wave while monitoring the neural activity, the brain wave information including a frequency measurement; 5
 program instructions to determine brain wave location information from the localization of neural patterns, the brain wave information including the brain wave location information;
 program instructions to correlate the frequency measurement and the brain wave location information, with the memory functioning event; and 10
 program instructions to associate the brain wave information with the memory functioning event.

16. The computer system of claim 15, further comprising: 15
 program instructions to construct the database, wherein the database stores the brain wave information inputs and the brain wave location information deriving from the neural inputs, with the memory functioning event;
 program instructions to correspond a validity value to the memory functioning event wherein the validity value is

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a first validity level for a first attribute and a second validity level for a second attribute; and

program instructions to utilize the database for a search inquiry for a valid memory, wherein the valid memory has a high rank relative to other related memories in the database.

17. The computer system of claim 16, wherein the validity value comprises at least two memory functioning events, and wherein the at least two memory functioning events are ranked based on their associated attributes.

18. The computer system of claim 16, further comprising: program instructions to, responsive to the search inquiry, output search results as a list with the brain wave information and corresponding memory functioning event based on the validity.

19. The method of claim 1, wherein monitoring neural comprises:

collecting brain wave activity by energy transference.

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摘要(译)

本发明的实施例提供用于执行信息的分析有效性排序的系统和方法。该方法利用诸如MRI，CT，PET，SPECT，EEG和MEG之类的技术来收集用户的认知事件，通过分析来分析用户的认知事件，并将用户的认知事件与排名相关联。该相关数据被发送到数据库，该数据库适合于将来对用户的认知事件的查询。搜索结果基于在未来某个时间点从数据库中检索准确搜索结果的有效性级别。基于脑波和从用户的认知事件导出的数据的位置来评估从用户的认知事件导出的数据的有效性和等级。具有更高有效性的数据排名更高并相应地标记。
