



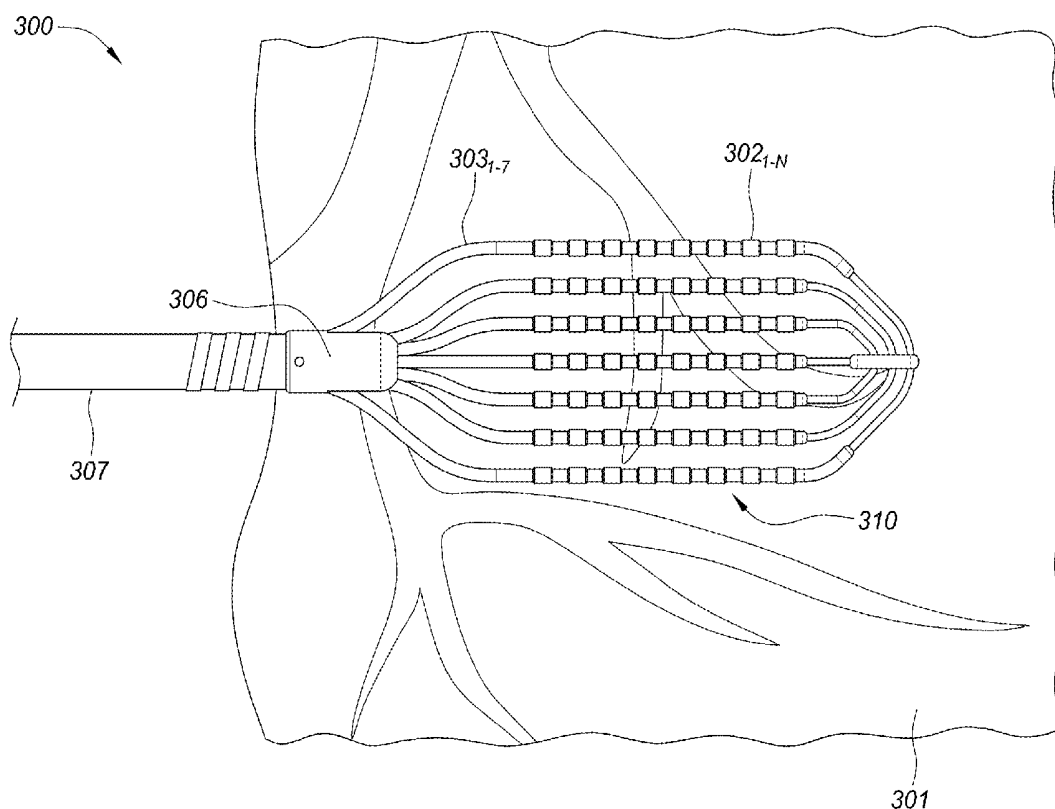

ABSTRACT

Aspects of the present disclosure are directed to flexible high-density mapping catheters with a planar array of high-density mapping electrodes near a distal tip portion. These mapping catheters may be used to detect electrophysiological characteristics of tissue in contact with the electrodes, and may be used to diagnose cardiac conditions, such as cardiac arrhythmias for example.



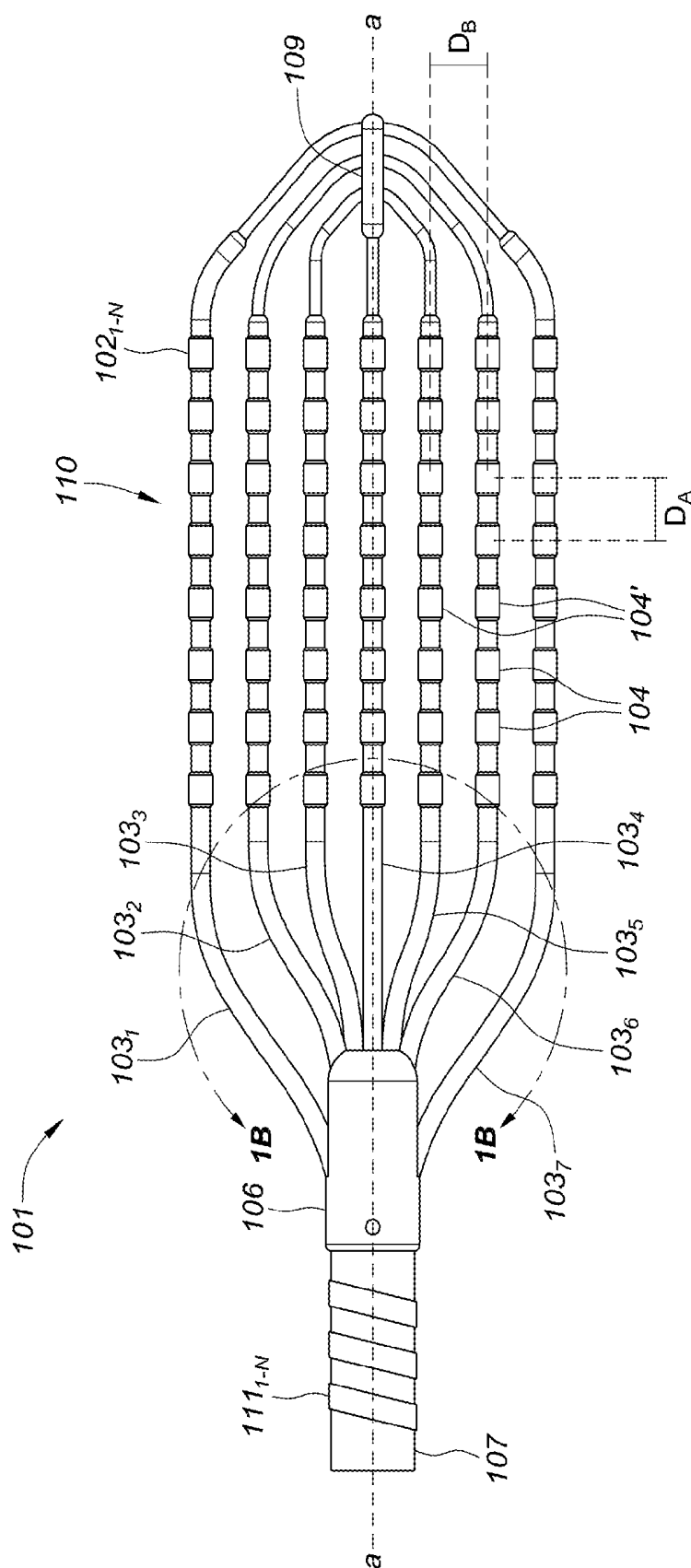

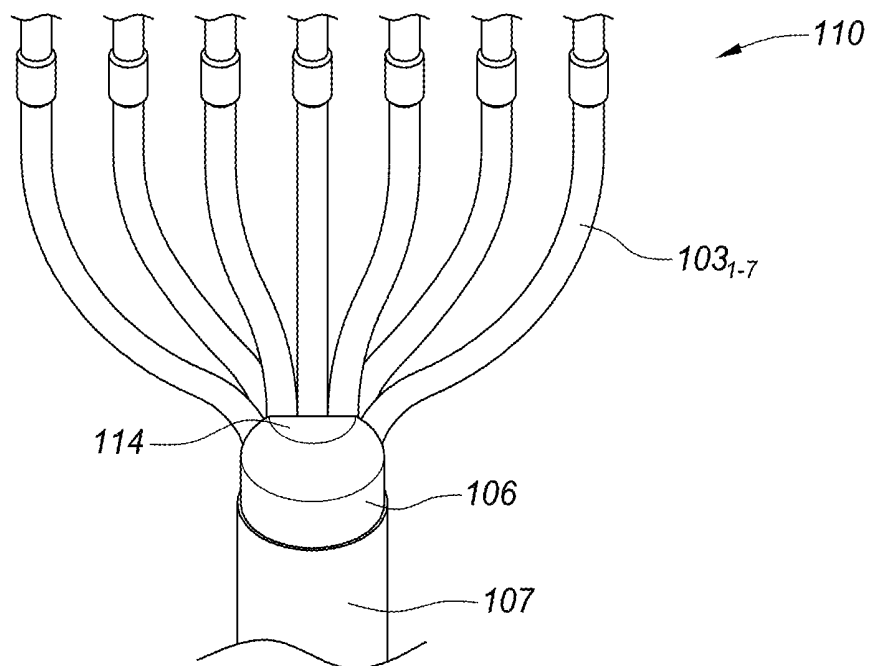

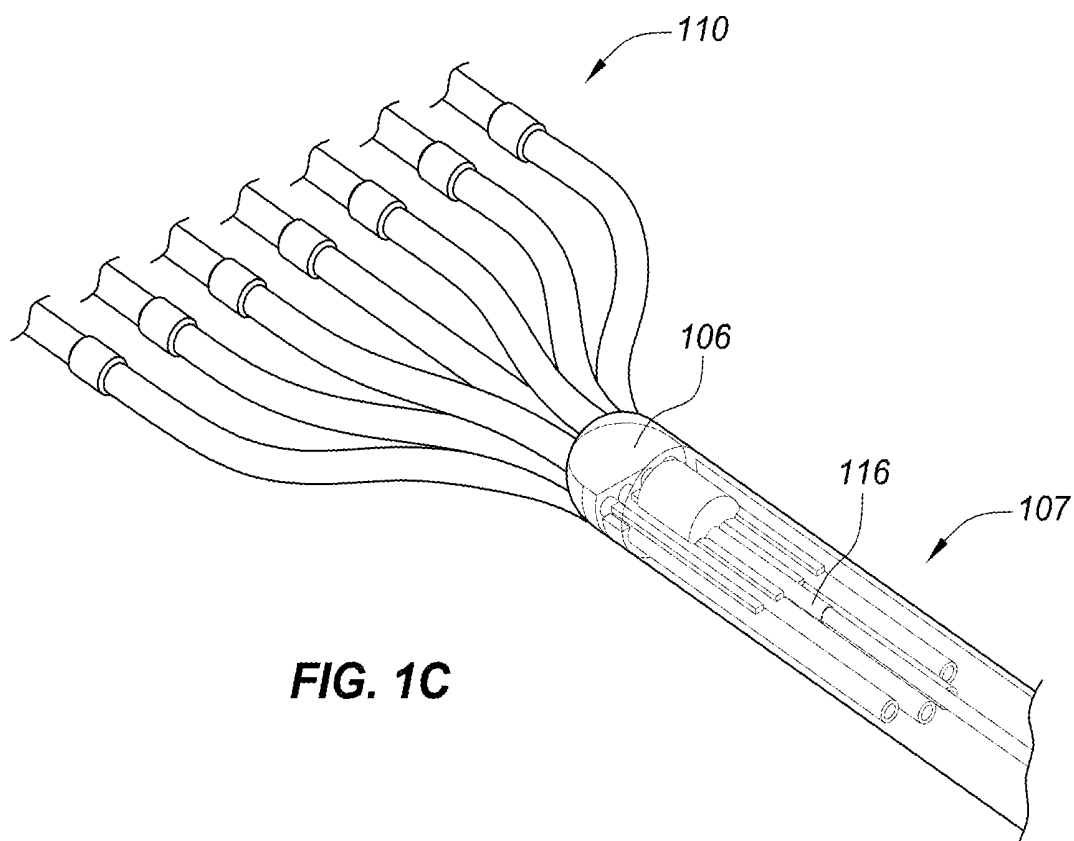

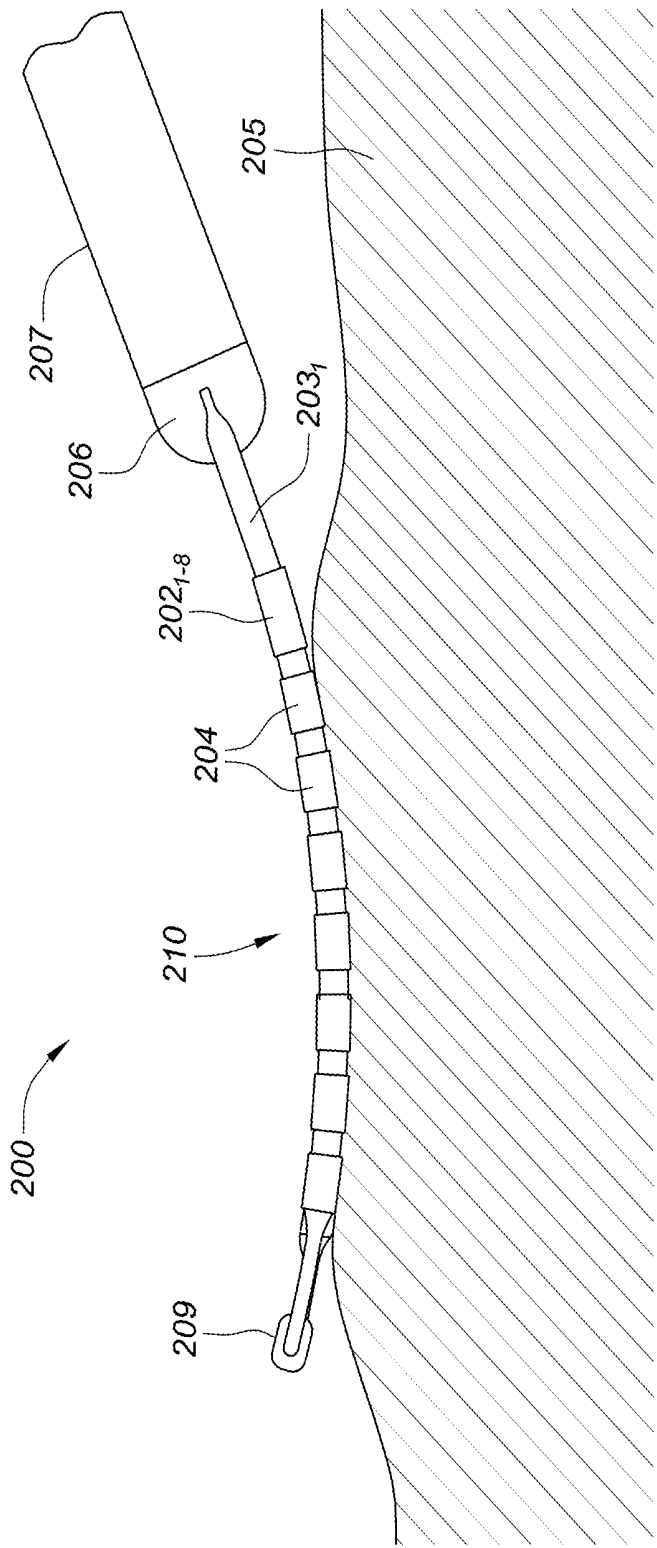

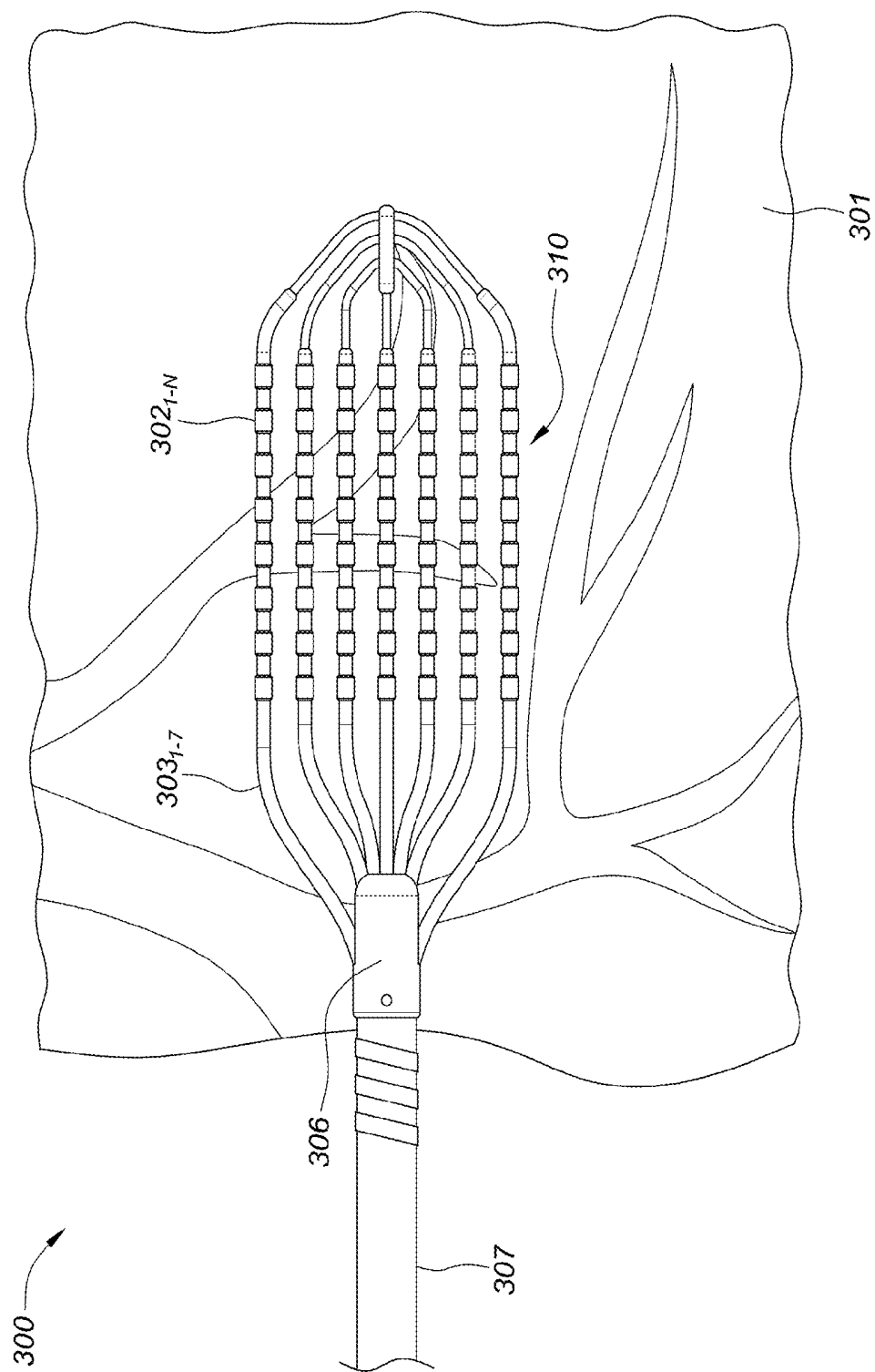

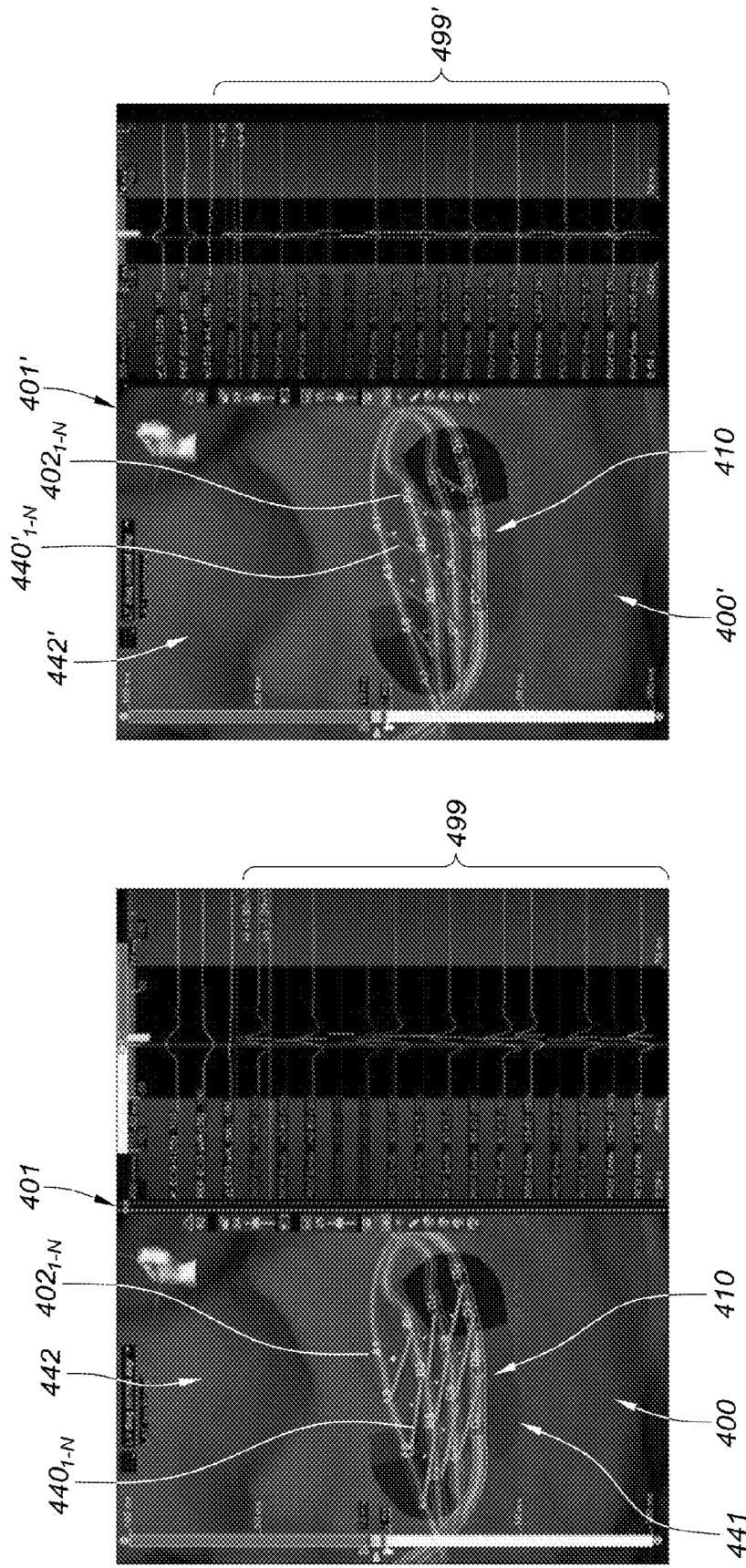

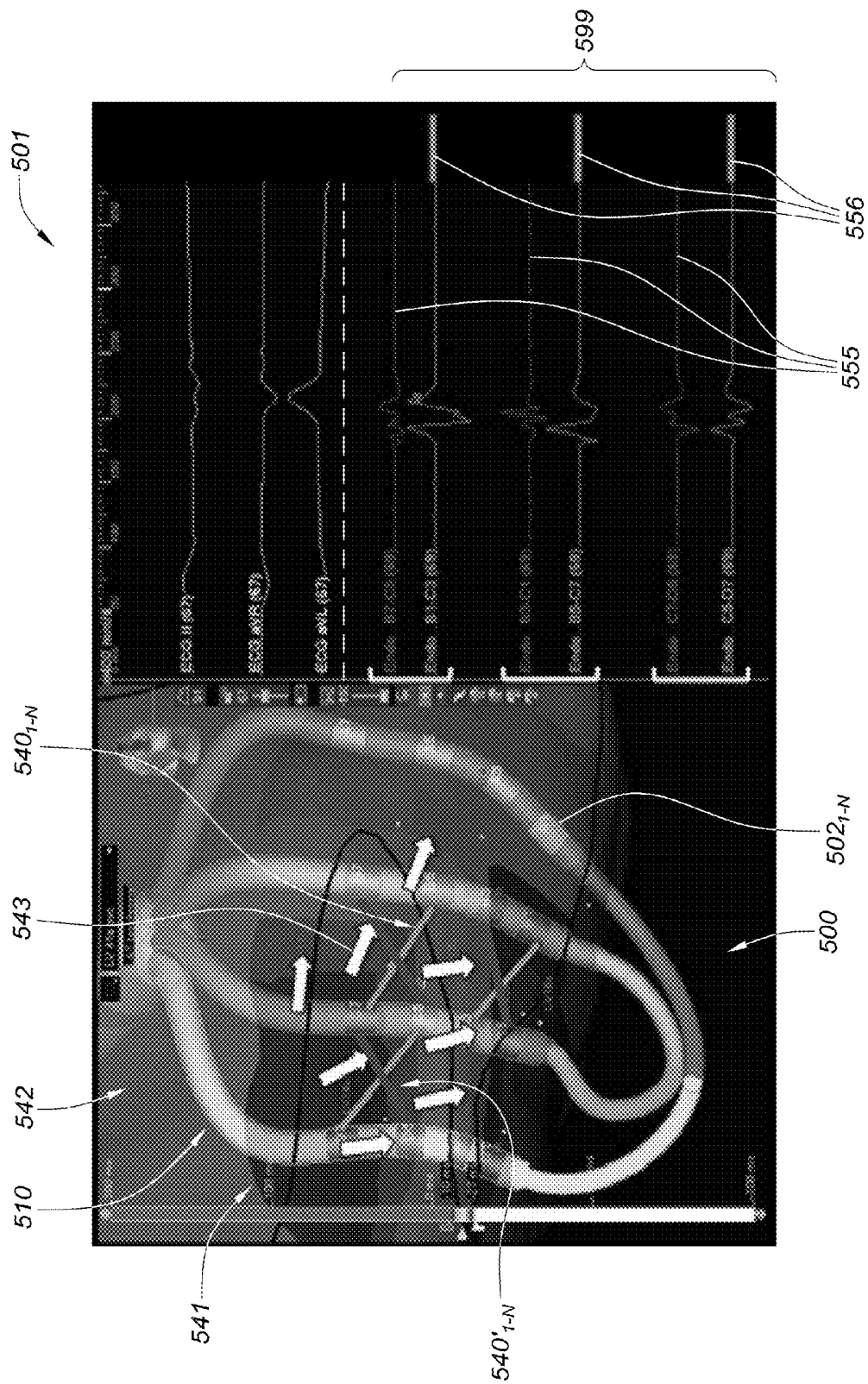

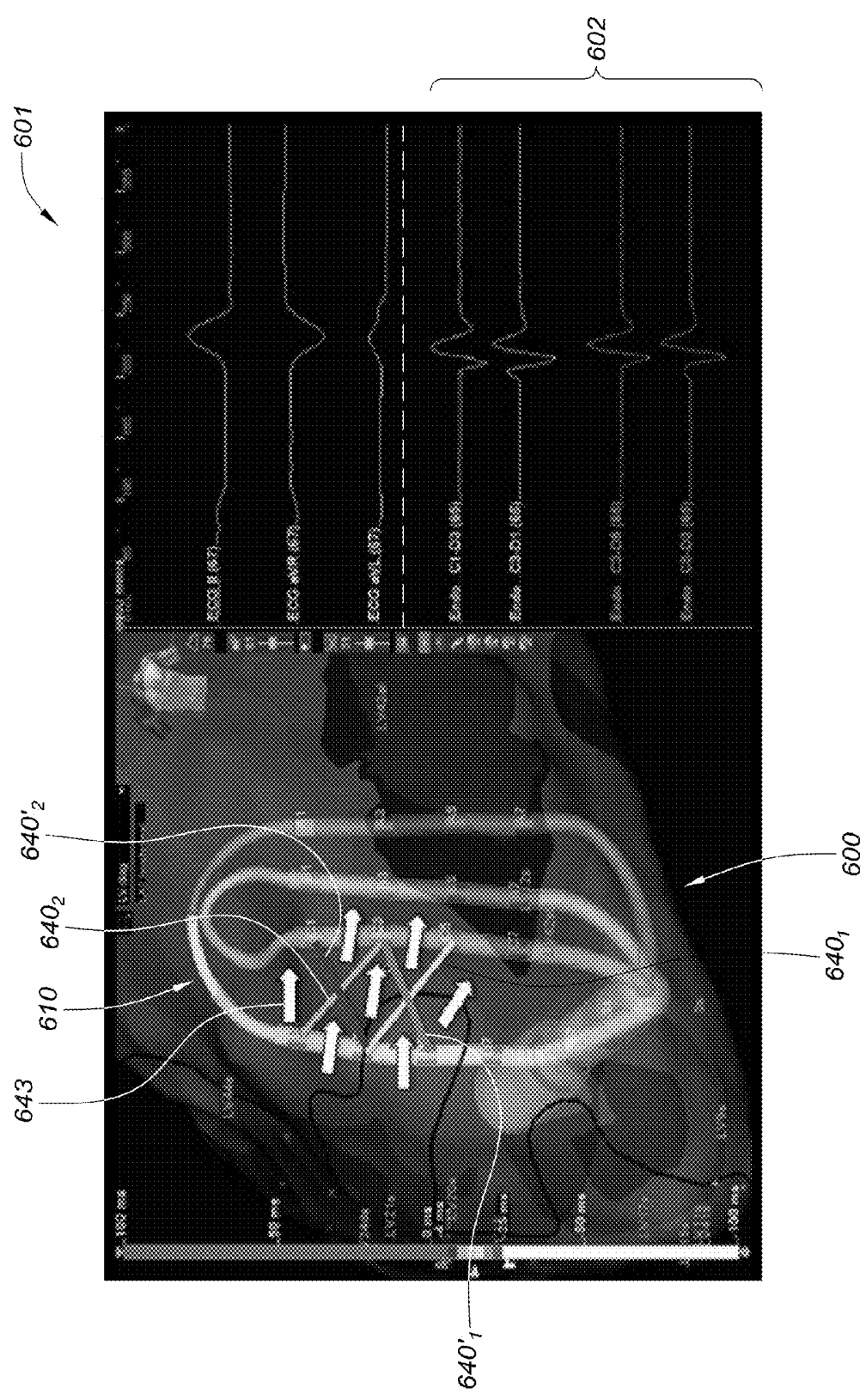

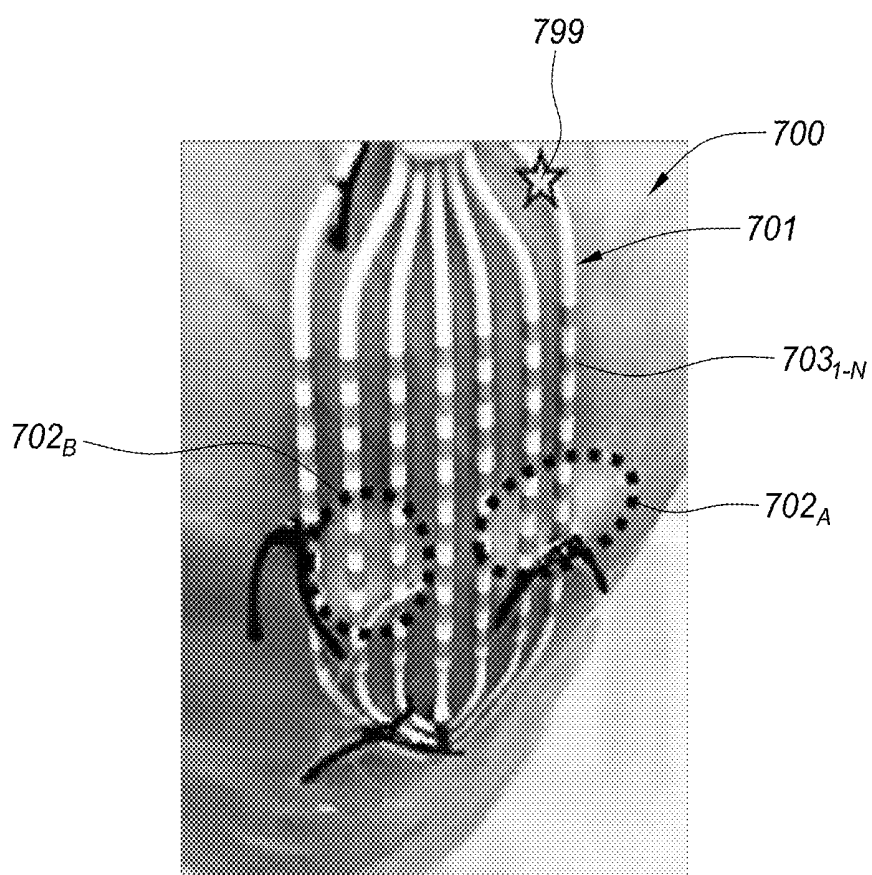

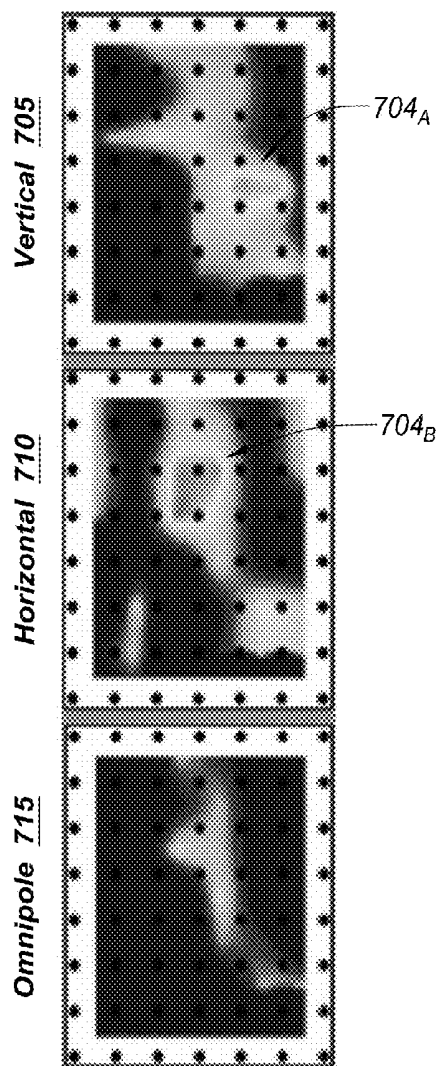

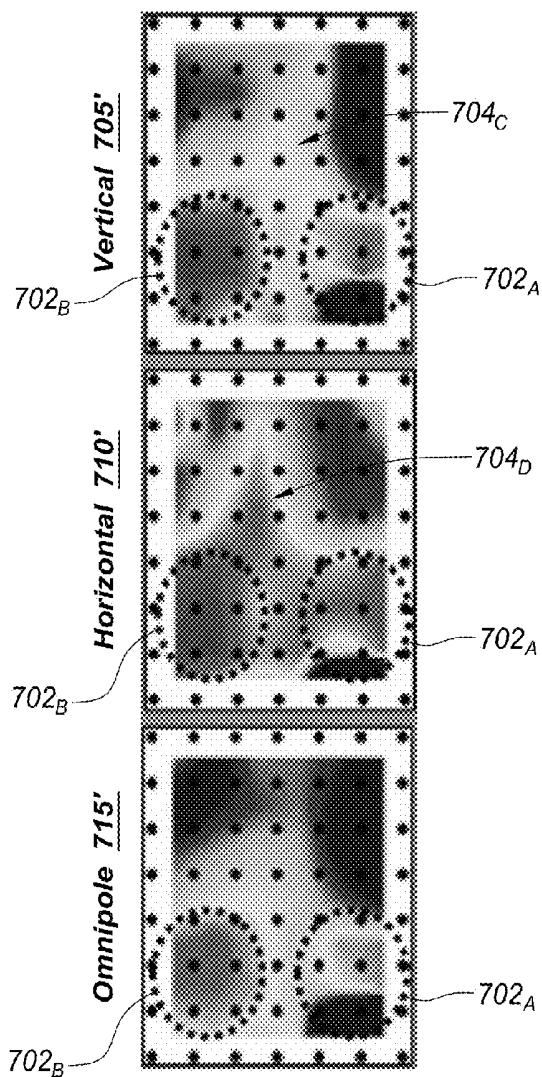

FLEXIBLE HIGH-DENSITY MAPPING CATHETER

CROSS-REFERENCE TO RELATED APPLICATIONS

[0001] This application claims priority to U.S. provisional application No. 62/414,634, filed 28 Oct. 2016, which is hereby incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein.

BACKGROUND

[0002] a. Field

[0003] The instant disclosure relates to high-density mapping catheters for diagnosing, for example, cardiac arrhythmias. In particular, the instant disclosure relates to flexible planar arrays including a plurality of electrodes positioned in a high-density array.

[0004] b. Background Art

[0005] Catheters have been used for cardiac medical procedures for many years. Catheters can be used, for example, to diagnose and treat cardiac arrhythmias, while positioned at a specific location within a body that is otherwise inaccessible without a more invasive procedure.

[0006] Conventional mapping catheters may include, for example, a plurality of adjacent ring electrodes encircling the longitudinal axis of the catheter and constructed from platinum or some other metal. These ring electrodes are relatively rigid. Similarly, conventional ablation catheters may comprise a relatively rigid tip electrode for delivering therapy (e.g., delivering RF ablation energy) and may also include a plurality of adjacent ring electrodes. It can be difficult to maintain good electrical contact with cardiac tissue when using these conventional catheters and their relatively rigid (or nonconforming), metallic electrodes, especially when sharp gradients and undulations are present.

[0007] When mapping a cardiac muscle, the beating of the heart, especially if erratic or irregular, makes it difficult to keep adequate contact between electrodes and tissue for a sufficient length of time. These problems are exacerbated on contoured, irregular, or trabeculated surfaces. If the contact between the electrodes and the tissue cannot be sufficiently maintained, quality lesions or accurate mapping are unlikely to result.

BRIEF SUMMARY

[0009] The instant disclosure relates to high-density mapping catheter tips for diagnosing, for example, cardiac arrhythmias. In particular, the instant disclosure relates to catheters with a planar array coupled to a distal end of a catheter shaft. The planar array includes a plurality of electrodes aligned in a high-density array to facilitate high-resolution electrophysiology mapping of tissue in contact with the plurality of electrodes.

[0010] Various embodiments of the present disclosure are directed to a planar array catheter including an elongated catheter shaft and a flexible, planar array. The elongated catheter shaft includes a proximal end and a distal end, and defines a catheter longitudinal axis extending between the proximal and distal ends. The flexible, planar array is coupled to the distal end of the catheter shaft, and includes

two or more arms extending substantially parallel with the longitudinal axis and laying in a plane. Each of the arms conforms to tissue and includes a plurality of electrodes mounted thereon. The plurality of electrodes are equally spaced along both a length of each arm and across adjacent arms. In some specific embodiments, the plurality of electrodes may sample electrical characteristics of contacted tissue in at least two substantially transverse directions.

[0011] Some aspects of the present disclosure are directed to an electrophysiology mapping system including a planar array catheter and controller circuitry. The planar array catheter includes a catheter shaft, and a flexible, planar array coupled to a distal end of the catheter shaft. The planar array conforms to tissue, and includes two or more arms extending substantially parallel with the longitudinal axis and laying in a plane. Each of the arms have a plurality of electrodes mounted thereon with equal spacing along a length of each arm and across adjacent arms. The controller circuitry is communicatively coupled to each of the plurality of electrodes, and samples electrical signals received from each of the plurality of electrodes. In specific embodiments, the plurality of electrodes sample electrical characteristics of the contacted tissue, and the controller circuitry processes the sampled electrical characteristics of the contacted tissue through an OIS/OT algorithm. The controller circuitry may produce an output indicative of the true electrical characteristics of the contacted tissue, independent of the orientation of the planar array catheter relative to the contacted tissue.

DETAILED DESCRIPTION OF EMBODIMENTS

[0028] Various embodiments of the present disclosure are directed to flexible, high-density mapping catheters. In general, the tip portions of these high-density mapping catheters comprise an underlying support framework that is adapted to conform to and remain in contact with tissue (e.g., a beating heart wall).

[0029] Aspects of the present disclosure are directed toward planar array catheters with substantially uniform spacing, and/or known and constant spacing, between electrodes which form bipole pairs for electrophysiology mapping. More advanced embodiments of the present disclosure may utilize orientation independent sensing/omnipolar technology (“OIS/OT”) and related algorithms to mitigate the need for substantially square electrode arrays. OIS/OT and related algorithms are discussed in more detail in U.S. provisional application No. 61/944,426, filed 25 Feb. 2014, U.S. application Ser. No. 15/118,522, filed 25 Feb. 2015, and international application no. PCT/US2014/011940, filed 16 Jan. 2014, which are hereby incorporated by referenced as though fully disclosed herein.

[0030] While some electrophysiology mapping catheters may consist of equally spaced electrodes along a length of a planar array arm, the present disclosure is directed toward planar arrays with equal spacing of electrodes along both a length of the arms of the array, as well as between arms (i.e., x and y directions).

[0031] In some specific aspects of the present disclosure a planar array catheter including 7 arms is disclosed. Each of the arms may be aligned with, and extend parallel to, a

longitudinal axis of the catheter shaft. Each arm is coupled to the other arms of the planar array at proximal and distal ends. The arms each include a row of electrodes extending along a length of the arm. The electrodes are evenly distributed along the length of the arm and between adjacent arms of the planar array.

[0032] Uniform spacing between adjacent electrodes in an array (in two or more directions) facilitates simplified and robust OIS/OT-like assessments of orientation-specific electrical characteristics of myocardial tissue, for example. In some embodiments, orthogonal and identical spacing directly permits 2-directional assessments of electrical activation direction and maximum voltage amplitude of sampled tissue. Moreover, uniform electrode spacing allows for the use of diagonal bipole pairs which are orthogonal (relative to one another), and substantially measure the electrical characteristics of the same tissue area. The variation in readings between the orthogonal bipole pairs may be attributed to orientation-specific electrical characteristics of the contacted tissue. Embodiments of the present disclosure may further facilitate reduced complexity decimation by skipping intermediate electrodes, and forming bipole pairs with larger electrode spacing configurations than created by adjacent electrodes in the array. Decimation may be used to determine electrical characteristics of tissue at a less granular resolution. Further, a clinician may assess situational performance of the planar array at various bipole spacings. In various embodiments consistent with the present disclosure, adjacent bipole pairs may have various spacings, and be oriented in such a way as to facilitate various spatial orientations relative to one another.

[0033] The benefits of equal electrode spacing along two or more perpendicular directions include an effective and simplified compensation scheme for signals received from a clique (group) of electrodes, and six degrees of freedom (“DOF”) orientation and position information in an impedance-based navigation system’s coordinate frame (e.g., the NavX™ navigation system manufactured by St. Jude Medical, Inc.). The six DOF orientation and position information may be based on the determined position of the electrodes within the patient’s body. A simplified computation of the electric field vector for cliques may be determined based only on average bipole voltages in the x, y (and possibly z) directions. Equal electrode spacing may also facilitate OIS/OT-like methods that generate bipolar electrogram signals at various orientations with respect to wavefronts, so that a clinician may employ arbitrary catheter orientations. Finally, the equal electrode spacing of the array facilitates a balanced and integrated view of voltage, fractionation, and/or activation patterns, which may be readily sampled from adjacent electrodes with known/equal spacing. This information may then be used to compute a divergence and curl (i.e., to detect/locate foci and rotor cores from activation directions).

[0034] In some specific embodiments of an electrophysiology planar array catheter in accordance with the present disclosure, the planar array may include 7 arms, each arm having 8 electrodes extending along a length of the arm with 2 millimeter (“mm”) spacing. The spacing between electrodes of adjacent arms also being 2 mm.

[0035] The electrodes disclosed herein may be ring electrodes, and/or printed electrodes on substrates (e.g., flexible circuit boards). Advantageously, printed electrodes may be spaced more closely than ring electrodes. In some embodiments, for example, printed electrodes spaced 0.1 mm apart

have been successfully deployed in a planar array catheter. More typically, ring electrodes and printed electrodes have been advantageously spaced 0.5 mm to 4 mm apart. It has been found that such electrode spacing facilitates desirable electrophysiology mapping granularity in a number of cardiovascular applications, for example.

[0036] Short interelectrode spacing (e.g., 2 mm×2 mm) may be desirable to sample electrical characteristics of tissue (e.g., voltages) indicative of ablation line gaps. In testing, embodiments of the present disclosure including short inter-electrode spacings of the electrode array detected ablation line gaps via the sampling of low voltage paths between lesions only separated by a few millimeters. Prior art electrophysiology mapping arrays, which lack the high-density electrode array and OIS/OT algorithm-based electrogram signal processing of the present disclosure, are not capable of detecting such minute ablation line gaps.

[0037] Aspects of the present disclosure are directed toward planar array catheters and basket catheters for electrophysiology mapping. More specifically, many embodiments of the present disclosure utilize printed circuit boards (e.g., flexible printed circuit boards) to form the planar array arms and/or basket splines. Further, aspects of the present disclosure include a plurality of electrodes positioned along the planar array arms and/or basket splines. In such embodiments, the planar array arms and/or basket splines may have electrodes conductively coupled to the flexible circuit board (s) that at least partially comprise structures of the arms and/or splines. The resulting cliques (or groups) of independently addressable electrodes facilitate electrophysiology measurements of tissue, in contact with the electrodes, which are orientation independent. That is, measurements may be taken across bipole pairs of electrodes within each clique (with a known distance therebetween) to capture measurements in at least two orientations. In more advanced 3D electrogram analysis, electrophysiology measurements may be captured in all three orientations. In some embodiments, it may be desirable for the electrodes of a clique to be placed equidistant one another to facilitate enhanced electrogram fidelity. This equidistant positioning of electrodes on a flexible circuit board may be accomplished by existing circuit board assembly techniques (e.g., surface mount technology component placement systems, commonly referred to as “pick-and-place” machines and circuit board printing techniques).

[0038] Conventional mapping catheter designs employ bipole electrode configurations to detect, measure, and display electrical signals from the heart. However, such conventional mapping catheter designs may be prone to error associated with the orientation of the bipole electrode pairs relative to an electrical wavefront of the heart, and result in displayed signals and mapping results that may be orientation dependent, and may not actually reflect the true (or desired) tissue properties. To mitigate this risk, aspects of the present disclosure are directed to signal processing techniques which may sample a plurality of bipole electrode pair configurations, with varying orientations, to produce accurate electrophysiology mapping results. To facilitate such signal processing techniques, electrophysiology mapping catheters consistent with the present disclosure (e.g., linear, planar array, and basket) may utilize cliques of electrodes that maintain spacing throughout various tissue contact configurations.

[0039] Inventors of the present disclosure have discovered that certain bipole electrode pair arrangements, such as those aligned with an activation direction of the electrical signals within the heart, show large amplitude signals reflecting depolarization traveling through normal or near normal tissue in contact with the bipole electrodes. Other alignments of the bipole pairs, for example, where the bipole pairs are aligned perpendicular to an activation direction of the electrical signals, or near scar tissue, may show lower amplitude fractionated signals. Various aspects of the present disclosure are directed to OIS/OT-like signal processing algorithms which separate signal amplitude and signal directionality despite poorly controlled catheter-wavefront orientation of the planar array.

[0040] For example, a first bipole pair of electrodes in an example clique samples an electrical signal passing through the contact tissue in an x-orientation, and a second bipole pair of electrodes in the clique samples a second electrical signal passing through the contact tissue in a y-orientation. Signal processing circuitry may then be used to determine the true 2-dimensional electrical signal for that location. The two bipole pairs, though substantially in the same location and in contact with the same tissue volume, may sample different electrical characteristics of the tissue due to the directionality of the electrical activation wavefronts traveling through the heart. For example, the electrical activation wavefronts that typically emanate from a sinoatrial node, and atrioventricular node. However, interfering electrical signals may also emanate from one or more of the pulmonary veins (e.g., arithmetic foci in the pulmonary vein(s)).

[0041] Importantly, to facilitate determination of important electrical characteristics of the tissue (e.g., impedance), the distance between a first bipole pair and the distance between a second bipole pair must be known and constant. In FIGS. 1A-C, the spacing of electrodes **102**_{1-N} on arms **103**₁₋₇ are precise and constant. Furthermore, in various embodiments it may be desirable for the distance between the two sets of bipole pairs for a clique to be the same.

[0042] The use of high-density electrode arrays, disclosed herein, facilitates the sampling of voltage measurements, for example, that are independent of effects associated with relative orientation of the catheter and electrical wavefront, making electrophysiology mapping of a cardiac muscle (and scar borders) much more reliable and precise. Moreover, embodiments of the present disclosure benefit from the collection of electrical signal timing information which is substantially independent from the electrode distribution. The high-density array of electrodes may also be used to verify sampled electrical signals from bipole pairs, by comparing the sampled electrical signal with other electrical signals sampled from adjacent (or nearby) bipole pairs. The regular spacing of electrodes in the high-density array further improves the accuracy of various metrics which are output from the OIS/OT algorithms and/or other signal processing techniques; for example, the En value (the estimate of the perpendicular bipole signal), an output of the Laplace equation, activation direction, conduction velocity, etc. Such aspects of the present disclosure are disclosed in more detail in U.S. provisional application No. 61/944,426, filed 25 Feb. 2014, U.S. application Ser. No. 15/118,522, filed 25 Feb. 2015, and international application no. PCT/US2014/011940, filed 16 Jan. 2014, which are hereby incorporated by referenced as though fully disclosed herein.

[0043] Details of the various embodiments of the present disclosure are described below with specific reference to the figures.

[0044] FIG. 1A is a plan view of a planar array of an electrophysiology mapping catheter 101 including a high-density array of electrodes 102_{1-N}, consistent with various embodiments of the present disclosure. The mapping catheter 101 includes a flexible tip portion 110 (also referred to as a planar array) that forms a flexible array of the electrodes 102_{1-N}. This array of electrodes 102_{1-N} is coupled to a flexible framework of seven arms 103₁₋₇ which extend in a plane that is substantially parallel with a longitudinal axis of catheter shaft 107. Each of the arms is precisely, laterally separated from each other to facilitate exact spacing between electrodes 102_{1-N} on adjacent arms 103₁₋₇, and the arms are coupled to one another at a distal and proximal end of the flexible tip portion 110 (e.g., at a distal tip 109 and bushing 106).

[0045] As shown in FIG. 1A, each of the seven arms 103₁₋₇ may carry a plurality of electrodes 102, with the spacing between each electrode being the same (or at least known). Similarly, the spacing between electrodes 102 on adjacent arms 103 of the array may also be equal. As shown by way of example, electrodes within a bipole pair 104 have a center-to-center spacing of D_A , and electrodes within a bipole pair 104', that is oriented substantially orthogonal relative to bipole pair 104, have a center-to-center spacing of D_B , where $D_A > D_B$. For example, in some embodiments the center-to-center electrode spacing may be between 0.5-4 mm. In yet more specific embodiments, the center-to-center electrode spacing may be less than 0.5 millimeters (e.g., 0.1 mm). While the present embodiment is directed to electrode pairs with equal center-to-center spacing, various other embodiments of an electrode array consistent with the present disclosure may include an electrode array with equal edge-to-edge spacing. For example, in some embodiments the edge-to-edge electrode spacing may be between 0.5-4 mm. In yet more specific embodiments, the edge-to-edge electrode spacing may be less than 0.5 millimeters (e.g., 0.1 mm). Consideration of edge-to-edge spacing may be desirable where the electrodes of the array have different relative sizes (or surface areas).

[0046] Although the electrophysiology mapping catheter 101 in FIGS. 1A-C depicts seven arms, the catheters may comprise more or less arms, with spacing between each respective arm based on a desired electrode spacing for a given electrophysiology application. Additionally, while the electrophysiology mapping catheter 101 depicted in FIGS. 1A-C shows 56 electrodes (e.g., 8 electrodes 102 on each arm 103), the catheters may include more or fewer than 56 electrodes, and each arm need not have the same number of electrodes as adjacent arms.

[0047] In some embodiments, the electrodes 102_{1-N} can be used in diagnostic, therapeutic, and/or mapping procedures. For example and without limitation, the electrodes 102 may be used for electrophysiological studies, pacing, cardiac mapping, and ablation. In some embodiments, the electrodes 102 can perform unipolar or bipolar ablation (e.g., via the use of bipole pairs of electrodes 104 and 104'). This unipolar or bipolar ablation can create specific lines or patterns of lesions. In some embodiments, the electrodes 102 can receive electrical signals from the heart, which can be used for electrophysiological studies. Importantly, as the electrode spacing between adjacent electrodes on an arm 103,

and those on adjacent arms, are the same, bipole pairs 104 and 104' with varying relative orientations may be sampled to determine electrical characteristics of the tissue in contact with the bipole pairs. The sampled electrical characteristics may be processed to remove catheter orientation-based signal effects. In some embodiments, the electrodes 102 can perform a location or position sensing function related to cardiac mapping; alternatively, ring electrodes 111 on a distal end of the catheter shaft 107 may be used to determine location and/or orientation of the catheter 101.

[0048] The flexible tip portion 110 of the catheter 101 is coupled to a distal end of a catheter shaft 107 at a bushing 106 (also referred to as a connector). The catheter shaft 107 may also define a catheter shaft longitudinal axis aa, as depicted in FIG. 1A. In the present embodiment, each of the arms 103 extend parallel to the longitudinal axis aa. The catheter shaft 107 may be made of a flexible material, such that it can be threaded through a tortuous vasculature of a patient. In some embodiments, the catheter shaft 107 can include one or more ring electrodes 111 disposed along a length of the catheter shaft 107. The ring electrodes 111 may be used for diagnostic, therapeutic, localization and/or mapping procedures, for example.

[0049] The planar array 110 may be adapted to conform to tissue (e.g., cardiac tissue). For example, when the planar array 110 contacts tissue, each arm 103₁₋₇ may independently deflect to conform to the tissue. The ability for the planar array to deflect in response to tissue may be particularly beneficial when the planar array comes into contact with contoured, irregular, or trabeculated tissue. In some embodiments, the arms (or the understructure of the arms) may be constructed from a flexible or spring-like material such as nitinol and/or a flexible substrate. The construction of the planar array arms 103₁₋₇ (including, for example, the length and/or diameter of the arms, and material) may be adjusted or tailored to achieve desired resiliency, flexibility, foldability, conformability, and stiffness characteristics. Moreover, in some embodiments it may be desirable to vary one or more characteristics from the proximal end of an arm to the distal end of the arm, or between or among the plurality of arms forming the planar array 110. The foldability of materials such as nitinol and/or a flexible substrate provides the added benefit of facilitating insertion of the planar array into a delivery sheath or introducer, whether during delivery of the catheter into the body or removal of the catheter from the body at the end of a procedure.

[0050] Planar array catheters including the high-density electrode array positioned thereon may be used for, for example: (1) defining regional propagation maps of particularly sized areas (e.g., one centimeter square areas) on the walls of the heart; (2) identifying complex fractionated atrial electrograms for ablation; (3) identifying localized, focal potentials between the microelectrodes for higher electrogram resolution; and/or (4) more precisely targeting areas for ablation. Electrophysiology mapping catheters, in accordance with the present disclosure, may be constructed to conform to, and remain in contact with, cardiac tissue despite potentially erratic cardiac motion. Such enhanced stability of the catheter on a heart wall during cardiac motion provides more accurate mapping due to sustained tissue-electrode contact. Additionally, the catheters described herein may find application in epicardial and/or endocardial use. For example, the planar array embodiments depicted herein may be used in epicardial procedures where the

planar array of electrodes is positioned between the myocardial surface and the pericardium. Alternatively the planar array embodiments may be used in an endocardial procedure to sweep and/or analyze the inner surfaces of the myocardium and create high-density maps of the heart tissue's electrical properties.

[0051] While various embodiments of the planar array **110** disclosed in the present disclosure are depicted with ring electrodes **102**_{1-N} coupled to the arms **103**₁₋₇ (e.g., FIGS. 1A-C), embodiments with spot-type electrodes coupled to the arms are readily envisioned. Moreover, in yet further embodiments, the arms of the planar array may comprise flexible thin films compatible with printed circuit manufacturing techniques and/or have such thin films coupled to structural elements of the arm (e.g., nitinol-based arms). In such embodiments, spot-type electrodes may be printed onto the arms themselves. In flexible printed circuit embodiments of the present disclosure, the printed electrodes may be electrically coupled to signal processing circuitry and/or driver circuitry via traces extending on or within the one or more thin film layers. As many electrophysiology mapping applications require high signal fidelity, it is desirable to limit the transmission length of the analog signal, shield the transmission line itself, and/or convert the analog signal to a digital signal close to the source of the analog signal. Accordingly, aspects of the present disclosure are directed to placing signal processing circuitry (e.g., analog-to-digital converters, signal conditioning such as noise filtration and bandpass filters), and/or driver circuitry on the arms **103**₁₋₇ or in close proximity thereto.

[0052] In embodiments of the planar array including ring electrodes, the ring electrodes of the high-density electrode array may include the same type of electrode or a variety of various electrode types. For example, electrodes with smaller surface area may be used exclusively for electrophysiology mapping, while larger surface area electrodes may be used for mapping, tissue ablation, and/or localization. In some specific embodiments, a most-distal ring electrode **102** on a first outboard arm **103**₁ may be slightly enlarged as is the most-proximal ring electrode on a second outboard arm **103**₇. These slightly enlarged electrodes may be used, for example, for more precise localization of the flexible array in mapping and navigation systems. It may also be possible to drive ablation current between these enlarged electrodes, if desired, for bipolar ablation, or, alternatively to drive ablation current in unipolar mode between one or both of these enlarged ring electrodes and, for example, a patch electrode located on a patient (e.g., on the patient's back). Similarly, the electrodes **102**_{1-N} in some embodiments may all be capable of performing unipolar or bipolar ablation therapies. Alternatively or concurrently, current could travel between one or more of the enlarged electrodes and any one or all of the electrodes. This unipolar or bipolar ablation therapy technique may be used to create specific lesion lines or lesion patterns. As also seen in FIG. 1A, there may be a distal member (or 'button') **109** where one or more of the arms **103**₁₋₇ come together. This distal member **109** may be constructed from metal or some other radiopaque material to provide fluoroscopy visualization. The distal member **109** may further facilitate (semi-)independent planar movement between the arms **103**₁₋₇.

[0053] FIG. 1B is an enlarged, fragmentary view of a proximal portion of the planar array **110** of FIG. 1A, consistent with various embodiments of the present disclosure.

In some embodiments of the present disclosure, the planar array catheter may include one or more irrigant ports directed toward the planar array. For example, in FIG. 1B, a distal tip **109** of the catheter shaft **107** may be fitted with one or more irrigant ports directed toward the arms **103**₁₋₇ of the array. The bushing **106** at the distal end of the catheter shaft **107** couples each of the arms **103** to the catheter shaft **107**. In yet more specific embodiments, one or more of the arms **103** may include fluid lumens that extend to irrigant ports positioned along a length of one or more arms, and/or may extend to a distal tip **109** (as shown in FIG. 1A) where one or more irrigant ports are directed distally toward the planar array **110**.

[0054] FIG. 1C is an isometric view of the planar array portion **110** shown in FIG. 1B with hidden lines showing a distal portion of the catheter shaft **107**. As shown in FIG. 1C, a sensor **116** (e.g., an impedance-based location sensor, a magnetic-based location sensor, etc.) is mounted within/on the catheter shaft proximal to a bushing **106**. A variety of sensors may be implemented at this location, or at other locations, of the various high-density mapping catheters described herein. These sensors **116** may be mounted in the catheter shaft **107**, as shown in FIG. 1C, or may be mounted at other locations (e.g., along the electrode carrying arms **103**₁₋₇ of the high-density electrophysiology mapping catheter and/or at the distal tip **109**. In some specific embodiments, the planar array may include two or more location sensors positioned on or about the planar array to facilitate improved position and orientation identification of the planar array within a patient. In one embodiment, the sensor **116** is a magnetic field sensor configured for use with an electromagnetic localization system such as the MediGuide™ System sold by St. Jude Medical, Inc. of St. Paul, Minn.

[0055] FIG. 2 depicts a planar array catheter **200** including an array **210** of electrodes **202**₁₋₈ contacting tissue **205**. The tissue **205** in the present embodiment is depicted as trabeculated, irregular, or contoured tissue. As shown in FIG. 2, the flexible arms of the planar array, including flexible arm **203**₁, conforms to the tissue **205**, enabling a physician to place the planar array **210** (and its electrodes **202**₁₋₈) into constant contact with the tissue **205**. As a result, the electrical signals (indicative of the tissue's electrical activity) sampled by the planar array exhibit enhanced accuracy, and thereby have improved diagnostic value. Each of the flexible arms **203**₁ include a plurality of electrodes **202**₁₋₈ which form cliques **204**, and are coupled to the other adjacent arms of the planar array **210** at distal member **209** and bushing **206**. The bushing **206** further couples the planar array **210** to shaft **207**.

[0056] FIG. 3 depicts a high-density mapping catheter **300** overlaying vasculature **301**. In some embodiments of the present disclosure, the catheter **300** may include steering wires which extend a length of catheter shaft **307**. Prior to reaching a bushing **306** that couples the catheter shaft **307** to arms **303**₁₋₇ of planar array **310**, the steering wires may be coupled to steering rings which receive a tension from a proximal end of the steering wires and facilitates steering the catheter shaft **307** and the planar array **310** through a patient's vasculature. As further shown in FIG. 3, each of the arms **303**₁₋₇ includes a plurality of electrodes **302**_{1-N} distributed along a length of the arms. In the present embodiment, each of the electrodes are equally spaced from each of its adjacent electrodes. When controller circuitry samples elec-

trical signals from bipole pairs of electrodes within the planar array 310, each of the bipole pairs will detect various electrical characteristics indicative of the tissue health in contact with the electrodes. The seven arms 303₁₋₇ are designed to maintain the electrodes 302_{1-N} in a spaced relationship so that each electrode captures electrophysiology data of tissue at a known location relative to the other electrodes in the array.

[0057] FIG. 4A depicts an electrophysiology mapping interface 401, consistent with various embodiments of the present disclosure. The electrophysiology mapping interface 401 includes a plurality of real-time electrophysiology data streams 499 from various bipole pairs of electrodes across a planar array. A planar array visualization portion 400 of the interface 401 presents a representation of the planar array 410. The representation of the planar array 410 may utilize localization data to orient and position the planar array within a rendering of the cardiac muscle for example. Moreover, portions of the planar array in contact with tissue may be visually indicated in the planar array visualization 400. The green lines extending between electrodes 402_{1-N} on adjacent arms of the planar array 410 are indicative of a first configuration of bipole electrode pairs 440_{1-N}. The electrical signals measured by the bipole pairs 440_{1-N} presented in the real-time electrophysiology data streams 499. In the present embodiment, the electrical activation direction within the tissue in contact with the planar array 410 extends from a left-side of the visualization to the right-side. Accordingly, the bipole pairs 440_{1-N} are substantially aligned with the activation direction, resulting in electrogram data 499 from the bipole pairs 440_{1-N} with relatively high amplitudes. This data is indicative of the true electrical characteristics of the tissue in contact with the planar array 410.

[0058] Upon receiving and processing electrogram data from the various bipole pairs of electrodes, the visualization 400 may be updated to color-code 441 a surface of the cardiac muscle model displayed in the visualization (often referred to as an electrophysiology map). The electrophysiology map may facilitate diagnosis by a clinician. For example, the clinician may use the mapped electrophysiology data to diagnose a cardiac arrhythmia (e.g., atrial fibrillation). To enable relative placement of the color-coded data 441 on the cardiac muscle model 442 in the visualization, controller circuitry associates the electrogram data from each bipole pair 440_{1-N} with a location the data was collected. Determination of the planar array's position within a cardiac muscle may be facilitated by an impedance-based, electromagnetic, and/or hybrid localization system.

[0059] FIG. 4B depicts an electrophysiology mapping interface 401', consistent with various embodiments of the present disclosure. The electrophysiology mapping interface 401' includes a plurality of real-time electrophysiology data streams 499' from various bipole pairs of electrodes 440'_{1-N} across a planar array 410. A planar array visualization 400' portion of the interface 401' presents a representation of the planar array 410. The representation of the planar array 410 may utilize localization data to orient and position the planar array within a rendering of the cardiac muscle 442', for example. Moreover, portions of the planar array 410 in contact with tissue may be visually indicated in the planar array visualization 400'. The red lines extending between electrodes 402_{1-N} on adjacent arms of the planar array 410 are indicative of a second configuration of bipole electrode pairs 440'_{1-N}. The electrical signals measured by the second

configuration of bipole pairs are presented in the real-time electrophysiology data streams 499'. The data streams for each of the bipole pairs are collected simultaneously. In the present embodiment, the electrical activation direction within the tissue in contact with the planar array 410 extends from a left-side of the visualization to the right-side. Accordingly, the bipole pairs 440'_{1-N} extend substantially orthogonal to the activation direction, resulting in electrogram data from the bipole pairs 440'_{1-N} with relatively low amplitudes. This data is not indicative of the true electrical characteristics (e.g., maximal bipole amplitude characteristics) of the tissue in contact with the bipole pairs.

[0060] FIG. 5 depicts an electrophysiology mapping interface 501, consistent with various embodiments of the present disclosure. The electrophysiology mapping interface 501 includes a plurality of real-time electrophysiology data streams 599 from various bipole pairs of electrodes across a planar array 510. A planar array visualization portion 500 of the interface 501 presents a representation of the planar array. As shown in FIG. 5, the representation of the planar array utilizes localization data to orient and position the planar array within a rendering of a cardiac muscle 542. The arrows are illustrative of an activation direction 543 of the electrical signals travelling through the cardiac muscle. The green lines extending between electrodes 502_{1-N} on adjacent arms of the planar array 510 are illustrative of a first configuration of bipole electrode pairs 540_{1-N}. The electrical signals measured by the first configuration of bipole pairs 540_{1-N} are presented as the green electrophysiology data streams 556. The red lines extending between electrodes 502_{1-N} on adjacent arms of the planar array are illustrative of a second configuration of bipole electrode pairs 540'_{1-N}. The electrical signals measured by the second configuration of bipole pairs 540'_{1-N} are presented as the red electrophysiology data streams 555.

[0061] The electrophysiology data streams 556 of the first bipole pairs 540_{1-N} show an increase in signal amplitude from the top left of the planar array 510 to the bottom right. The larger amplitude signals are indicative of depolarization traveling through normal or near normal myocardial tissue in contact with the bipole electrodes. Accordingly, the top-left of the planar array is color-coded 541 red to indicate less healthy tissue, with the more healthy tissue to the right and bottom of the screen being coded with greens and blues to indicate more healthy tissue. The red coded tissue may be (near) scar tissue, for example, and may be a point of interest for clinicians.

[0062] The red electrophysiology data streams 555 show (fractionated) electrograms with low amplitude thresholds across the planar array 510. This is because the bipole pairs in the second configuration 540'_{1-N} are aligned perpendicular to the activation direction 543 of the electrical signals. Due to the undesirable orientation, substantially orthogonal, between the second configuration of bipole pairs 540'_{1-N} and the activation direction 543 of electrical signals through the cardiac muscle, the red electrophysiology data streams 555 do not represent the greatest possible local bipole voltage and thus may misrepresent a scar.

[0063] FIG. 6 depicts an electrophysiology mapping interface 601, consistent with various embodiments of the present disclosure. Signal processing circuitry may utilize OIS/OT features, such as wave crest direction, to determine which fractionated electrograms 602 to ignore when developing an electrophysiology map 600 of a cardiac muscle. As

as a result, a clinician need not re-orient a planar array **610** on target tissue to verify that an electrogram signal is representative of the true activation signal traveling through the target tissue. Signal processing circuitry may further determine an activation direction **643** when the first and second configuration of bipole electrode pairs are both orientated approximately 45° from an activation direction **643**. In such a case, the electrogram signals **602** from the first and second bipole electrode pairs (**640**₁₋₂ and **640**₁₁₋₂, respectively) of a target tissue will exhibit substantially the same signal. Both sets of signals exhibit similar local activity resolution and far field components.

[0064] FIG. 7 depicts a planar array **701** in contact with an epicardial layer of a cardiac muscle **700**, consistent with various embodiments of the present disclosure.

[0065] FIG. 7 shows the cardiac muscle **700** after tissue ablation therapy has been conducted. The resulting ablation lesions **702**_{A-B} appear on the surface of the cardiac muscle **700** as white spots. To conduct an electrophysiology mapping of the cardiac muscle in proximity to the ablation locations, both before and after the ablation therapy, pacing is conducted from epicenter **799**. Adjacent electrodes **703**_{1-N} are assigned to bipole pairings. During the pacing procedure, each bipole pair samples the electrical characteristics of the tissue in between the pair. The resulting electrical signals are received and processed by controller circuitry. The controller circuitry develops an electrophysiology mapping by associating the signal samples from each bipole pair with a location of the tissue sampled by the bipole pair. The electrogram from each bipole pair may be analyzed and various electrical characteristics may be visually indicated on an electrophysiology map by color-coding (or other visual indication scheme, e.g., shading, patterning, etc.). In some embodiments, the color-coding may be based on the electrogram voltage at each location (e.g., mean, average, max, etc.). In other embodiments, the number of times the electrical signal exceeds a threshold voltage (or a voltage slope changes signs) during a sampling window may be visually displayed on the map. In yet other embodiments, total energy sampled during a time window may be displayed. Various other methods of fractionation accounting are known and may be used as one or more factors of the resulting color-code displayed on the electrophysiology map.

[0066] FIG. 7A depicts the vertical, horizontal, and omnipole electrophysiology maps based on the electrical data collected from the planar array **710** of FIG. 7 before ablation of the contacted tissue. The vertical **705**, horizontal **710**, and omnipole **715** electrophysiology maps indicate that the tissue in contact with the planar array **710** is generally healthy. However, both the vertical **705** and horizontal **710** bipole maps evidence false-positive regions **704**_{A-B} due to misaligned orientations of the activation direction of the electrical signals flowing through the cardiac muscle **700**, and the bipole pairs' orientation. Specifically, as shown in FIG. 7, the activation direction emanates from epicenter **799**, and moves down and to the left through the electrophysiology map shown in FIGS. 7A-B. As a result, both the vertical and horizontal electrophysiology maps **705** and **710** visually indicate moderately unhealthy tissue at the false-positive regions **704**_{A-B}. A positive tissue identification region may be defined by a low voltage signal that is actually indicative of completely ablated tissue. The omnipole electrophysiology map **715** is devoid of orientation-related false-

positive regions, due to the controller circuitry sampling bipole pairs in each tissue region with substantially orthogonal orientation relative to one another. The controller circuitry may include signal processing circuitry which utilizes OIS/OT type algorithms to filter out low amplitude signals from bipole pairs that are misaligned with the activation direction of the pacing signal. Alternatively, the functionality of the OIS/OT type algorithms may be partially or completely conducted by a clinician manually. For example, a clinician may analyze an electrophysiology map using horizontal bipole pairs, followed by an analysis of a second electrophysiology map using vertical bipole pairs.

[0067] FIG. 7B depicts the vertical **705'**, horizontal **710'**, and omnipole **715'** electrophysiology maps based on the electrical data collected from the planar array of FIG. 7, after ablation of the contacted tissue. While all three electrophysiology mapping methodologies identify the newly formed scar tissue at the ablation sites **702**_{A-B} (due to the change in electrical activity caused by the necrosis of the tissue), the vertical **705'** and horizontal **710'** electrophysiology maps also detect false-positive regions **704**_{C-D}.

[0068] The false-positive region **704**_C in the vertical map **705'** is less severe than the false-positive region **704**_D in the horizontal map **710'** as the pacing source is positioned at the top-right of the map (see epicenter **799** in FIG. 7). Accordingly, activation direction of the pacing is substantially in-line with the vertical bipole pair arrangements in the vertical map **705'**, and orientated largely orthogonal to the horizontal bipole pairs sampled in the horizontal map **710'**. As the omnipole map **715'** looks at both vertical and horizontal bipole arrangements, these false-positive regions are largely eliminated—providing a clinician with an electrophysiology map which more accurately depicts the true health of the tissue. For example, in an atrial fibrillation therapy, the clinician after analyzing the omnipole electrophysiology map **715'** may determine that an additional spot ablation may be necessary between ablation sites **702**_{A-B} to fully block the flow of stray electrical signals from one or more of the pulmonary veins in the left atrium.

[0069] As shown in FIG. 7B, the clinician, when looking at horizontal electrophysiology map **710'** in isolation, may falsely establish the efficacy of the ablation therapy. The likelihood of such an event may be greatly increased where the activation direction is not otherwise known by the clinician (as opposed to a known pacing electrode position). In such a case, the clinician would need to rotate the planar array about the longitudinal axis in order to detect the false reading. However, such repositioning of the planar array may be limited by physical constraints within, for example, the left atrium of a cardiac muscle.

What is claimed is:

1. A planar array catheter comprising:

an elongated catheter shaft including a proximal end and a distal end, and defining a catheter longitudinal axis extending between the proximal and distal ends; and
a flexible, planar array at the distal end of the catheter shaft, the planar array configured to conform to tissue, and includes two or more arms extending substantially parallel with the longitudinal axis and lying in a plane, each of the arms having a plurality of electrodes mounted thereon; and

wherein the plurality of electrodes are equally spaced along both a length of each arm and across adjacent arms.

2. The planar array catheter of claim 1, wherein the plurality of electrodes are configured to sample electrical characteristics of contacted tissue in at least two substantially transverse directions.

3. The planar array catheter of claim 1, wherein one or more of the plurality of electrodes are spot electrodes and one or more of the arms include flexible electronic circuit boards that are communicatively and mechanically coupled to the plurality of electrodes.

4. The planar array catheter of claim 1, wherein the center-to-center distance between adjacent electrodes of the plurality of electrodes is between 0.1 and 4 millimeters.

5. The planar array catheter of claim 1, wherein the plurality of electrodes are configured to collect electrical characteristics of the tissue in contact with the planar array catheter, and the collected electrical characteristics of the tissue are independent of the orientation of the planar array catheter relative to the tissue.

6. The planar array catheter of claim 1, wherein the plurality of electrodes are configured to sample electrical characteristics of the contacted tissue, and the samples are collectively indicative of the true electrical characteristics of the contacted tissue independent of the orientation of the planar array catheter relative to the tissue.

7. The planar array catheter of claim 1, wherein the planar array includes at least 4 arms, and each arm includes at least 4 electrodes.

8. The planar array catheter of claim 1, wherein the planar array includes bipole electrode pairs that extend along and across adjacent arms of the planar array.

9. The planar array catheter of claim 8, wherein the bipole electrode pairs are configured to sample electrical characteristics of the contacted tissue, and the samples are collectively indicative of the true electrical characteristics of the contacted tissue independent of the orientation of the planar array catheter relative to the tissue.

10. The planar array catheter of claim 1, wherein the planar array includes bipole electrode pairs that extend diagonally across adjacent arms of the planar array.

11. The planar array catheter of claim 10, wherein the bipole electrode pairs are configured to sample electrical characteristics of the contacted tissue, and the samples are collectively indicative of the true electrical characteristics of the contacted tissue independent of the orientation of the planar array catheter relative to the tissue.

12. The planar array catheter of claim 1, further including a longitudinally-extending fluid delivery lumen fluidly coupled to a source of irrigant, and configured to deliver the irrigant to the planar array.

13. An electrophysiology mapping system comprising:
a planar array catheter including a catheter shaft, and a flexible, planar array coupled to a distal end of the catheter shaft, the planar array configured to conform to tissue, and includes two or more arms extending substantially parallel with the longitudinal axis and lying in a plane, each of the arms having a plurality of electrodes mounted thereon,

the plurality of electrodes are equally spaced along a length of each arm and across adjacent arms; and

controller circuitry communicatively coupled to each of the plurality of electrodes, and configured to sample electrical signals received from each of the plurality of electrodes.

14. The electrophysiology mapping system of claim 13, wherein the plurality of electrodes are configured to sample electrical characteristics of the contacted tissue, and the controller circuitry is further configured to process through the sampled electrical characteristics of the contacted tissue through an OIS/OT algorithm, and to determine the true electrical characteristics of the contacted tissue independent of the orientation of the planar array catheter relative to the contacted tissue.

15. The electrophysiology mapping system of claim 13, wherein the planar array includes at least 4 arms, and each arm includes at least 4 electrodes.

16. The electrophysiology mapping system of claim 13, wherein the controller circuitry is further configured to sample the electrical characteristics of the contacted tissue across a first set of bipole electrode pairs that extend in a first direction relative to the contacted tissue, and a second set of bipole electrode pairs that extend in a second direction relative to the contacted tissue that is substantially orthogonal to the first set of bipole electrode pairs.

17. The electrophysiology mapping system of claim 16 wherein the controller circuitry is further configured to process the sampled electrical characteristics from the first and the second set of bipole electrodes through an OIS/OT algorithm, and to determine the true electrical characteristics of the contacted tissue independent of the orientation of the first and second set of bipole electrodes relative to the contacted tissue.

18. The electrophysiology mapping system of claim 13, wherein the planar array includes bipole electrode pairs that extend diagonally across adjacent arms of the planar array.

19. The electrophysiology mapping system of claim 13, wherein the center-to-center distance between adjacent electrodes of the plurality of electrodes is between 0.1 and 4 millimeters

20. The electrophysiology mapping system of claim 13, further including a display communicatively coupled to the controller circuitry, and configured to display at least one of an electrophysiology map, or electrical signal, indicative of one or more electrical characteristics of the contacted tissue, where the one or more electrical signals are independent of the orientation of the planar array catheter relative to the contacted tissue.

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摘要(译)

本公开的多个方面涉及在远侧末端部分附近具有高密度映射电极的平面阵列的柔性高密度映射导管。这些映射导管可以用于检测与电极接触的组织电生理学特征，并且可以用于诊断例如心律失常等心脏病症。
