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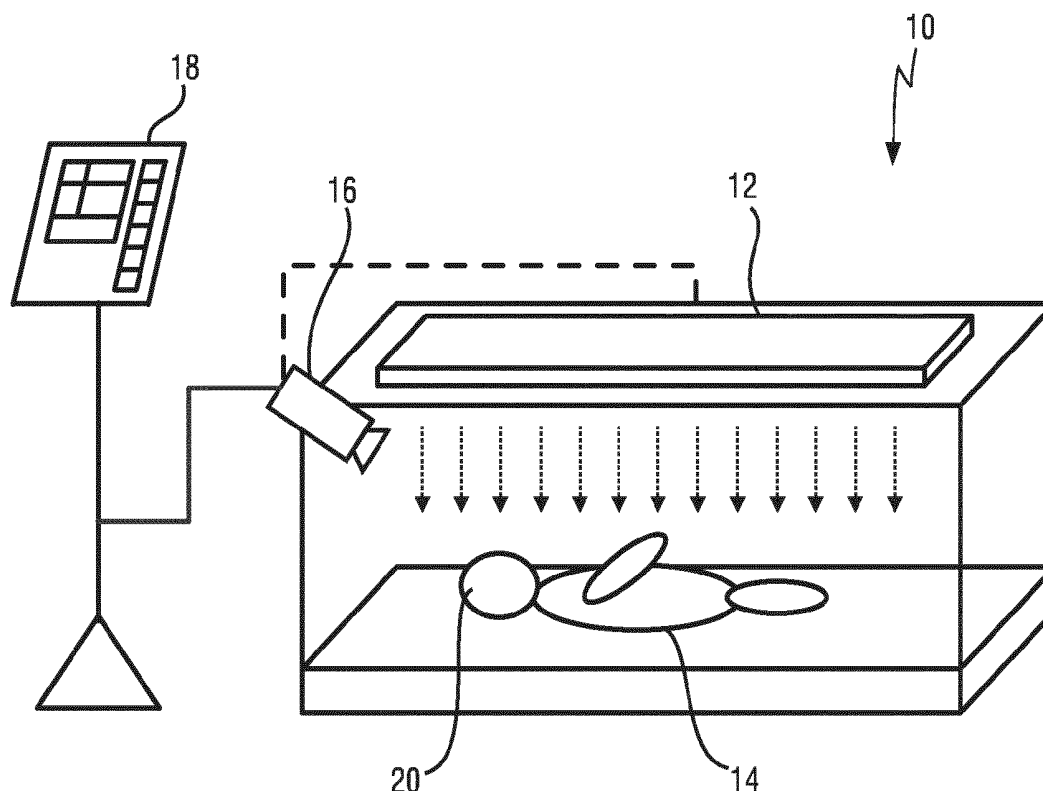
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2005/0626 (2013.01)(57) **ABSTRACT**

The present invention relates to a device (16) for remotely obtaining vital sign information of a living being (14) under phototherapy treatment. The device comprises a detection unit (22) for detecting light of at least one wavelength interval reflected from at least a region of interest (20) of the living being (14) and for generating an input signal from the detected light; a processing unit (24) for processing the input signal and deriving vital sign information of said living being (14) from said input signal by use of remote photoplethysmography and/or motion analysis; and a control unit (26) for controlling at least one of the detection unit (22) and an illumination unit (12) for providing the phototherapy treatment to the living being (14) based on the configuration of the detection unit (22) and based on the configuration of the illumination unit (12). The present invention further relates to a corresponding method as well as to a phototherapy apparatus (10) including a device as described above.



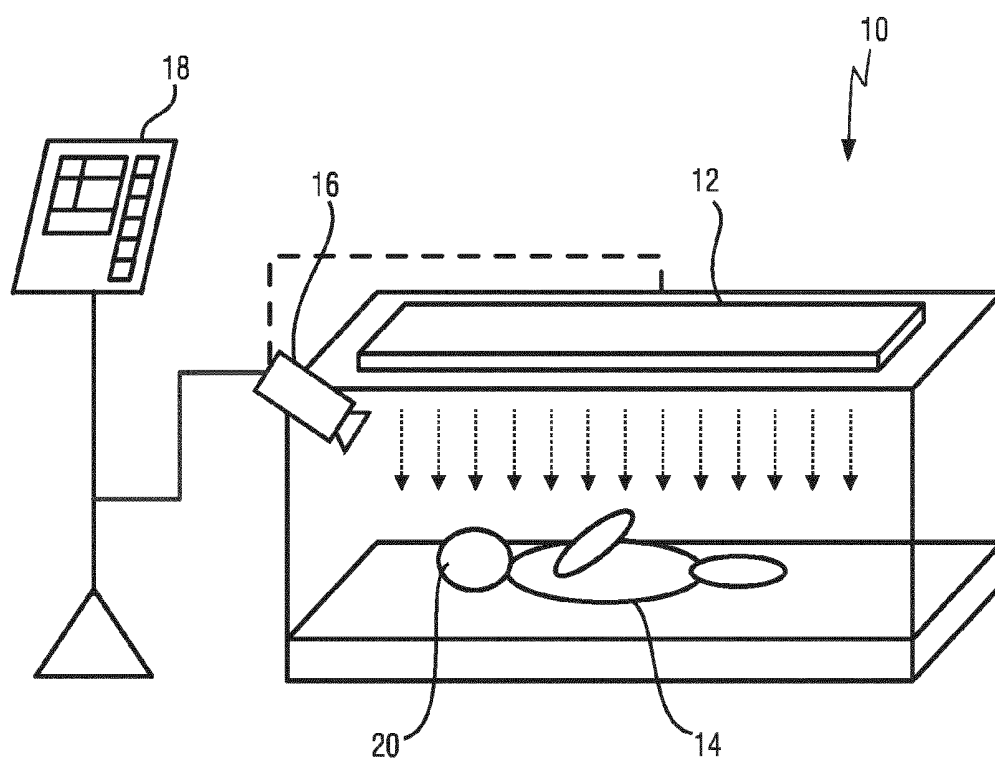

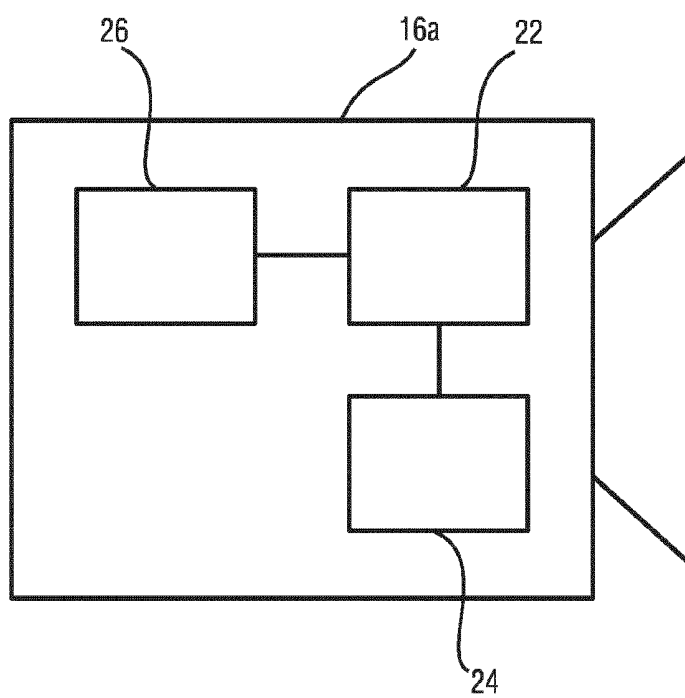

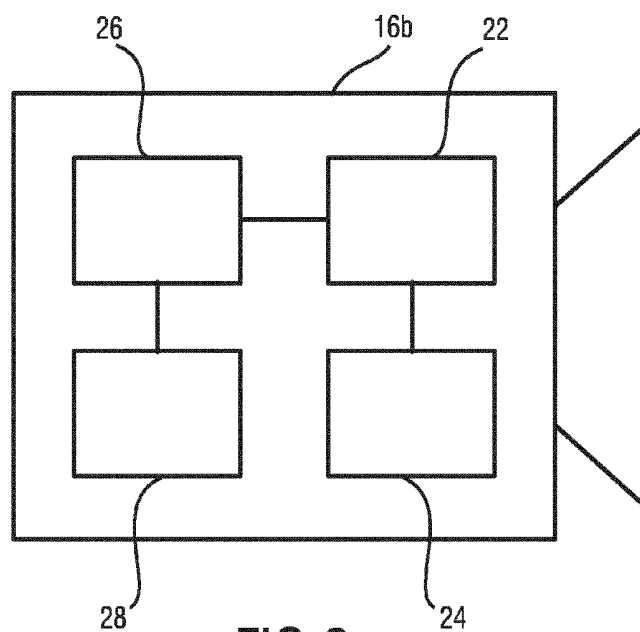

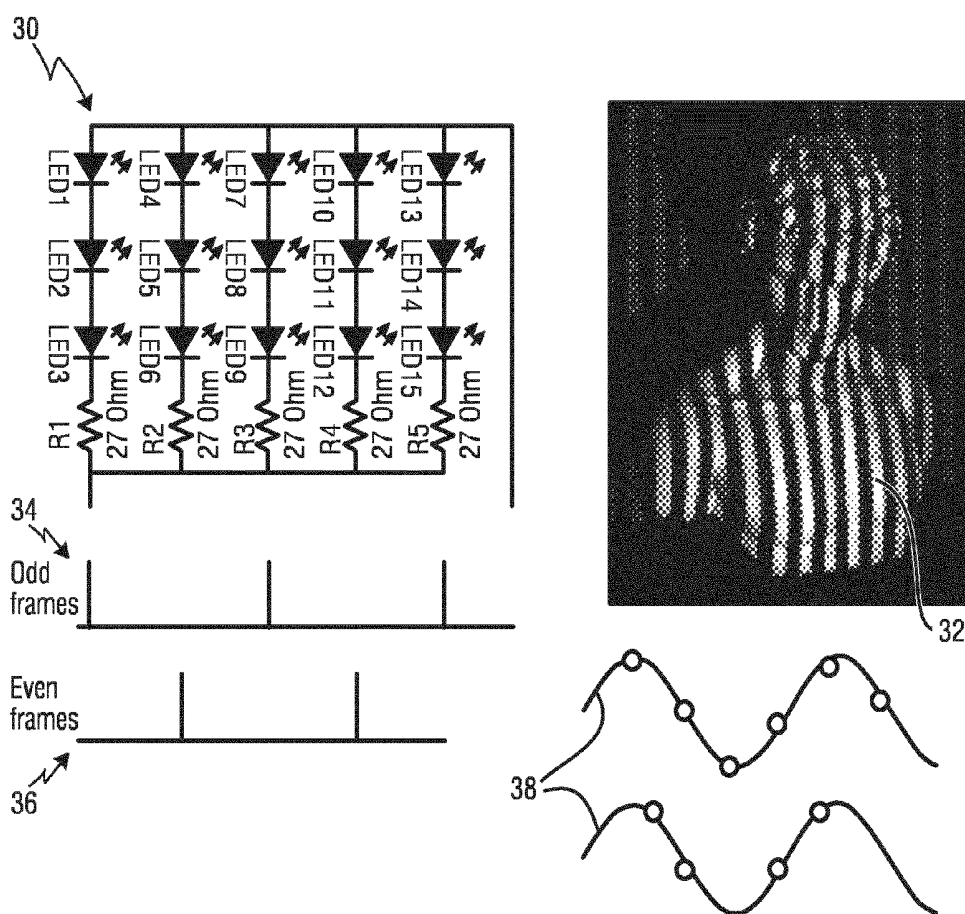

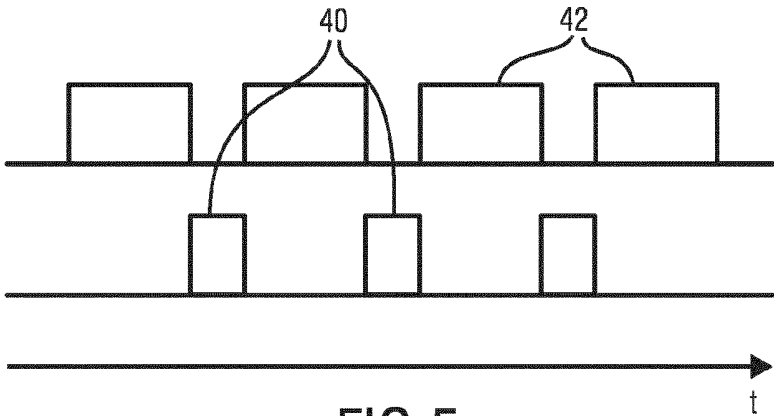

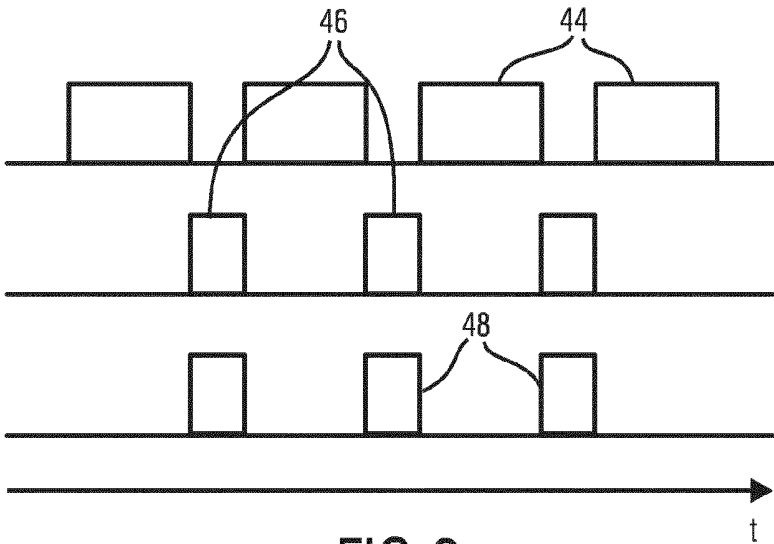

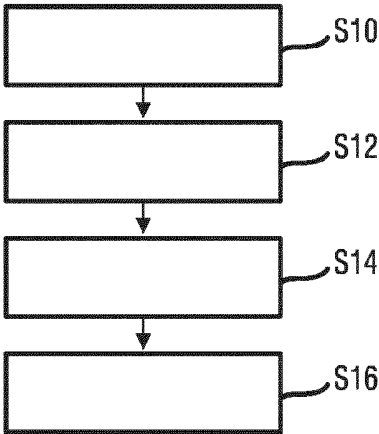

CAMERA-BASED MONITORING OF VITAL SIGNS OF DURING PHOTOTHERAPY TREATMENT

FIELD OF THE INVENTION

[0001] The present invention relates to a device and a method for remotely obtaining vital sign information of a living being under phototherapy treatment. The present invention further relates to a phototherapy apparatus for treating a living being with light.

BACKGROUND OF THE INVENTION

[0002] Jaundice refers to the yellow appearance of the skin that occurs with the deposition of bilirubin in the dermal and subcutaneous tissue. Normally in the body, bilirubin is processed through the liver, where it is conjugated to glucuronic acid. This conjugated form of bilirubin is then excreted into the bile and removed from the body via the gut. When this excretion process is low following birth, does not work efficiently, or is overwhelmed by the amount of endogenously produced bilirubin, the amount of bilirubin in the body increases, resulting in hyperbilirubinemia and jaundice. Jaundice occurs in as many as 60% of all normal newborns within the first week of life. Effective treatments to decrease bilirubin levels in infants with severe jaundice include phototherapy. Thereby, phototherapy refers to the use of visible light for the treatment of hyperbilirubinemia in the newborn. This relatively common therapy lowers the serum bilirubin level by transforming bilirubin into water-soluble isomers that can be eliminated without conjugation in the liver. The dose of phototherapy largely determines how quickly it works; the dose, in turn, is determined by the wavelength of the light, the intensity of the light (irradiance), the distance between the light and the infant, and the body surface area exposed to the light.

[0003] Other application areas of phototherapy (sometimes also referred to as light therapy) include treatment of skin disorders (e.g. psoriasis), sleep disorders and some psychiatric disorders. Commercially available phototherapy systems include those that deliver light via fluorescent bulbs, halogen quartz lamps, light-emitting diodes, and fiberoptic mattresses.

[0004] The monitoring of the respiratory rate and other vital signs (sometimes also called biometrical signals) such as the heart rate and the blood oxygen saturation (SpO₂) is an important issue in neonatal care (Juliann M. Di Fiore, "Neonatal cardiorespiratory monitoring techniques", Seminars in Neonatology (2004) 9, 195-203.). An approach to unobtrusive vital sign monitoring includes using a video camera and extracting vital sign information from recorded images. One technique in this field that has been demonstrated and found relevant for patient monitoring is remote photoplethysmography (RPPG). RPPG technology is, for instance, described in Wim Verkruysse, Lars O. Svaasand, and J. Stuart Nelson, "Remote plethysmographic imaging using ambient light", Optics Express, Vol. 16, No. 26, December 2008. It is based on the principle that temporal variations in blood volume in the skin lead to variations in light absorptions by the skin. Such variations can be registered by a video camera that takes images of a skin area, e.g. the face, and by calculating a pixel average signal over a selected region (e.g. a part of the cheek of a patient). By looking at periodic variations of this average signal, the

heart beat rate and respiratory rate (the respiratory rate may also be referred to as breathing rate or as respiration rate) can be extracted. By evaluating reflections of light of different wavelengths it is also possible to extract the blood oxygen saturation. Meanwhile, there are a number of publications and patent applications that describe details of devices and methods for obtaining vital signs of a patient by use of RPPG.

[0005] Another approach for respiratory rate monitoring based on recorded images includes the evaluation of observed periodic movements of patterns or irregularly illuminated parts of the chest of a human being that allow deriving movements of the chest. This is usually referred to as motion analysis.

[0006] In WO 2009/073396 A1, an apparatus and method for providing patient access in a warming therapy device (e.g., incubator, warmer, etc.) is described. In one exemplary embodiment, the apparatus includes at least one phototherapy light device disposed so as to provide phototherapy to an infant patient disposed within the warming therapy device, and at least one camera disposed to permit viewing of the infant patient during the phototherapy treatment. In another exemplary embodiment, the apparatus also includes at least one examination light in addition to the phototherapy light device, for assisting with examinations of the infant patient.

[0007] In US 2012/0150264 A1 a skin radiation apparatus and method are presented. The apparatus comprises: a photon radiation unit for generating a line-shaped radiation pattern extending in a first direction, the photon radiation unit comprising a photon radiation source, a movement facility for moving the line shaped radiation pattern in a second direction transverse to the first direction, a detection unit for detecting a skin condition profile, a control unit for controlling an power density distribution for the line-shaped radiation pattern dependent on the skin condition profile detected by the detection unit.

[0008] In US 2008/0269849 A1 an apparatus for delivering phototherapy includes at least one substrate, at least one emitter mounted on the substrate, and which emits at least two peak wavelengths of light, and an electronic circuit that controls emitter timing. The apparatus is configured as a dressing. A corresponding method includes delivering a first pulse of light to the target tissue from the emitter with a peak wavelength of light, and delivering at least a second pulse of light having a peak wavelength of light that is different from the peak wavelength of the first pulse of light, and the steps define a method of delivering a series of pulse sets of light, and the first and second pulses of light define a pulse set of light.

[0009] Although regular video data have been shown to yield adequate vital signs in many cases, the image acquisition for challenging cases, like strong motion, low light levels, non-white illumination, needs further improvement. In camera-based approaches, the extracted vital sign signal is usually very small and hidden in much larger variations due to ambient illumination changes and motion. Moreover, some RPPG techniques rely on availability of illumination in the range of wavelengths, which correspond to Blue, Red, Green (for RGB-based PPG) and Red, InfraRed (for R-IR PPG) color, with more or less equal distribution of an intensity across the spectrum of the light. This makes it difficult to apply RPPG in phototherapy applications where abnormal light conditions are present.

SUMMARY OF THE INVENTION

[0010] It is an object of the present invention to provide a device and a method for remotely obtaining vital sign information of a living being under phototherapy treatment. It is further an object of the present invention to provide a phototherapy apparatus.

[0011] In a first aspect of the present invention a device for remotely obtaining vital sign information of a living being under phototherapy treatment is presented. The device comprises:

[0012] a detection unit for detecting light of at least one wavelength interval reflected from at least a region of interest of the living being and for generating an input signal from the detected light;

[0013] a processing unit for processing the input signal and deriving vital sign information of said living being from said input signal by use of remote photoplethysmography and/or motion analysis; and

[0014] a control unit for controlling at least one of the detection unit and an illumination unit for providing the phototherapy treatment to the living being based on the configuration of the detection unit and based on the configuration of the illumination unit.

[0015] In another aspect of the present invention a corresponding method for remotely obtaining vital sign information of a living being under phototherapy treatment is presented. The method comprises the steps of:

[0016] detecting light of at least one wavelength interval reflected from at least a region of interest of the living being and generating an input signal from the detected light;

[0017] processing the input signal and deriving vital sign information of said living being from said input signal by use of remote photoplethysmography and/or motion analysis; and

[0018] controlling at least one of the detection unit and an illumination unit for providing the phototherapy treatment to the living being based on the configuration of the detection unit and based on the configuration of the illumination unit. In yet another aspect, a phototherapy apparatus for treating a living being with light is presented. This apparatus comprises:

[0019] an illumination unit for providing phototherapy treatment to a living being;

[0020] a device for remotely obtaining vital sign information of the living being as described above; and

[0021] a user interface for outputting the obtained vital sign information.

[0022] In yet further aspects of the present invention, there are provided a computer program which comprises program code means for causing a computer to perform the steps of the method disclosed herein when said computer program is carried out on a computer as well as a non-transitory computer-readable recording medium that stores therein a computer program product, which, when executed by a processor, causes the method disclosed herein to be performed.

[0023] Preferred embodiments of the invention are defined in the dependent claims. It shall be understood that the claimed method and apparatus have similar and/or identical preferred embodiments as the claimed device and as defined in the dependent claims.

[0024] If a living being (baby, adult or animal) is under phototherapy treatment, it is often difficult or impossible to apply camera based vital sign monitoring techniques

because the treatment light (therapeutic light) influences the detected light. Herein, the portion of a phototherapy apparatus actually generating the treatment light, i.e. delivering the treatment to the living being, is referred to as illumination unit. Considering the various application areas of phototherapy, this illumination unit can generally correspond to any light emitting device such as a LED, an array of LEDs of the same or different colors, one or more filament bulbs, one or more neon lamps, a laser, a fluorescent lamp or combinations thereof. This illumination unit illuminates the living being or at least a part of the living being and provides the phototherapy.

[0025] The present invention allows remote vital sign monitoring while the living being to be monitored is currently under phototherapy treatment.

[0026] The detection unit as used in a device according to the present invention may correspond to a photodetector such as a CMOS, CCD etc. The detection unit is used for detecting light (i.e. receiving light) that is reflected from a region of interest of the living being, i.e. capture images of said region of interest. Usually a series of images is captured over time, i.e. the detection unit operates a certain frame sampling time (sometimes also referred to as frame rate). The region of interest may correspond to a small area on the forehead of a person or also to a larger area on the chest of a person. The light is detected and an input signal is generated that can then be used for extracting vital sign information. The input signal may particularly be extracted from a sequence of captured images of the region of interest. More precisely, the input signal may correspond to the light intensity values detected for one pixel or from averaging a plurality of pixels.

[0027] The actual vital sign extraction based on this input signal is performed in a processing unit. This processing unit implements RPPG techniques and/or motion analysis techniques to derive vital sign information. RPPG particularly refers to extracting the heart rate, the respiratory rate and/or the blood oxygen saturation from variations in the reflected light that are indicative of volumetric changes of the blood or a blood vessel of the living being. Motion analysis particularly refers to extracting the respiratory rate from movements of the living that can be deduced from evaluating the reflected light, i.e. the obtained images of the living being. For instance, a distinct line in an image of a region of interest of a living being including the belly or the chest will be bent (i.e. subject to deformation) when the chest or belly is moved due to breathing of the living being.

[0028] Both the detection unit and the illumination unit are subject to control, wherein control can simply refer to powering the units on or off or also to more complex control operations such as the adjustment of switching frequencies, frame sampling times, intensity, orientation etc. The control unit considers the configuration of the detection unit as well as the configuration of the illumination unit and determines based thereupon optimal control parameters in order to improve the extraction of vital sign information. On the one hand it is possible to adapt the settings of the detection unit (i.e. to control the detection unit) to the configuration of the illumination unit on the other it is also possible to adapt the settings of the illumination unit (i.e. to control the illumination unit) to the configuration of the detection unit. The control is usually based on the configuration of both the detection unit and the illumination unit. Therein, the configuration of the detection unit may refer to adjustable

parameters such as the frame sampling time at which the light is detected, the resolution, the orientation, the adjustment or alignment, the focusing, etc., but also to invariable properties such as the physical resolution, the model number or the spectral sensitivity of an image sensor, the angle of view etc. The configuration of the illumination unit may refer to adjustable parameters such as the intensity, the orientation, the illumination frequency etc., as well as to invariable properties such as the type of light source, the geometry, etc.

[0029] An element of the present invention is to control at least one of the detection unit and the illumination unit based on the configuration of the detection unit and the illumination unit. By means of applying a control that considers the configuration of the two, the negative impact of the strong light of a phototherapy unit on RPPG measurements can be mitigated. Furthermore, the robustness of the measurements can even be increased by exploiting advantages of a dedicated illumination (i.e. by controlling the illumination unit in order to deliver light that is suitable for the extraction of vital sign information, e.g. by means of RPPG and/or motion analysis). Controlling herein particularly refers to adapting the settings of the units. In contrast to previous remote vital sign monitoring approaches the present invention can therefore deliver an improved quality of vital sign information of a living being under phototherapy treatment.

[0030] According to an embodiment, the device as described above comprises an illumination unit interface for communicating with the illumination unit (uni- or bidirectional communication), i.e. for obtaining information on the configuration of the illumination unit and/or for controlling the illumination unit. This interface allows a comfortable and immediate control of the illumination unit and makes it possible that the configuration can be accessed comfortably and changes of the configuration can directly be observed.

[0031] In a preferred embodiment the illumination unit includes an array of LEDs and the control unit is configured to control the array of LEDs to produce a light structure on the region of interest of the living being. Such an array of LEDs offers a plurality of control options. Illuminating a subset of the LEDs can allow projecting a light pattern, i.e. a light structure (sometimes also referred to as structured light) that exhibits one or more light-dark transitions, on the region of interest of the living being. This allows the detection unit to capture high contrast images of the region of interest. Such high contrast images can be advantageous for extracting vital sign information, in particular for extracting the respiratory rate based on analyzing an observed motion or movement in the image. Also, a specifically selected light pattern may allow improving the quality (i.e. the signal-to-noise ratio) of the input signal forming the basis for the vital sign information.

[0032] Further preferably, the processing unit is configured to determine changes of the light structure on the region of interest of the living being based on the detected light; and derive the respiratory rate of the living being based on evaluating the determined changes of the light structure. A high contrast image, in particular an image exhibiting at least one light-dark transition, i.e. a distinct line, can be used as a basis for a geometrical approach to determine the respiratory rate of a living being. If, e.g., a region of interest on the chest of a living being is observed, it may become possible to observe changes or movements, in particular periodic changes or movements, of said distinct line via

image processing techniques and deduce the respiratory rate of the living being therefrom.

[0033] Further, according to another embodiment, the illumination unit includes an array of LEDs and the control unit is configured to control the array of LEDs to produce a recurrent first light structure alternating with a recurrent second light structure on the region of interest of the living being, said alternating light structures in particular alternating at an alternation frequency >50 Hz. One disadvantage of illuminating the region of interest with a light structure is that only a part of the living being is illuminated. Thus, albeit it is possible to extract the respiratory rate as described above, a lower dose of phototherapy treatment is provided. Also, providing a constant light structure may have the effect that only some skin areas are treated. This could result in a less efficient or even ineffective treatment. This disadvantage can be overcome by producing alternating light structures. If, e.g., two alternating (periodic) light structures are produced, the second light structure can illuminate those parts of the region of interest of the living being (and of the remaining surface of the living being) that are not illuminated by the first light structure. Thereby, it is also possible to produce more than two alternating light structures. By producing light structures that alternate at a frequency >50 Hz, a human eye will not observe the fluctuating light and the living being receiving the treatment will not be disturbed. It is also possible that a time period of no illumination is inserted between the alternating light structures. A further advantage thereof is that the robustness or the quality of the extracted respiratory rate can be increased. Usually the frame sampling time of the detection unit will be adapted to the frequency of the alternating light structures.

[0034] In another embodiment, the control unit is further configured to control the detection unit to operate at a frame sampling time corresponding to the alternation frequency of the alternating light structures. If the detection unit is configured to detect the light, i.e. to capture an image, every time another light structure is produced, alternating light structures may allow increasing the sample rate for the input signal. Thereby a more robust input signal may be obtained and the vital sign information may be extracted at a higher accuracy. An image is captured of every light structure (i.e. every time the structure is alternated) on the region of interest. As described above, the respiratory rate can be deduced by evaluating the movements of the light structure from one frame to another.

[0035] According to a preferred embodiment, the illumination unit includes an array of LEDs and the control unit is configured to control the array of LEDs to periodically illuminate the region of interest of the living being with at least a subset of the LEDs in said array of LEDs. This array of LEDs may correspond to an array of high energy, blue light LEDs as usually used for providing phototherapy treatment to newborns suffering from hyperbilirubinemia. Also, it may be possible that the array of LEDs includes LEDs of one or more other colors in addition to the high energy LEDs. Advantageously, it then becomes possible to alternately illuminate the living being with phototherapy light and other light. Then, the detection unit can be controlled to detect reflected light at times, when no high energy light is present.

[0036] In another embodiment, the control unit is configured to control the detection unit to operate at a frame sampling time being adapted to a flashing frequency of the

illumination unit. The general concept of aligning the frame sampling time of the detection unit, i.e. the camera sampling, with a flashing frequency of the illumination unit, i.e. an illumination frequency at which the illumination unit provides the phototherapy light, can basically be used in combination with any type of illumination unit. Thereby, it is possible to avoid that negative effects of the phototherapy light on the light that is captured with the detection unit and that is basis for the extraction of the vital sign information. Thus, the illumination unit operates at a certain illumination frequency (usually >50 Hz so that the human eye does not notice the flickering of the illumination unit). Then, the detection unit is controlled to capture frames when the illumination unit is powered off and no disturbing high energy therapy light is present. Thereby, the detection unit can capture images at ambient light conditions. Thus, the extraction of vital sign information based thereupon is comparable to the extraction of vital sign information from images captured at ambient light, which has been demonstrated before. If, e.g., the flashing frequency of the illumination unit (being part of the configuration of the illumination unit) is known, the sampling frequency (frame rate) of the detection unit may be adapted accordingly.

[0037] In a preferred embodiment the illumination unit includes a first light source for emitting phototherapy light and a second light source for emitting light of a frequency spectrum suitable for remote photoplethysmography and the control unit is configured to control the first light source and the second light source to alternately illuminate the region of interest. Then, the detection unit can capture images under controlled illumination operating at wavelengths different from the spectrum of the high energy therapy light. Thus, the negative effects of the high energy phototherapy light on the RPPG vital sign extraction can be mitigated. The extraction of vital sign information based on dedicated illumination with a light source that emits a light spectrum optimized for camera-based vital signs extraction (IR light, visible light, etc. depending on which vital signs are to be extracted).

[0038] In another embodiment, the illumination unit includes an array of LEDs and the control unit is configured to control the array of LEDs to alternately illuminate the region of interest with a first subset of LEDs and a second subset of LEDs, said first subset of LEDs corresponding to LEDs for delivering phototherapy, said second subset of LEDs corresponding to LEDs for emitting light of a frequency spectrum suitable for remote photoplethysmography. LEDs for delivering phototherapy may particularly correspond to high energy blue LEDs. For the camera-based vital sign extraction such blue LEDs can have the disadvantage that only reflected light of one specific spectrum can be detected by the detection unit. This results in an input signal that is less suitable for RPPG extraction of vital sign information, i.e. from which the extraction of vital sign information is difficult or impossible. To overcome this deficiency, the array of LEDs includes LEDs that emit light that is, when reflected from the region of interest, suitable for the extraction of vital sign information such as white light. Also light of a specific wavelength may be advantageous if RPPG is to be used for the extraction of the blood oxygenation. Furthermore, it may also be possible to provide more than two subsets of different LEDs.

[0039] According to one embodiment, the configuration of the detection unit includes at least one of a range of selectable frame sampling times and a spectral sensitivity.

[0040] According to yet another embodiment, the configuration of the illumination unit includes at least one of a range of possible flashing frequencies, a spectrum of the light source for providing phototherapy, and geometry and control information of an array of LEDs included in the illumination unit.

[0041] According to yet another embodiment, the detection unit is configured to filter the detected light, in particular by means of a band-stop optical filter for attenuating the spectrum of phototherapy light being used for delivering the phototherapy treatment to the living being. Such a filter can be realized as a digital filter or as an analog filter. Filtering out the therapy light, which may make it more difficult to obtain an input signal suitable for RPPG vital sign extraction, represents an approach to optimize the input signal generated based on the detected light by the detection unit.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE DRAWINGS

[0042] These and other aspects of the invention will be apparent from and elucidated with reference to the embodiment(s) described hereinafter. In the following drawings

[0043] FIG. 1 shows a schematic illustration of a phototherapy apparatus for treating a living being with light according to an aspect of the present invention;

[0044] FIG. 2 shows a schematic illustration of a device for remotely obtaining vital sign information of a living being under phototherapy treatment according to an aspect of the present invention;

[0045] FIG. 3 shows a schematic illustration of another embodiment of a device according to the present invention;

[0046] FIG. 4 illustrates an example of a light structure generated by means of an array of LEDs in an illumination unit of a phototherapy unit and possible control scheme for a detection unit;

[0047] FIG. 5 shows an illustration of an exemplary control of a detection unit according to an aspect of the present invention;

[0048] FIG. 6 shows an illustration of another control of a detection unit according to an aspect of the present invention; and

[0049] FIG. 7 schematically illustrates a method for remotely obtaining vital sign information according to another aspect of the present invention.

DETAILED DESCRIPTION OF THE INVENTION

[0050] In FIG. 1 a phototherapy apparatus **10** is schematically illustrated. In the field of intensive care for newborns such a phototherapy apparatus **10** is usually integrated with a newborn intensive care unit (NICU) for providing intensive care to babies. When monitoring vital signs of neonates, it is usually desired to not attach contact sensors to their fragile skin but rather rely on camera-based monitoring approaches. Very often premature babies undergo a phototherapy procedure with a narrow band visible light for the treatment of hyperbilirubinemia. While this common therapy lowers the serum bilirubin level, the relatively high intensity of light at a specific wavelength might negatively impact the robustness of camera-based vital signs monitoring. High intensity illumination at a specific (narrow) wavelength (e.g. blue light), which is usually used for phototherapeutic treatment, might negatively impact the robustness of camera-based vital signs monitoring. This is

particularly relevant if the parameters, i.e. the configuration, of the detection unit (filters, sampling rate, etc.), i.e. the photosensor of the camera, are not aligned with the phototherapy illumination unit (i.e. the detection unit is not controlled based on the configuration of the illumination unit). For instance, RGB-based methods of RPPG rely on “white spectrum” of ambient illumination. Therefore, strong blue components of the phototherapy light and the absence of other wavelengths could clip pixel values in one color channel and may result in insufficient light in other channels. Moreover, in case the illumination unit of a phototherapy unit is embedded in a mattress, the light entering directly into the lenses of a camera (instead of reflecting from a region of interest of the living being) could cause an enormous glare effect and might even “blind” sensors in at least one color channel. The negative effect of the light from phototherapy on a camera-based monitoring can be even increased in case those light sources show temporal flickering, or if intensity and spectrum of the phototherapy light is adjusting its intensity (irradiance) depending on the body surface area exposed, duration, etc. The present invention allows overcoming these deficiencies by providing a device for remotely obtaining vital sign information of a living being under phototherapy treatment.

[0051] In FIG. 1 a phototherapy apparatus 10 is schematically illustrated. In order to deliver the phototherapy, there is foreseen an illumination unit 12 corresponding to a light source for providing the therapeutic light (phototherapy light) to the subject 14 under treatment. This illumination unit 12 can particularly be represented by an array of LEDs. However, the illumination unit can also be represented by a conventional light bulb, an infrared light source, a fluorescent lamp or another light source in other applications. It is also possible that the illumination unit includes multiple light sources, e.g. a first light source for emitting phototherapy light and a second light source for emitting light of another spectrum (e.g. a spectrum suitable for RPPG). The present invention is not limited to be used in the field of newborn intensive care but may also be applied to other application fields of phototherapy such as the treatment of skin disorders (e.g. psoriasis), sleep disorder and some psychiatric disorders.

[0052] There is further illustrated in FIG. 1 a device 16 for remotely obtaining vital sign information of the subject 14 according to an aspect of the present invention. In a preferred embodiment the device 16 corresponds to a camera. This device 16 is usually connected to a user interface 18 for outputting the obtained vital sign information. Usually, the device 16 is also connected to an illumination unit 12 as indicated by the dashed line in FIG. 1. This is, however, not necessarily the case in all embodiments of the present invention.

[0053] It is to be understood that other application areas of the present invention may require other arrangements of the illumination unit 12 versus the subject 14, such as an illumination unit integrated in the mattress or arranged at another position. It may, however, also be advantageous to make use of two or more vital sign cameras to obtain a more robust or redundant signal without leaving the general concept of the present invention. This may allow capturing images of a larger area.

[0054] The device 16 according to the present invention is oriented versus the living being 14 to allow capturing images of a region of interest 20 of the living being 14. This

region of interest 20 may particularly refer to a certain area on the forehead of a human being or to an area on the chest of a human being. Usually, the heart rate and/or the blood oxygenation are extracted by means of RPPG based on images of an area on the forehead or another visible skin area. The respiratory rate is usually extracted by means of motion analysis based on images of the chest or belly of the person. It is to be understood that the illustrated region of interest (20) is not to be understood as limiting the invention. Furthermore, the present invention is not limited to be used with human beings but can also be applied to other living beings such as animals.

[0055] FIG. 2 schematically illustrates a first embodiment 16a of a device for remotely obtaining vital sign information of a living being 14 under phototherapy treatment according to an aspect of the present invention in greater detail. This device 16a comprises a detection unit 22 for detecting light of at least one wavelength interval reflected from at least a region of interest 20 of the living being 14 and for generating an input signal from the detected light. The detection unit may particularly correspond to the actual photodetector, i.e. a CMOS or CCD chip of a camera.

[0056] The device 16a further includes a processing unit 24 for processing the input signal and deriving vital sign information of said living being 14 from said input signal by use of remote photoplethysmography and/or motion analysis. This processing unit 24 may be represented by a standard microprocessor, e.g. a microcontroller unit, or also by an application specific integrated circuit (ASIC). In the processing unit 24 the input signal obtained by means of the detection unit 22 is evaluated. Thereby, particularly fluctuations in the obtained light intensity of one or more pixel are evaluated over time. This so-called photoplethysmographic waveform (corresponding to the input signal) is used to obtain vital sign information, in particular information on the heart rate, the respiratory rate or the blood oxygen saturation of the living being 14.

[0057] The device 16a according to the present invention further includes a control unit 26 for controlling at least one of the detection unit 22 and an illumination unit for providing the phototherapy treatment to the living being 14 based on the configuration of the detection unit 22 and based on the configuration of the illumination unit. This control unit 26 may also be represented by a standard microprocessor. In other embodiments of the present invention two or more of the detection unit 22, the processing unit 24 and the control unit 26 may be included in one or more combined processor or integrated circuit. The control unit 26 considers both the configuration of the detection unit 22 and the configuration of an illumination unit in order to control based thereupon at least one of the detection unit 22 and the illumination unit 12. It may be possible that the configuration of the illumination unit 12 is provided to the control unit 26 prior to the use of the device 16a according to the present invention. Then, this configuration can be hard-coded (i.e. obtained and saved prior to the operation of the device) and no further information is required, i.e. no direct communication between the control unit 26 and the illumination unit 12 is required. In this embodiment the detection unit 22 is controlled based on the (previously known) configuration of the illumination unit 12. It may also be possible that the configuration of the detection unit 22 is known prior to the use of the device. Preferably, however, the control unit 26 is in communication with the detection unit 22 as indicated in

FIG. 2, obtains the configuration of the detection unit 22 and controls the detection unit 22. In an embodiment of the invention, in which also the illumination unit 12 is to be controlled, usually a direct communication between the control unit 26 and the illumination unit 12 will be required as further detailed below.

[0058] It is a key concept of the present invention that the control unit 26 is configured to control at least one of the detection unit 22 and the illumination unit 12 of a phototherapy apparatus based on the configuration of the detection unit 22 and the illumination unit 12. Thereby, it becomes possible that the negative effects of the therapeutic light on the vital sign extraction are mitigated.

[0059] In a preferred embodiment of the device 16b according to the present invention, there is further comprised an illumination unit interface 28 in addition to the detection unit 22, the processing unit 24 and the control unit 26 as illustrated in FIG. 3. Thereby, it becomes possible to directly control the illumination unit 12 and/or to directly obtain information from the illumination unit 12 (i.e. information on the configuration of the illumination unit 12). Further preferably, the device 16b is in communication with an illumination unit 12 via the illumination unit interface 28, wherein the illumination unit 12 includes an array of LEDs. Certain aspects of the present invention may, however, be equivalently applied to other illumination units that are used for providing phototherapy to a living being 14.

[0060] One possible approach for the control of the illumination unit is illustrated in FIG. 4. Therein, the illumination unit 12 includes an array of LEDs 30. This array of LEDs 30 can be controlled to produce structured light, i.e. a light pattern, on the region of interest 20 of the living being 14. One example for such a structured light (or light structure) is illustrated on the right side of FIG. 4. As illustrated, the structured light corresponds to a pattern of lines 32 including light and dark zones. Such a pattern 32 may be obtained by illuminating only some LEDs, in particular some lines of LEDs of the array 30. By producing such a light structure 32 on the region of interest 20, it becomes possible to observe chest or belly expansions caused by respiratory efforts by evaluating observed changes over time of the structure 32 (motion analysis). Thus, the detection unit 22 detects light and captures high contrast images that exhibit a light/dark transition, i.e. a line. If the region of interest is then subject to a movement, e.g. a movement caused by an expansion due to a gasp of the living being, the light structure will also be subject to a movement (in particular the line will be bent). Based on this movement of the light structure as observed by the detection unit 22 it becomes possible to derive the respiratory rate of the living being. Thus, it is possible to analyze a motion or movement in the image and deduce therefrom vital sign information of the living being. It is to be understood that other light structures apart from the illustrated line pattern 32 may also be used in a similar way. Controlling the illumination unit of a phototherapy unit to produce a light structure makes it possible to provide phototherapy and to accurately extract the respiratory rate of the living being simultaneously.

[0061] Illuminating only a subset of the LEDs in the array 30 may, however, have the disadvantage that a lower light dose is provided than if all LEDs were used. Further, some parts of the skin may be excluded from the treatment or an uneven dose might be provided. In order to avoid this, the illumination unit 12, i.e. the array of LEDs 30, can be

controlled to alternately produce a first and a second light structure. For instance, it may be possible to illuminate a first subset 34 of LEDs or lines of LEDs of the array 30 alternately with a second subset 36 of LEDs or lines of LEDs of the array 30. The detection unit 22 can then, e.g., be controlled to capture the first light structure (produced by the first subset of LEDs 34, i.e. when the first subset of LEDs 34 is illuminated) in every odd frame and to capture the second light structure in every even frame when the second subset of LEDs 36 is illuminated. The illumination unit 12 is thus controlled to operate at a certain flashing frequency and the detection unit 22 is synchronized with the illumination unit 12. If the detection unit 22 is controlled in this manner, the processing unit 24 may extract the respiratory rate 38 from the movements of the two alternating light patterns with a higher robustness. Thus, the robustness when extracting the respiratory rate 38 from the movements of the light structure on the region of interest could be increased.

[0062] An alternative approach to control the detection unit 22 according to the present invention is illustrated in FIG. 5. Thereby, it is also exploited that the frame sampling time 40, at which the detection unit 22 operates, can be synchronized with a flashing frequency 42 of the illumination unit 12. The illumination unit 12 periodically illuminates the region of interest of the living being. The detection unit 22 is controlled to capture frames (detect light), whenever the illumination unit 12 does not illuminate the region of interest. Thus, the detection unit 22 is controlled to detect reflected ambient light. Therefore, the detection unit 22 is not disturbed by the phototherapy light, i.e. the phototherapy light has no negative impact on the vital sign extraction. It is possible to control the illumination unit 12 by periodically switching it on and off according to a flashing frequency 42. The frame sampling time of the detection unit 40 is adapted accordingly, i.e. the detection unit is controlled to capture frames whenever no phototherapy is provided. Thus, the detection unit 22, i.e. the photosensor, is not blinded by the high intensity therapeutic light of the illumination unit 12. In other embodiments, it may also be possible that only every second frame is captured or that other illumination and detection patterns or frequencies are used.

[0063] In order to further optimize the remote monitoring of vital signs of a living being under phototherapy treatment, it may particularly be advantageous to control an illumination unit including an array of LEDs as described above. If this array of LEDs comprises not only one type of LEDs (i.e. LEDs for providing phototherapy) but different types of LEDs, another control approach as illustrated in FIG. 6 can be used. If, e.g. the array of LEDs includes a first subset of LEDs for delivering the phototherapy (e.g. high intensity blue LEDs) and a second subset of LEDs for providing a wide spectrum optimized for remote photoplethysmography (e.g. white LEDs), it is possible to alternately illuminate the two subsets. For instance, the high intensity LEDs 44 are illuminated alternately with the wide spectrum LEDs 46. The detection unit 22 is controlled to capture frames 48 whenever the second subset of LEDs 46 is switched on and whenever the first subset of LEDs 44 is switched off. In particular, the phototherapy light (blue light) may be emitted most of the time while the white light is only emitted during short periods of time. These short periods of time are used to capture images of the region of interest 20 of the living being 14. The detection frequency of the detection unit 22 (i.e. the frame sampling time) is aligned with the illumina-

tion frequency of the LEDs of the array of LEDs. Thereby, a living being **14** can receive an adequate amount of phototherapy treatment albeit vital sign information can be extracted from detected light of another spectrum (which is more suitable for the extraction of vital signs than the spectrum of the therapeutic light). It is to be understood that also other arrays of LEDs including multiple different types of LEDs can be controlled equivalently. For instance, for SpO₂ measurements, the illumination unit **12** can combine blue LEDs, white LEDs and/or infrared LEDs in an array of LEDs. Then, the infrared LEDs and/or the white LEDs can be synchronized with the frame sampling time of the detection unit to allow obtaining an input signal for deriving the SpO₂ rate by evaluating the absorption of light of different wavelengths in the region of interest.

[0064] Further, an equivalent approach is also possible if the illumination unit includes a first light source for emitting phototherapy light and a second light source for emitting light of another spectrum, in particular a spectrum suitable for RPPG. Then the control unit can also control the two light sources to alternately illuminate the region of interest with the two light sources in the same way as outlined above (i.e. at a certain flashing frequency) and the frame sampling time of the detection unit can be adapted accordingly so that only frames are captured when the second light source is powered on. Still further, it is also possible that the illumination unit includes multiple light sources for emitting light of different wavelengths, e.g. for extracting the blood oxygen saturation).

[0065] Other embodiments of the invention can combine the above-outlined approaches or parts thereof. For instance, it may be possible to combine a sequentially flashing LED that emits phototherapy light of an illumination unit **12** that can produce a light structure on the region of interest of the living being with a sequentially flashing white LED. Thereby may become possible to acquire the respiratory rate of the living being from evaluating deformations of the observed structured light and also obtain the heart rate along with the blood oxygen saturation of the living being.

[0066] It may also be possible that a plurality of LEDs is combined in the illumination unit **12** and the negative effect of the high energy LEDs with respect to the extraction of vital sign information from the captured images is reduced by applying a blocking optical filter, which blocks a certain spectrum corresponding to the spectrum of the provided phototherapy light and allows the rest of the spectrum. Then, the phototherapy light can continuously be applied while the white and/or infrared LEDs may be synchronized with the frame sampling time of the detection unit as described above.

[0067] FIG. 7 illustrates a method according to the present invention. The method includes the steps of detecting (step S10) light of at least one wavelength interval reflected from at least a region of interest of the living being and generating (step S12) an input signal from the detected light. The method further comprises processing (step S14) the input signal and deriving vital sign information of said living being from said input signal by use of remote photoplethysmography and/or motion analysis. Still further, the method comprises the step of controlling (step S16) at least one of the detection unit and an illumination unit for providing the phototherapy treatment to the living being based on the configuration of the detection and based on the configuration of the illumination unit.

[0068] While the invention has been illustrated and described in detail in the drawings and foregoing description, such illustration and description are to be considered illustrative or exemplary and not restrictive; the invention is not limited to the disclosed embodiments. Other variations to the disclosed embodiments can be understood and effected by those skilled in the art in practicing the claimed invention, from a study of the drawings, the disclosure, and the appended claims.

[0069] In the claims, the word “comprising” does not exclude other elements or steps, and the indefinite article “a” or “an” does not exclude a plurality. A single element or other unit may fulfill the functions of several items recited in the claims. The mere fact that certain measures are recited in mutually different dependent claims does not indicate that a combination of these measures cannot be used to advantage.

[0070] A computer program may be stored/distributed on a suitable non-transitory medium, such as an optical storage medium or a solid-state medium supplied together with or as part of other hardware, but may also be distributed in other forms, such as via the Internet or other wired or wireless telecommunication systems.

[0071] Any reference signs in the claims should not be construed as limiting the scope.

1. Device for remotely obtaining vital sign information of a living being under phototherapy treatment, comprising:

a detection unit for detecting light of at least one wavelength interval reflected from at least a region of interest of the living being and for generating an input signal from the detected light;

a processing unit for processing the input signal and deriving vital sign information of said living being from said input signal by use of remote photoplethysmography and/or motion analysis; and

a control unit for controlling at least one of the detection unit and an illumination unit for providing the phototherapy treatment to the living being based on the configuration of the detection unit and based on the configuration of the illumination unit.

2. Device as claimed in claim 1, wherein

the illumination unit includes an array of LEDs; and

the control unit is configured to control the array of LEDs to produce a light structure on the region of interest of the living being.

3. Device as claimed in claim 2, wherein the processing unit is configured to

determine changes of the light structure on the region of interest of the living being based on the detected light; and

derive the respiratory rate of the living being based on evaluating the determined changes of the light structure.

4. Device as claimed in claim 1, wherein

the illumination unit includes an array of LEDs; and

the control unit is configured to control the array of LEDs to produce a recurrent first light structure alternating with a recurrent second light structure on the region of interest of the living being, said alternating light structures in particular alternating at an alternation frequency >50 Hz.

5. Device as claimed in claim 4, wherein the control unit is further configured to control the detection unit to operate at a frame sampling time corresponding to the alternation frequency of the alternating light structures.
6. Device as claimed in claim 1, wherein the illumination unit includes an array of LEDs; and the control unit is configured to control the array of LEDs to periodically illuminate the region of interest of the living being with at least a subset of LEDs in said array of LEDs.
7. Device as claimed in claim 1, wherein the control unit is configured to control the detection unit to operate at a frame sampling time being adapted to a flashing frequency of the illumination unit.
8. Device as claimed in claim 7, wherein the illumination unit includes a first light source for emitting phototherapy light and a second light source for emitting light of a frequency spectrum suitable for remote photoplethysmography; and the control unit is configured to control the first light source and the second light source to alternately illuminate the region of interest.
9. Device as claimed in claim 7, wherein the illumination unit includes an array of LEDs; and the control unit is configured to control the array of LEDs to alternately illuminate the region of interest with a first subset of LEDs and a second subset of LEDs, said first subset of LEDs corresponding to LEDs for delivering phototherapy, said second subset of LEDs corresponding to LEDs for emitting light of a frequency spectrum suitable for remote photoplethysmography.
10. Device as claimed in claim 1, wherein the configuration of the detection unit includes at least one of a range of selectable frame sampling times; and a spectral sensitivity.
11. Device as claimed in claim 1, wherein the configuration of the illumination unit includes at least one of a range of possible flashing frequencies; a spectrum of the light source for providing phototherapy; and geometry and control information of an array of LEDs included in the illumination unit.
12. Device as claimed in claim 1, wherein the detection unit is configured to filter the detected light, in particular by means of a band-stop optical filter for attenuating the spectrum of phototherapy light being used for delivering the phototherapy treatment to the living being.
13. Phototherapy apparatus for treating a living being with light, comprising:
an illumination unit for providing phototherapy treatment to a living being;
a device for remotely obtaining vital sign information of the living being as claimed in claim 1; and
a user interface for outputting the obtained vital sign information.
14. Method for remotely obtaining vital sign information of a living being under phototherapy treatment, comprising:
detecting light of at least one wavelength interval reflected from at least a region of interest of the living being and generating an input signal from the detected light;
processing the input signal and deriving vital sign information of said living being from said input signal by use of remote photoplethysmography and/or motion analysis; and
controlling at least one of the detection unit and an illumination unit for providing the phototherapy treatment to the living being based on the configuration of the detection unit and based on the configuration of the illumination unit.
15. Computer program comprising program code means for causing a computer to carry out the steps of the method as claimed in claim 14 when said computer program is carried out on the computer.
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摘要(译)

本发明涉及一种用于在光疗法下远程获取生物 (14) 的生命体征信息的装置 (16)。该装置包括检测单元 (22)，用于检测从至少生物体的感兴趣区域 (20) 反射的至少一个波长间隔的光 (22)。 > 14) 用于从检测到的光产生输入信号;处理单元 (24)，用于处理输入信号并通过使用远程光电容积描记法和/或运动从所述输入信号导出所述生物 (14) 的生命体征信息分析;和控制单元 (26)，用于控制检测单元 (22) 和照明单元 (12) 中的至少一个，以提供基于检测单元的配置 (22) 并基于照明单元的配置 (12) 对生物进行光疗 (14) b>)。本发明还涉及相应的方法以及包括如上所述的装置的光疗装置 (10)。
